Street program outlined

An engineering study to help determine cost figures and priorities for the city's 1,770 street improvement program was outlined Monday night at the regular meeting of the Manistique City Council.

City Manager Robert Berger stressed that the planned survey would be to determine the feasibility of the work, and should not be construed as a promise that such streets will be included in the improvement program.

Once a cost figure is determined, he pointed out, the city will then be able to determine how large a program is desired. It is planned to load the city to provide more funds for the street projects. All curb and gutter projects included would be special assessed to the property owners.

Streets under consideration for next year include:

Houghton Ave. -- From the Soo Line Railroad north to Center St. Blacktop and curb and gutter.

Arthur St. -- From US-2 west to Range, blacktopped, curb and gutter where needed.

Cedar St. -- Elk St. north to Pine St., two blocks of blacktop, curb and gutter.

Pearl St. -- Main to Arbutus, blacktop, plus curb and gutter where needed.

Carthage Ave. -- Cherry to Park, Double sealcoat.

Garden Ave. -- Range St. east to US-2, Sealcoat.

MacIntosh Ave. -- Wolf to Elk St., two blocks of blacktop, curb and gutter.

Schoolcraft Ave. -- Otter to Elk St., blacktop, curb and gutter.

Otter St. -- Between US-2 and Schoolcraft Ave., blacktop. It was emphasized that these projects are not listed in the order of their importance, and that other streets were also being considered.

Noe said the city was also considering the idea of blacktopping all downtown alleys and special assessing property owners for the cost.

The question of the city filing suit against Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. for their failure to provide service here was discussed with Robert Berger, acting city attorney.

School fire investigated

Local and State Police are investigating a fire at the Central School building last Friday afternoon.

The blaze was confined to a classroom on the second floor of the north entrance to the Junior High School sector of the building. It was contained rapidly, but considerable smoke resulted and the building was evacuated for about five minutes.

The possibility of arson is being checked by officers and school officials.

Police Safety firemen responded to the alarm at 1:20 p.m., but were only at the scene for a few minutes.

Firemen were also called by Mrs. Leo McManis to the Star Motel, East Lakeshore Drive, Thursday at 11:18 a.m., when the exhaust hood on the kitchen stove ignited. Some smoke damaged the building and burned wiring, was reported.

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The city ski tow will be in operation daily from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. during the holidays, City Recreation Director Richard Bonifas announced the week.

Francis R. Weber graduates from State Police training

A Manistique man was among 49 new Michigan State Police troopers taking the oath of office at graduation ceremonies of the 16th recruit school held last Wednesday in the Lansing National Guard armory.

Col. Frederick E. Davis, department commander, administered the oath and presented badges.

Francis R. Weber, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent F. Weber of 711 Arbutus Ave. has been assigned to the Beckford post, effective Monday, Dec. 22.

Video-taped remarks by Gov. William G. Milliken were presented to about 500 relatives and friends of the new officers who attended the graduation program. Other remarks were made by Col. Davis, Lansing attorney Frederic Abood, and Trooper Billy Martin, class orator.

Valor medals, posthumously awarded to two slain officers, were made to their widows as part of the program. Receiving the medals, the department's highest award, were Mrs. Robert R. Conner of Grand Haven and Mrs. Carl P. Lindberg of Iron Mountain.

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School census drop revealed

Schoolcraft County led the Upper Peninsula with the dubious distinction of showing the greatest decrease in school census figures for youngsters ages 0-19 during the past five years.

Figures compiled by Don S. Brumback of Norway, head of the study center for Region 1 of the Michigan Association of School Administrators, showed that Schoolcraft County showed a decline of 15.71 per cent in the 0-19 age bracket since 1965.

Iron County with a drop of 14.15 per cent was the second highest.

Only two of the 15 counties in the U.P. showed an increase—Benzie, with 7.76 per cent, and Delta, 1.8 per cent.

The studies showed that in the pre-school group, ages 0-4, the census fell 10.68 per cent for the entire U.P. during that five year period, or almost four per cent per year.

Snowmobile operators are reminded that the entire Seney National Wildlife Refuge is off limits to all snowmobile or trail-bike travel. Visitors will be prosecuted under Federal trespass regulations. The Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife of the Department of the Interior is presently conducting studies on two Minnesota National Wildlife Refuges which have snowmobile trails. Until the results of these studies are evaluated, no snowmobile use will be permitted on any wildlife refuge in this region. The studies in Minnesota are being conducted to determine if snowmobiling is detrimental to wildlife, plant growth and other purposes for which these refuges were established.

East on US-2

East-west highway survey is planned

Gov. William G. Milliken announced Friday that an engineering survey will be made next year to determine what type of highway facility should be built in the future to serve the St. Ignace-Escanaba-Menominee corridor in the Upper Peninsula.

The survey will be part of a \$150,000 technical assistance project approved by the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission (ULRC) at a meeting being held at Hot Springs, Ark., in conjunction with the Republican Governor's winter meeting.

Milliken said the three-phase technical assistance project was developed jointly by the Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin highway departments.

The three phases of the project include:

—Development of guidelines for a major highway route in the US-2 corridor from St. Ignace to Escanaba and the M-35 corridor from Escanaba to Menominee.

—Development of standards for a scenic road. This study will be conducted in Vilas County, Wis.

—Development of guidelines for routes which will serve both scenic and high mobility traffic in the US-61 corridor along Lake Superior from Duluth, Minn., to the Canadian border near Fort William, Ont.

All three phases of the survey, which will be made by a consulting engineering firm, will cost approximately \$50,000 each.

The Governor said the Michigan engineering survey is significant because it could determine what kind of highway — a freeway or other type of highway — should be built in the future to replace existing highways now serving the St. Ignace-Escanaba-Menominee corridor.

"The purpose of the Michigan phase of the survey is to determine the type of highway that can best serve the existing economy along the corridor, foster new economic activity and still provide safe, efficient travel for the motorist," the Governor said.

"As the Michigan Department of State Highways pointed out in its proposal for this study, the primary service requirements of this route are to provide a high degree of mobility into

and through the area and at the same time activities the recreation-tourist services along the corridor.

"These are somewhat conflicting objectives. A freeway would provide the highest degree of mobility and safety for through traffic while maximum service to most of the recreational facilities along the route requires a great number of points where motorists can get on or off the highway.

"The Michigan survey will determine whether a single route can provide both functions or whether two routes are needed."

The Governor said the standards and guidelines to be developed by the survey will have wide potential application since the corridors to be studied are examples of similar conditions found throughout the Upper Great Lakes Region.

Varnum hits tax boosts

State Representative Charles H. Varnum (R-10th District) has warned of the possibility of tripled income taxes for Michigan residents if present spending trends in the Legislature are carried through.

"On top of that," Varnum said, "there is an effort afoot to take away essential tax exemptions from small businesses and individuals, and to make matters worse, we're not going to get an ounce of education, reform or property tax relief for this ton of taxation."

