



One of my recent writing assignments was to describe a farmhouse in 250 words. That's harder than it sounds. I had been looking at farmhouses all my life but had never looked hard enough to write about them. It was an exercise in memory and observation.

Here it is. If you can see and feel it I would like to hear from you. If you can't, I'd like to know that too.

The house set alone on a knoll in a clearing a hundred fifty yards off County Line Road up a gravel driveway. Towering sixty feet high in front of it were three white pines. Looking from the woods across the rock-piled pasture, the barn and house seemed not to belong--as though men had in some way violated the vast-ness of the woods. There was always the foreboding realization that if the house were deserted and no effort made to preserve the the clearing. woods would take over. 





Mrs. Scoop

Home falls are dangerous

"People 65 years of age and "People by years or age and older become victims of more than 30,000 fatal accidents each year," Andrew Sabol, Jr., Ad-ministrator of the Alger-Schoolcraft Health Department

"Although this age group only constitutes about 10 percent of the total U.S. population, it experiences nearly 75 percent of all fatal falls," Sabol says, "The severity of accidental

injuries occurring to our senior citizens is extremely high," he continues, "the National Safety Council reports that 800,000 persons of this age group annually incur disabling injuries of at least one day duration.

In addition, Sabol reports that their average number of hospital days is longer as a result of accidents than from cardiovascular disease, cancer, diseases of the respiratory system and other diseases.

"On the whole, most fatal accidental injuries occur inprivate homes," he notes. "This is most likely due to their extended exposure to their environment."

"These falls, can be prevented or controlled," Sabol says and suggests awareness of a few

. Any quick movement of the head such as tilting the head backwards or moving suddenly may cause dizziness and result in a fall.

. If required, wear your eye

glasses at all times.

Be alert for tripping hazards -- toys, mops, brooms,

When climbing to reach something use a firm ladder or.

. Let each member of the family think daily about how to

prevent falls.
. Maintain halls and stairs well-lighted, without glare and shadow. Be able to turn on light before you walk into an area.

Install, use and maintain in good condition, strong banisters and handrails on stairs, Paint-ing the top and bottom stair with a light paint is also a good

idea.

. Use a non-slip mat in the bath tub. A grab rail near the

tub is desirable.
Repair broken floors and stairs; me mend or replace worn

Wipe up spillage promptly. Use floor wax sparingly or not at all.

Fasten rugs securely -avoid using loose scatter rugs.

Keep low furniture and electrical cords away from walking

• Place night lights in locations that will illuminate walking areas.

OVEN-METHOD JERKY 3 pounds venison

s pounds venion
Salt and pepper to taste
1/2 teaspoon liquid smoke
In 2 tablespoons water
Slice the meat 1/2 inch thick.

Remove all fat. Lay meat out in a single laver on a counter a single layer on a counter gurface. Dah each piece with a brush dipped in the water and liquid smoke. Salt: generously. Sprinkle with peoper if desired. Place strips layer-on-layer in a large bowl or crock. Place a plate and weight on top of meat. Let stand overnight or least 6 hours. Remove meat strips from bowl and dry.

Remove oven racks. Stretch meat strips across the racks. Allow edges to touch but not everlap. Do not cover entire rack. Allow room for air circulation in oven. Arrange racks so the top rack is no closer than 4 inches from top source heat, and bottom rack no cloer than 4 inches from bottom
of oven. Set oven at 150 degrees and let meat dry for
chout 11 hours. Check meat arly in the drying process. If ero is excessive drip, catch g on aluminum foil on a rack sear bottom of oven. Lower the temperature until oven feels warm hat, does not cook the ment. Coel and store in an mirtight container.

NOTE: Frozen meat may be "jerked." Thaw and proceed according to recipe. We have effice if you are interested.