"The reports out of Lansing talk about an increase of the income tax from 2.6 to 3.0 percent. But everyone should understand that this would only finance a temporary increase in school aid. In addition, we have to consider civil service pay increases and the vast array of higher expenditures which will be demanded for the various state programs."

"By my calculations," Varnum continued, "we're going to end up with an income tax level between six and nine percent unless the runaway spiral of spending and taxes can be reversed."

Varnum said he intended to begin the reversal by voting against a package of tax exemption repeal bills now before the House. Varnum said the bills would repeal or decrease sales and use tax exemptions for charitable institutions, building materials for churches and schools, beer and wine and many others. The cost of these would then shoot higher, he said.

"As an example of the ridiculous nature of these bills, an original provision could have placed a sales tax on textbooks," Varnum said, "this would have resulted in government taxing itself. That one was deleted from the bill, but many other bad provisions remain. I just cannot vote to take away some of the few tax exemptions people and businesses have, especially when even higher taxes are proposed."

U.P. growth plan readied

Governor William G. Milliken met with State Commerce Director Richard E. Whitmer last week to establish a timetable for implementing a program aimed at accelerating the economic growth of the Upper Peninsula. Whitmer presented the Governor with 10 recommendations for improving the economy of the Upper Peninsula last week following a week-long fact-finding mission he made at the request of the Governor. Governor Milliken said he was "very pleased" with reaction of Upper Peninsula leaders to Whitmer's report and recommendations. Pledges of support of the 10-point action program have been received from a number of Upper Peninsula public officials and agencies.

The governor said initial steps to implement each of the recommendations will be taken within 30 days. He directed Whitmer to draw up a plan to carry out several recommendations that will involve the Michigan Department of Commerce and other state agencies. Governor Milliken said one comment in the report -- that many citizens in the Upper Peninsula are getting tired of being studied and re-studied and feel that whatever is done must be done now -- drew many favorable comments in the Upper Peninsula. "This is one report that will not be placed on the shelf where it will simply collect dust," the Governor said. "I plan to meet with Mr. Whitmer and his staff periodically to assess action that has been taken and to report to the citizens of the Upper Peninsula what has been done to carry out each of the recommendations. "Although this program will not cure all of the economic ills of the Upper Peninsula, it is my hope it will help to start the Upper Peninsula on the road to a speedy recovery."

Others who attended today's meeting between the Governor and Whitmer included Dan Gordon, the Governor's Executive Officer; William J. 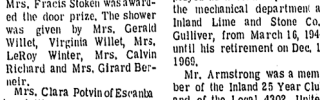

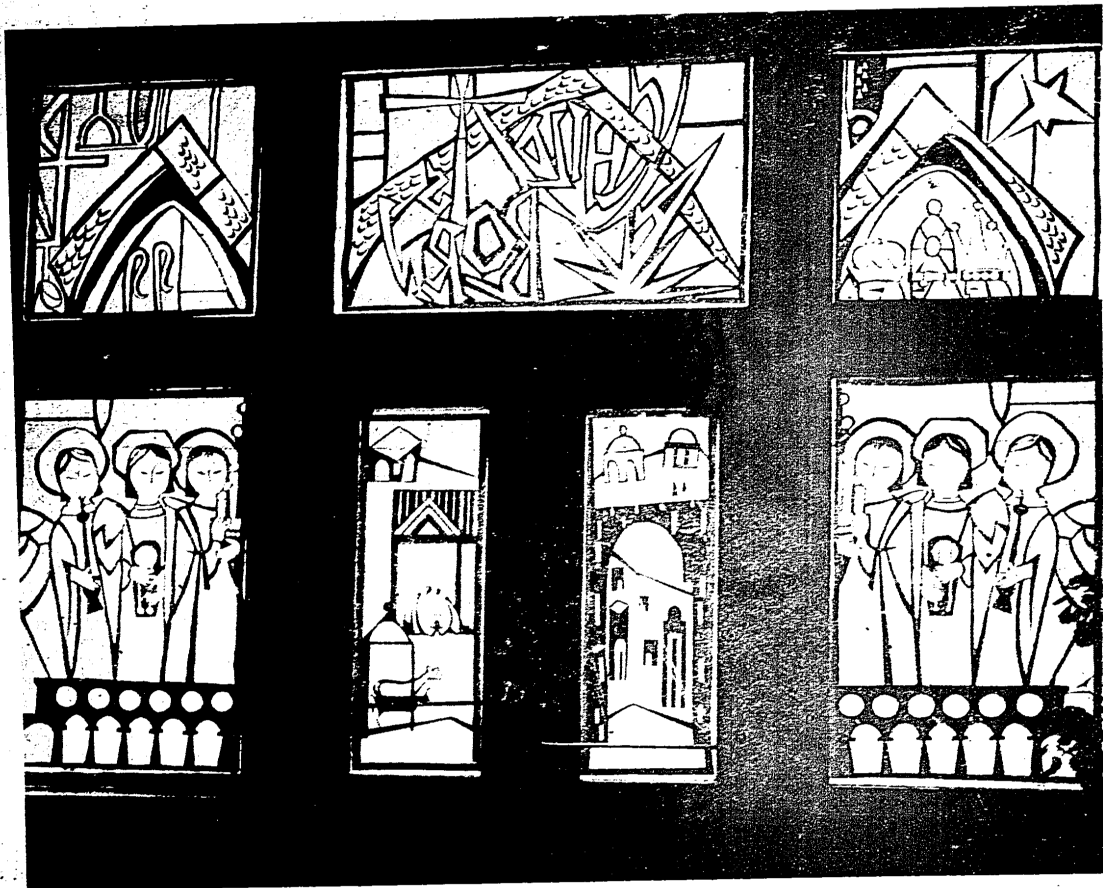

It may be the season of Peace on Earth, Goodwill toward Men, and to be Jolly, but every year at Christmas time we deck the big family fight about decking the halls, so to speak.

More specifically it involves the Christmas tree--its cutting, erection and decoration.

Being an old-fashioned boy (Bring me another old-fashioned, boy!) I subscribe to old-fashioned ideas regarding this happy family project. Nine holiday seasons ago I insisted that the entire family go forth with me into the deep forest, there to pick and cut the tree that would grace our happy holiday home.

This was not one of my better ideas.

Dorothy, Anne, wanted a spruce, David, Jr., wanted a hemlock, and Kathy thought jackpines were the prettiest. (That kid has some pretty weird ideas, now and then.) Nonsense, I told them. You want a balsam. You want a balsam because they do not shed their

needles the minute you bring them in the house, and they are fragrant and aromatic, filling the entire home with the exhilarating odor of the deep forests.

There is only one trouble with balsams. They have a tendency to sparsity--to put it diplomatically. They are not bushy like a spruce, nor picturesque like a hemlock, nor lacy like a jackpine. They are an extremely independent tree, pushing out branches willy-nilly without much forethought or consideration, leaving some gaping holes on one side and luxuriant growth on the other.

We have always had balsam trees at our house, mostly because I was the only one allowed to carry the hatchet into the deep forest, but we have also always had a surplus of comment and criticism about the sparsity and configuration. "Let's go over and look at Louise and Tommy's tree," Dorothy Anne will say. "Their's is always nice and bushy." In fact she carries a list around

in her purse of people who have bushier trees than we do. It is a long list.

But ours is a balsam. It does not shed its needles, and it is fragrant and aromatic.

In desparation she has suggested that I follow the practice of a friend of ours, who stifled family criticism by carefully boring little holes in the trunk and filling in the blank spaces with extra boughs, but only God can make a tree, I tell her, gritting my teeth.

Each year I threaten to resolve the whole thing by sending her out alone after the tree, but being raised in Detroit she has her mind muddled up with memories of waiting until Christmas Eve when the prices dropped before going out and paying \$5 for some poor stunted thing that had been cut along about July. What does she know about Christmas trees?

Getting the tree to stand up in the corner of the living room used to be a major project, until my Dad took pity on me one year and gave me a new stand to replace the one that we had inherited from Uncle Scrooge. One thing about balsams--they are nice and light and easy to put in the stand, probably because they are so sparse.

During 20 years of married life any normal family would naturally accumulate a sufficiency of tree decorations, which we have, but I'll bet we are the only family in town that saves the tinsel from one year to the next. I don't mean just save it, either. Dorothy Anne has to wash and iron it each year, and that tinsel from the early 1950's is beginning to shrink and fade a little bit.

There are several theories about how to decorate Christmas trees.

One theory, completely unsubstantiated and lacking any scientific merit, is that each decoration should be carefully placed, and the tinsel delicately hung and looped from branch to branch.

The other and more logical approach is to give the tree the casual and windblown look. When the snowflakes fall from heaven to decorate the trees in the deep forest, the snowflakes fall where they may, which is how you should put the tinsel on. My theory is to stand about five feet away from the tree and give it a heave. I think it looks beautiful.

It certainly helps cover up the sparseness.

I suppose one of these years, when we're old and gray and the children are gone, we'll go down to the dime store and buy one of these plastic trees to put on the table to watch between slugs of Serutan--but I hope not.

The plastic hasn't been invented yet that can inspire the fun and frivolity that comes with the annual cutting, erection and decoration of the balsam

And as everybody knows, balsams do not shed their needles the minute they get in the house, and they are fragrant and aromatic as well, filling the entire home with the exhilarating odor of the deep forest.

And if I get any argument about it, I'll fill everybody's Christmas stockings with rutabagas and see how they like that.

White House Guides Yule Traditions

Conservation-minded Theodore Roosevelt once refused to allow a Christmas tree in the White House. His son, Archie, smuggled one in, however, and the President finally relented.

First lighting of the National Community Christmas Tree at the White House was observed in 1923.

Holy Tree Blooms Every Christmas

Every Christmas, the phenomenon of the blossoming Holy Thorn Tree occurs in England and Washington, D.C.

Faithfully on December 25th, a tree called the Holy Thorn or Glastonbury Thorn blooms in the ancient English town of Glastonbury. Sometime during the same month, an off-shoot of the same tree bursts into bloom in Washington's Cathedral of the Close.

According to legend, two days before Christmas 63 years after the birth of Christ, St. Joseph of Arimathea neared Glastonbury, carrying with

ground. The next day Christmas Eve, it had burst into a thorn tree covered with blossoms.

Cards Came Late in Yule Traditions

Many of today's Christmas traditions began somewhere in the dim past, but the practice of exchanging greeting cards is just a little over a century old.

In 1848 William Maw Egley, a "starving" young English artist, came up with the idea of designing a Christmas card and reproducing it on pieces of pasteboard for the public to buy.

Egley's card showed a family Christmas dinner, formal dance, skating, carolers, aim-giving, a Punch and Judy show and other aspects of a celebration resembling the one in Charles Dickens' "The Christmas Carol," published a few years previously. Unfortunately, Egley's friends were not enthusiastic about his idea.

New Year's Apology
The "daddy" of all holiday cards was designed and etch-

ed in 1812 by J. A. Boerner, a young Londoner, who wanted to apologize to friends for his failure to pay a New Year's Day visit. Mr. Boerner's card made it clear he was tied to his home by depicting him with his coat caught in the locked doorway of his house.

In 1843, Sir Henry Cole, a busy English "missionary" of culture, hit upon the idea of sending out little missives at Christmas. John Calcott Horsley of the Royal Academy, famous for his campaign against nude art, designed the cards and Sir Henry sent out 1000 to friends.

It wasn't until the early 1860's that cards were issued for general distribution by a large English publishing company.

Christmas greetings were introduced into the United States by the Marcus Card company of London. They became popular immediately, and in 1874 Louis Prang, a German immigrant, started a Christmas card business at Roxbury, Mass.

Custom Lost Fashion
At the turn of the century,

he ceased publishing rather than compete with imports flooding the market. For the next decade or so the custom of exchanging cards fell out of fashion.

Only after World War One did American manufacturers begin to achieve success in the card business. Then inexpensive printing and lithographing processes brought Christmas cards within everyone's reach.

Despite its relatively recent start in this country, the custom has caught the fancy of the American public to the extent that it sends billions of Christmas cards every year, according to Mrs. Peggy Gilbert of Norcross, Inc.

Hanging Stockings
St. Nicholas, so legend says, secretly gave gifts of gold for

Above all, at Christmas, mankind experiences once again the reverence, wonder and rejoicing of the wise men, of whom Matthew says,

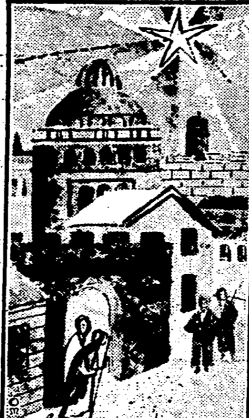
"And when they were come into the house, they saw the young Child with Mary His mother, and fell down and worshipped Him."

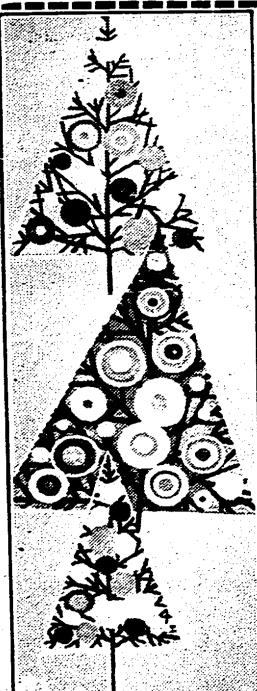

Journeying to Bethlehem



Christian Visitors Seek Church of Nativity For Three Celebrations of Christmas

Pilgrimage to Bethlehem is for thousands of Christians each year the focal point of the religious observance of Christmas. Visitors of many faiths make the trip to Bethlehem, now a part of Jordan, to the Church of the Nativity above the Grotto of the Nativity where Christ was born.

The manger so familiar to all who know the Christmas story was an improvised stable in a cave hewn out of rock, near the center of the hill town of Bethlehem.

Christmas is observed three times at Bethlehem, and for each observance the Mandelbaum Gate between the Israel and Arab sectors of Jerusalem is opened to admit the Christian pilgrims.

Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Armenian denominations share the Church of the Nativity. Roman Catholic churches begin the Christmas

celebrations with masses on Christmas Eve, December 25.

Eastern churches observe Christ's birth in January. For the Greek Orthodox churches, which still follow the old Julian calendar, Holy Night is January 6, Christmas Day January 7. Armenian churches celebrate both Christmas and Epiphany on January 19.

Those of the Protestant faiths gather in Shepherds Fields, the nearby site where, according to tradition, the shepherds heard the angel of the Lord come to tell of the Nativity.

TALLEST TREE

Tallest Christmas tree? In the U.S. the title probably goes to the Indianapolis, Ind., "tree" of the Soldiers and Sailors Monument. At Christmas, the 246-foot structure is decorated with electric candles and stars.

Lithographer "Fathered" American Greetings, Encouraged Artists

To Louis Prang, a native of Breslau, Germany, goes the credit for being "father of the American Christmas card."

Prang, a lithographer who began a greeting card business in Roxbury, Mass., exhibited his own cards at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876. He then had the idea of holding an annual competition to obtain the best of American art for cards.

Hundreds of paintings were entered in Prang's contest, for prizes from two hundred to one thousand dollars. Winners, with two exceptions, were artists born in the United States.

Women artists were well-represented among winners. Rosina Emmet was the mother of the late author and playwright, Robert Emmet Sherwood. Others were Dora Wheeler, Anne Morse, Elizabeth Humphrey and Florence Taber.

The group of 20 Prang prize cards is owned by Norcross, Inc., greeting card publishers.



Seeking Log Was Family Affair

The traditional Yule log survives today more in art, song and story than as an actual "blazing Yule." After all, not every home has a fireplace nowadays, and even when a fireplace exists, its proportions are usually far from sufficient to accommodate the Yule logs of yesteryear.

During ancient times in England, however, it was a solemn family ritual to select the log, dry it and burn it according to custom. Logs from fruit-bearing trees were preferred.

The whole family went along to select the log, as this was thought to bring good luck for the coming year, and to frighten away any witches.

If the log burned out quickly, or did not burn brightly, it meant bad luck ahead.

On Christmas morning, the children of the household beat upon the log and called for gifts to come forth. They were scolded by their parents, sent outside and, after a time, called in to open the gifts, which had been set near the log.

IN NEW ZEALAND

Not all living Christmas trees are spruce or fir. In New Zealand there's one called "Christmas tree" that doesn't even need decorating — it blossoms with its own red flowers. The tree earned its name since it blooms in December and January.

"O Christmas Tree" Means Fir to Most

Traditional for trimming, the fir is the tree most people think of when they sing "O Christmas tree, O Christmas tree, how lovely are thy branches."

Although there are close to 40 species of firs found in Central and Southern Europe, Asia north of the Himalayas, and North America, the holiday favorite — the Douglas fir — is not even a true fir.

Originally named false hemlock with yew-like needles, the Douglas fir is neither a yew, hemlock, spruce nor fir. But it does have some of the characteristics of all four evergreens, and its identity confused botanists for years.

The Douglas fir's graceful, upturned growth and ability to hold its needles when cut have put it in the top spot for Christmas use. It also produces

top-quality lumber. The state of Montana is an important source of Douglas firs.

Next popular Christmas tree is the balsam fir. Also called Canada balsam or Balm of Gilead, according to The Encyclopedia Americana, balsam grows from Newfoundland to Virginia, west to Iowa and north and west deep into Canada.

Balsam retains needles well and give off a pleasing fragrance. It is especially well-liked in the Eastern United States.

Included among the many other Christmas choices are the Eastern red cedar, black spruce and Scotch pine.

Canadian Christmas trees, from seven provinces, are part of the holiday scene in many countries. The United States, alone, accounts for about 90

percent of Canada's annual production of trees. Still others are shipped abroad, from Ethiopia to Venezuela.

Women Rule Christmas 1885

A picture of a beautiful woman on a current Christmas card would seem inappropriate to many. But feminine beauty enjoyed great popularity in Christmas cards during the late 1880's. Until 1880, children and

elderly women were most often pictured. Or, if adult young women did appear, they were shown as "tenders of the hearth," with their husbands, children or pets. Later, classic Greek and Roman feminine figures were

used to convey ideals of feeling and beauty.

Artists of the Royal Academy in London began the new fashion for using contemporary women in their Christmas card illustrations in 1881. One of the earliest of these was designed by W. F. Yeames and showed a richly-gowned young woman asleep in a chair, with winged cupids in a golden cage.

In 1885, fashion figures of elegant women were a typical subject of Christmas cards. An example is a Louis Frang card from the Norcross Historical Collection.

Mr. Frang, who published the best-known early greeting cards in the U.S., conducted a Christmas card competition. The \$1,000 first prize was won by Elihu Vedder, a well-known American artist.

The model for his successful illustration was his wife, and the inscription read, in part, "Thy own wish wish I thee in every place."

Later Christmas cards depicted women as fashion plates, sportswomen, cyclists and, in general, growing participants in the life of their times.

ABOUT GREENS

Many Christmas greens used today were once pagan symbols. Flowers and leafy boughs were used in Roman rites. The Saxons used holly, ivy and bay in their religious observances.

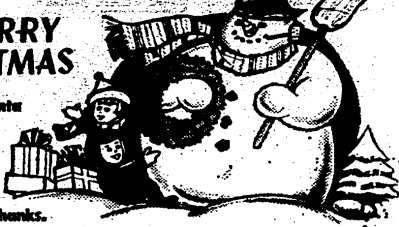

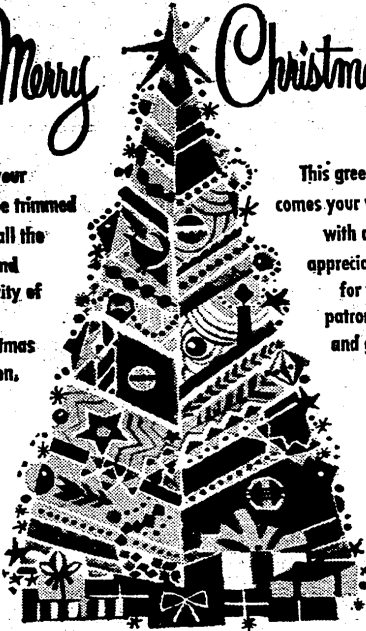

Pagan Feasts Are Source Of Customs

Most of the customs now associated with Christmas were originally pagan or non-Christian, according to The Encyclopedia Americana. Saturnalia, a Roman feast celebrated in mid-December, provided the model for many of the merry-making customs of Christmas. From this celebration, for example, were derived the elaborate feasting, the giving of gifts and the burning of candles.

Lights also played an important part in most winter solstice festivals. An obscure figure in the early mythologies of the East emerged as a sun god. From the 1st century B.C. this figure, Mithras, was adopted by an increasing number of Roman soldiers and others. Mithras' greatest festival was that of the winter solstice, the time when the god began to return to his worshippers.

In the 5th century the Western church ordered a feast celebrating the birth of the Savior to be observed on the day of the Mithraic rites of the birth of the sun and at the close of the Saturnalia.

Among the German and Celtic tribes the winter solstice was considered an important point of the year and to commemorate the return of the sun they held their chief festival of Yule, which, like other pagan celebrations, became adapted to Christmas.

The Teutonic Yule feast also provided customs for the Christmas festivities, such as the Yule log and wassail bowl.

Warding Off Witches Led to Candy Canes

One of the most popular symbols of the Christmas holidays, candy canes, began with an old superstition during the Middle Ages. Europeans of that period carried glass canes filled with colored candies to distract evil witches.

Belief was that the evil ones become so interested in sorting the candies that casting of evil spells was forgotten, reports the Candy, Chocolate and Confectionery Institute.

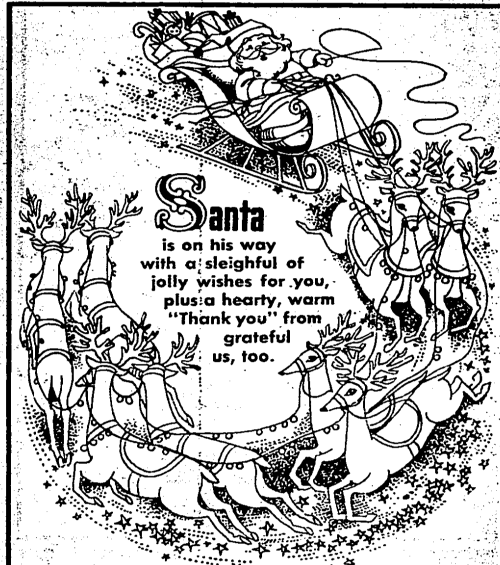

Santa Claus Has Origins In America

Hear them? They're sleigh-bells — and we all know what that means! Santa's here, and with him arrives one of the oldest, happiest, and best loved traditions of the Christmas season.

Today, of course, it just wouldn't be Christmas without Santa Claus, but it is interesting to ponder just where the jolly old gent got his start, and it might be surprising to learn that it wasn't really the North Pole.

The name Santa Claus, itself, is an American derivation of the name St. Nicholas, an early fourth century bishop in Asia Minor, according to the editors of the Encyclopedia International.

Santa was first brought to this country by the early Dutch settlers who called him Sinterklaas. These Dutch burghers portrayed him as a merry old man, sometimes even with a wife they called Molly Grietje.

Santa also looked a little different then, and he wore a wide-brimmed black hat, short Dutch breeches, and smoked a long clay pipe.

Later, the British brought their own Father Christmas to America — a happy, roly-poly Falstaffian figure.

Inevitably, Sinterklaas and Father Christmas became one. Add to this the Norwegian's Kriss Kringle, with his sleigh and reindeer, and the picture is nearly complete.

It was finally the task of American artists and writers to create an image of Santa Claus such as we know today. Washington Irving, among others, contributed to the concept of Santa as a jolly holiday figure, while Clement Moore, in his famous "Visit from St. Nicholas" ("Twas

the Night Before Christmas"), added to the concept.

However, the notion of Santa Claus which really

captured the imagination of young and old alike was drawn by the American cartoonist Thomas Nast in 1863.

Yes, that's Santa all right,

with his fur-trimmed suit, shiny black boots and long white beard. Just the way we've always known him — or so it seems.

Poinsettia Shows Season's Colors

Showing the colors of Christmas, red and green, the tropical poinsettia adorns many homes at the holiday season. Though it is now a favorite holiday houseplant, the poinsettia is a relative newcomer to the customs of Christmas.

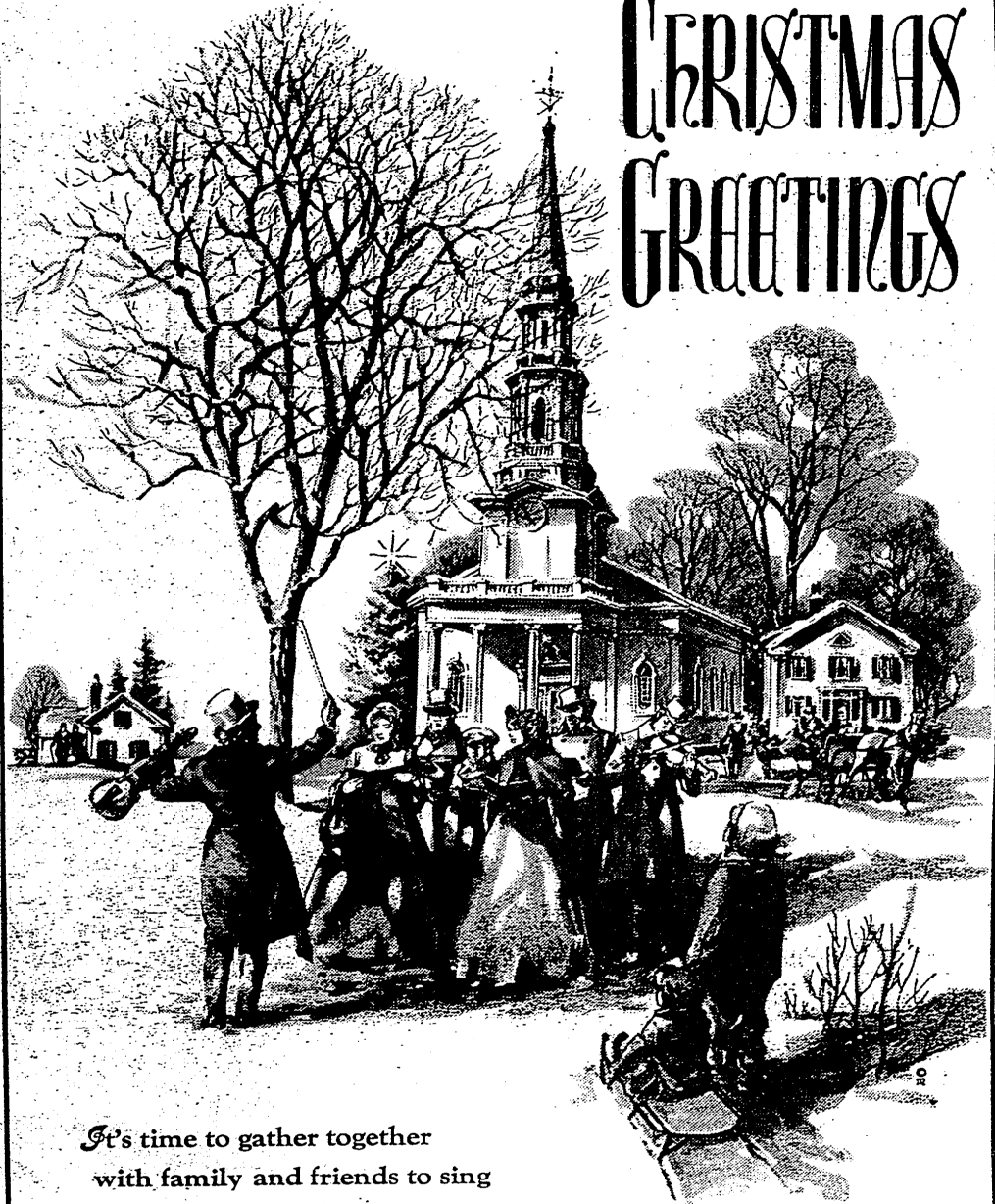

Famous Writers Find New Ways to Say, 'A Ryghte Merrie Chrystmasse Toe You'

Great writers of every age since medieval times have made contributions to the various expressions and phrases that are associated with Christmas.

Such expressions as, "A Ryghte Merrie Chrystmasse Toe You," have now become archaic and the spelling quaint. But the continued exchange of Christmas cards over the years has been a strong influence in preserving the traditional words, or greetings, associated with the season.

From the very beginning of greeting cards, prime importance was placed on the message itself. In fact, some of the earliest cards were simply greetings with sprigs or borders of holly on an otherwise plain card.

But then, as early as the 1880's in England and also in America, verses appropriate to the season and composed by famous authors, were proving popular on Christmas cards.

One such poem by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow — with a portrait of the eminent gentleman — appears on one of the antiques in the Hallmark Historical Collection, a treasury of more than 50,000 greetings which provides a variety of the expressions of good cheer and Christmas wishes by famous writers over the years.

The age old message of the season is to be found in today's Christmas cards, expressed in poetry and prose by such outstanding literary figures of the past and present as William Shakespeare, Samuel Taylor Coleridge, Sara Teasdale and, more recently, T. S. Eliot, Archibald MacLeish, William Carlos Williams and the late Russian writer, Boris Pasternak.

Pasternak's "The Christmas Pine Tree" has been excerpted for a greeting card which reads in part:

I love her to tears, at night,
from the first,
As she comes from the woods
in storm and snow.
So awkward her branches, the
shyest of fir!
We fashion her threads un-
hurriedly, slow.

Her garments of silvery, gossamer lace,
Patterns of tinsel, and spangles aglow
From branch unto branch,
down to the base
I love her to tears, from the first, so bright
In a crowd of friends on Christmas night."

Portions of Sir Walter Scott's "Marmion" have been used for still another Christmas card verse:

"England was merry England when

The damsel donned her kirtle sheen;

The hall was dressed with holly green;
Forth to the wood did merry-men go

To gather in the mistletoe.
'Twas Christmas broughed the mightiest ale;

'Twas Christmas told the merriest tale;



Santa's Busy, But He Has Plenty of Help

Even though Santa is sometimes pictured as traveling by rocket or by jet plane, his favorite mode of transportation still seems to be the famous reindeer-drawn sleigh. The only wonder is that he can remain as jolly as he traditionally is, when he has to cover the world in one night, delivering gifts by the billions.

Perhaps the explanation may be found in the number of helpers he has, and also in the fact that Christmas Eve is not his only day for delivering gifts.

St. Nicholas, a real bishop, was the first "Santa." Many legends grew up around his name, and many centuries after his death on December 6, about 342 A.D., he was honored as a friend to the young. December 6 became "Children's Day," and St. Nicholas, traveling by horse, brought gifts to reward children for good behavior.

Although Santa has to a large extent replaced St. Nicholas, in some European countries children still await the arrival of the bishop on the night of December 5, and set out shoes filled with hay and carrots for his horse.

In Scandinavian and some other countries, Santa gets an assist from St. Lucy, who is responsible for the distribution of gifts on her day, December 13.

Christmas comes after Christmas to many homes in France and French Canada, where the old tradition of giving gifts to children on New Year's day is observed. There's a resemblance to Christmas in the placing of gifts beside the fireplace, often in stockings.

Even then, the Santa season isn't finished. Many Spanish children expect the Three Kings to bring them gifts on Epiphany, January 6. They, too, set out shoes filled with straw and grain for the horses the Kings ride.

Whatever the gift-giving date, Santa has a host of helpers to lighten his load. In addition to St. Lucy, Scandinavian countries have the Tomtar, little gray-bearded men who are said to hide gifts for boys and girls on Christmas Eve. The Christ Child or Kristkind brings the gifts in many countries.

In Italy the traditional gift-

giver is Befana, sometimes described as a benevolent fairy and sometimes as a witch. Legend says that she misdirected the Magi or that she refused shelter to the holy family. Now she goes around the world, in repentance, seeking the Christ Child and doing good to children on Christmas Eve.

HEARD IN APRIL

Handel's "Messiah," often heard at the Christmas season, was begun in August, finished in September and first performed in April.

IN DENMARK

A Danish Christmas custom is the "Jul-bock," a long pole with a goat's head, whose duty it is to butt in when the children misbehave.

Season's 'Firsts' Are Traced

Shepherds watched, angels sang and wise men traveled far to behold the miracle of the first Christmas.

Since that holy night a multitude of legends and customs, both religious and secular, have developed as part of the holiday. Each legend was once told, each custom once observed for the first time, and though origins of many traditions are now lost in time, other Christmas "firsts" have been recorded for posterity.

There are historical Christmas "firsts," attested by church records and by scientific research into the early years of Christianity, as well as "firsts" of later history and "firsts" that blend fact with myth.

Setting the Date

December 25 was first assigned as the date for the celebration of the Nativity in about the year 320 A.D. Since the New Testament was written as religious instruction rather than history, the exact date of Christ's birth is not known.

The present day was selected as a means of unifying the observances of Christmas, "the mass of Christ."

Hanging Stockings

Story of the first Christmas stocking is associated with the real St. Nicholas, a fourth century bishop known for his many kind deeds. Wishing to present an anonymous gift to help the daughters of an impoverished merchant, he threw a bag of gold down the chimney, where it fell into a stocking hung up to dry.

The legend is reflected in today's custom of tucking "gold" — an orange or tangerine — into the toe of a Christmas stocking.

Trimming Trees

Trimmed Christmas trees first appeared in the United States probably during the American Revolution. Hessian soldiers with the British forces started the practice to relieve their nostalgia for their homeland.

An early diary, written at Fort Dearborn, Ill., in 1804 relates the practice of trimming the Christmas tree with ornaments of the time.

At the White House

First National Community Christmas Tree in the U.S. was placed on the White House lawn in 1923, while Calvin Coolidge was President. The tree was a spruce from Coolidge's native state, Vermont.

In the following year Coolidge presided at a ceremony under the sponsorship of the American Forestry association, to urge the use of living Christmas trees.

At the Round Table

Traditionally, the first Christmas feast in England was held at the Round Table of King Arthur. While the specific date is undetermined, references to the famous king in medieval legends have been traced back to as early as 600 A.D.

When Organ Broke

"Silent Night" was first sung at Christmas 1818.

The church organ in an Austrian village had broken down — impaired by mice — so the story goes. Father Joseph

had been saddened because there would be no music for Christmas, sang "Silent Night" to a guitar accompaniment.

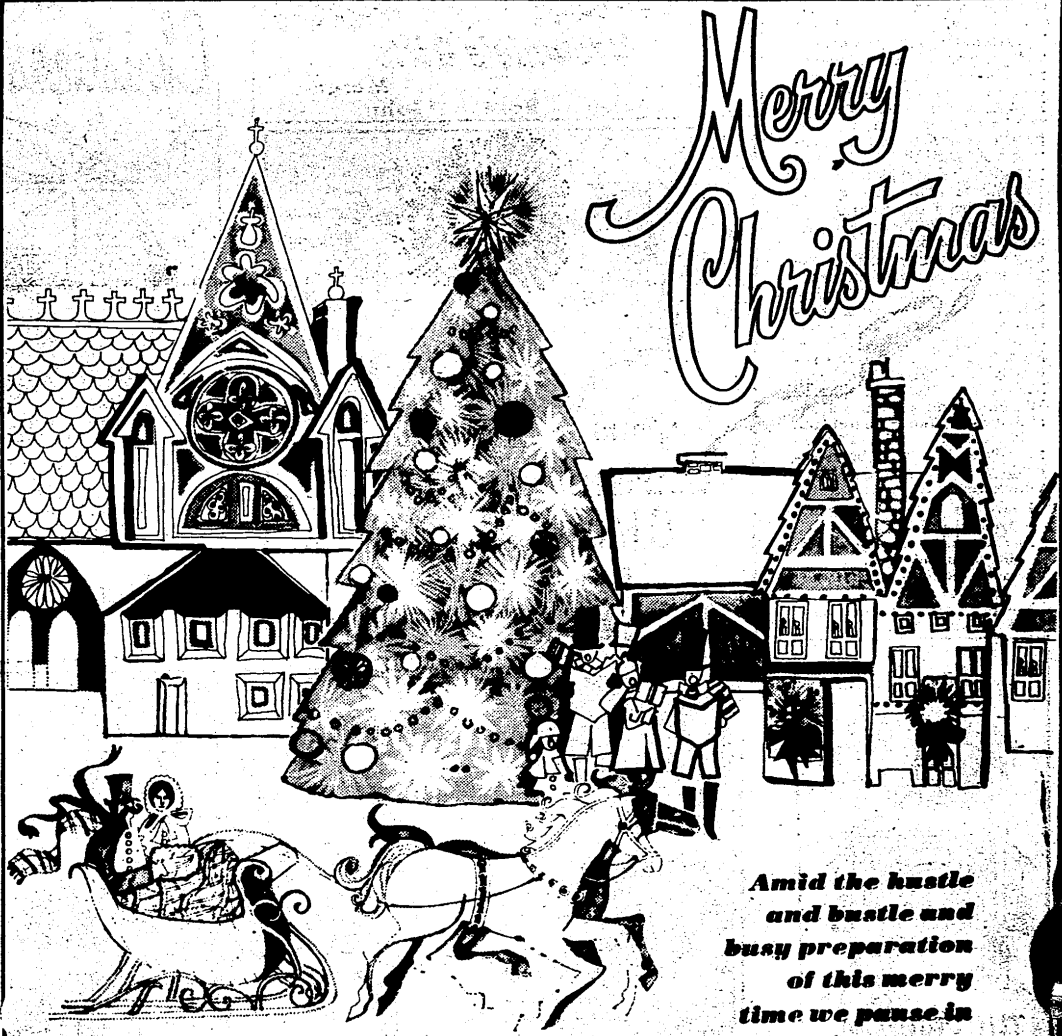

green. Yet these colors have meant different things to different people over the ages. Color has been used as the symbol of abstract ideas from time immemorial.

In early and medieval Christian art colors had a mystic or symbolic meaning. Red indicated passion. In its good sense it was a symbol of divine energy and love and the creative power of the Holy Spirit; in its bad sense it was a sign of hate. In that meaning it became an emblem of Satan.

Emerald green is often the symbol of hope and growth in many Christian paintings.

Colors played an important role in medieval magic and superstition. For example, the famous "philosopher's stone," which the alchemists thought would turn base metals into gold and cure all diseases, was thought to be colored red, according to the Encyclopedia Americana. Red was also a favorite curative color in more recent superstitions.

In Indonesia, the people think a piece of bright red coral will keep its owner's teeth in good order, and there are people everywhere who are sure that a person owning a ruby will live to a ripe old age.

Green was a sacred color among the ancient and medieval Egyptians who wore it as a symbol of hope and the joy

of spring. The Muslims carried this symbolism throughout the Middle East, and the faithful, on returning from the pilgrimage to Mecca, wear a green turban.

Legends Honor St. Nicholas

He's the patron saint of pawnbrokers. He watches over mariners. Since the fourth century, he has been remembered for his generosity.

Many of the legends linked with St. Nicholas, real-life ancestor of today's Santa Claus.

But his most enduring connection is with youth and gifts. In Europe, his feast day, December 6th, has traditionally been an occasion for merriment and gifting.

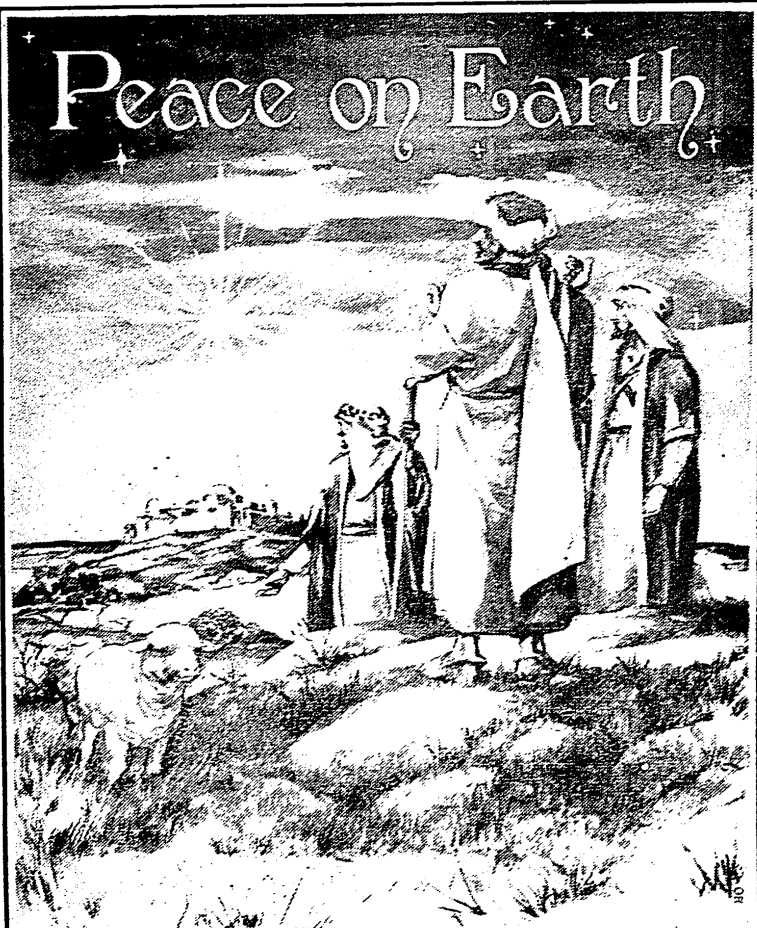

Santa Gets His Garb From Poem, Cartoon

Santa first appeared in his

now-traditional guise as a plump, jovial, white-bearded and pipe-smoking old gentleman — "a right jolly old elf"

— in the poem, "A Visit from St. Nicholas," written by Dr. Clement C. Moore in 1822. Earlier, "Santeclaus" had been pictured dressed as a bishop, in a book called "The Children's Friend," and in Washington Irving's "Knickerbocker History of New York," published in 1809, Santa was said to wear a broad-brimmed hat and huge breeches.

Even Dr. Moore's poem did not, apparently, clothe Santa in a red suit. "He was dressed all in fur from his head to his foot," says the poem.

Santa as he looks today was first sketched by Cartoonist Thomas Nast, in 1869. The cartoon showed Santa in his familiar red garb, smoking a pipe.

Holy Day Helped Comfort Sorrow

Even when Christmas wasn't merry, history shows that the holy holiday has brought comfort and hope into the midst of sorrow and hardship.

Such was an early Christmas in the New World, observed in 1535 at a small fortress on the banks of the St. Charles river near what is now the City of Quebec, Canada.

Jacques Cartier, French explorer, and his band of 110 settlers were beset by cold and hunger, as well as fear of the nearby Indians, whose friendly attitude seemed to have changed. More than half the members of the colony suffered from scurvy.

Bravely, the men celebrated Christmas. Mass was said in a log cabin, at an altar made from a wooden table; evergreen branches decorated the walls; carols were sung and the best of the meager food supplies were used for a "feast."

Christmas Rose Famed in Legend

Blooming in the heart of winter and sometimes even in the snow, the Christmas rose is a plant famed in legend.

According to an old story, a poor little shepherdess had no gift to offer the Christ Child, and so she wept. When her tears touched the ground, flowers sprouted.

Delighted, she plucked an armful and hastened to the Infant. The caress of His fingers turned the petals pink.

Botanists class the Christmas rose as a member of the buttercup family. Native to Southern Europe and western Asia, it has leathery, dark green leaves and large, saucer-shaped flowers with white or rose-tinged sepals, according to The Encyclopedia Americana.

A holly tree grows 15 years before it produces, but its life may be as long as 125 years.

For Kissing

Secular and religious Christmas customs met in the old English "kissing bunch." This evergreen ball had mistletoe, for kissing, hung from the center.

But it also contained small dolls to represent Jesus, Mary and Joseph, as well as an array of fruits and colorful ornaments.

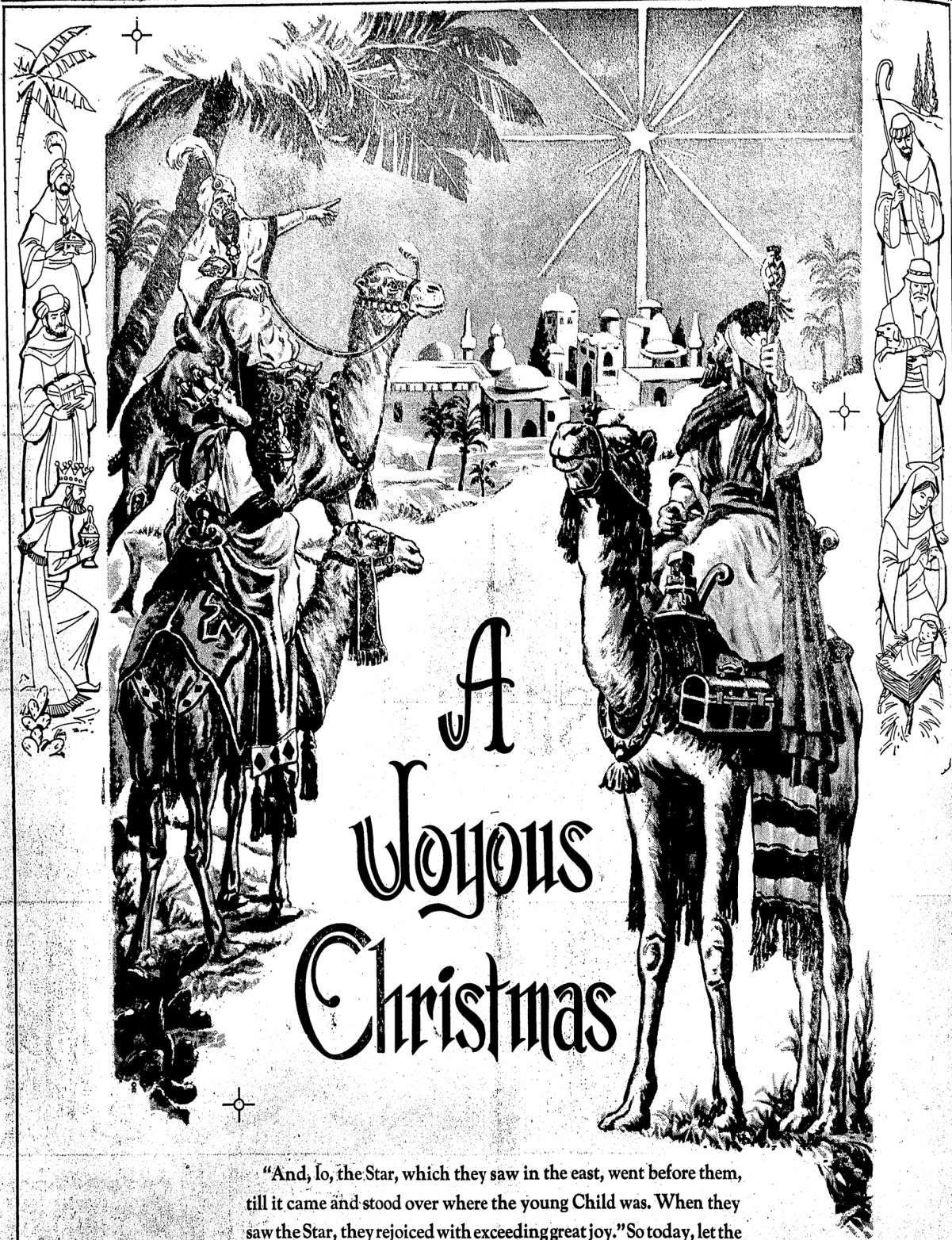
