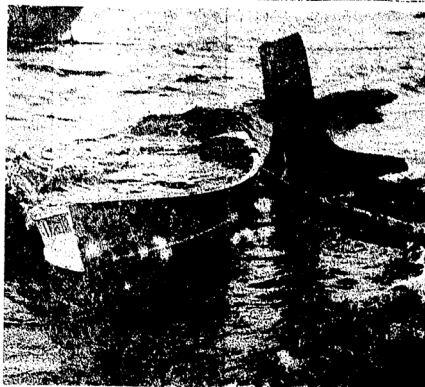

## Rain, high winds combine to cause extensive damage

Winds have combined with heavy rains in the past week to cause extensive damage to the town of Manistique. High winds have blown away docks, and even pose a threat to the Manistique water supply.

A heavy electrical storm Thursday night resulted in one area home being hit by lightning and burning to the ground (see separate story) and caused extensive flooding and washouts in area roads. It also started a sudden rise in the level of Indian

Lake and other area lakes that has resulted in damage to shorelines and dock areas, and sinking some boats.

Thursday's storm caused erosion and flooding of the Thunder Lake road, Riley road and Little Harbor road, and caused the temporary closing of the Floodwood road and Camp Manistique road. County Road Supt. Matt Weber reported, All were open by Wednesday after all county equipment and manpower was utilized. Repairs to many of the roads must be delayed, however, until the flooding subsides, and the public was urged to use extreme care in travel in these rural areas.

The rains that continued over the week and combined with high winds to cause considerable lakelakefront damage. Ironically, Monday evening, while the sun shone brightly in town, strong north winds were pushing the high water levels up against docks and breakwaters at the south end of Indian Lake. (The pictures above were taken Monday evening.)

Clyde Charlier, who operates the brewery that gates and levers control the Indian Lake water level on behalf of the property owners association there, said Tuesday evening that the lake level was a foot and a half above normal, and that the increase had come rapidly since June 10, with a 4.3 foot figure regarded as normal, and a 4.6 figure set as the level by circuit court order, the gauge at the Copenhagen Bridge recorded 5.28 feet Tuesday morning. By evening, however, it had dropped to 5.81, and Charlier said he felt the level had peaked.

This is still about a foot below the record high set in 1959, when the brewery dam was dynamited in an attempt to relieve water levels at the lake. Charlier said the situation now was comparable to a normal spring run-off, but that damage was higher because boats and docks were in place, and high winds added to the pounding.

Both gates on the dam are open now. City Manager Robert Noe said Tuesday he was concerned about the city's water intake at Lake Park being affected by septic tanks flooding over upstream, he said. The high water table was making it impossible for many septic systems to operate normally. Extra chlorine is being added to city water, and the situation is being watched carefully, he said.

## Housing project approved

The city received its second Federal funding week Monday when it was announced that it had been approved for 25 units of rental housing costing \$518,125.

He estimated it would take about 18 months before the first units were completed. Once completed, the units may be sold or rented to qualifying families. Low interest rates are available to purchasers, Noe added.

## Urban Renewal returns!

An almost-forgotten Urban Renewal project for Manistique, filed with the Federal government in December, 1965, was revived last week with announcement from Congressman Philip Ruppe's office that survey and planning funds totaling \$17,141 had been approved for the project.

grams now underway or recently completed could be counted as the city's share.

Ruppe's announcement said the project entails "the rehabilitation and clearance of approximately 81 buildings," and covers 26.5 acres in the downtown area. This central business district is defined in the project as the four-block bounded by Oak, Maple, Main and Pearl Sts., plus the southeast corner of Oak and Maple Sts.

Involvement would be property acquisitions, site clearance and project improvement, sewer improvements, off-street parking and relocation programs. These are described as "necessary for new commercial development and general beautification of the central downtown business district."

Clearance of the Weston Ave. residential area had been included, then dropped, from the original application; however, it is possible that it could be reinstated again.

City officials have been wrestling with the Weston Ave. problem ever since the sewage treatment plant was constructed. Because of construction problems, sanitary sewers could not be extended to this area. Because much of the sewage from these homes empties into Weston Creek and the Manistique River, the city is in violation of state and pollution laws. Councilmen have been figuring ways to either extend the sewer service or move the homes, but both approaches would probably be beyond the city's financial capabilities.

Council will act on the proposal at next Monday night's regular meeting.

## Natural gas delayed again

Prospects of natural gas for Manistique and the eastern Upper Peninsula, so bright when first advanced four years ago, dimmed again this week when the Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. announced cancellation of 12 communities in northern Michigan.

The gas company's argument now is that it is not "economically feasible" to extend service to Manistique. Major projects include the new city hall, senior citizens' low-income housing, the school heating plant, the medical care facility, and the new Engdine school.

The company held the court's costs of rendering natural gas service to nearly a million Michigan citizens have gone up 10 per cent.

The project hit a snag in 1965 when the Canadian government balked at provisions in the contract for the 36-inch pipeline. Work on the line did not actually begin until last spring, and the 36-inch transmission line was

**Electronic speed computer is new State Police device**

Michigan State Police Troopers in the 8th district are undergoing training to qualify as operators of a new electronic speed computer, VASCAR, to be used in patrol car traffic law enforcement starting today.

The officer, by the use of a target vehicle travels a selected distance. Then the officer with on-off switches enters the distance factor as he drives the patrol car over the selected distance. The computer then will give the officer a digital read-out of the target car's average speed. The distance factor also may be "locked" into the computer before the timing of the target vehicle is done. The computer is reported extremely accurate. It is reported in use in more than 30 states.

Two Wisconsin men narrowly escaped drowning in Lake Michigan Sunday evening when their boat overturned about 150 yards from the shore of Sand Bay, on the east side of Big Bay de Noc, near Pyrote State Park.

Merl Kussow, 31, of Green Bay, was taken to Schoolcraft Memorial Hospital after swallowing water and suffering shock in the mishap.

State Police said that he and Paul Kussow, 23, also of Green Bay, were starting to row to shore when the boat, owned by Leo Vercauteren, DePere, Wis., capsized.

They were pulled from the water after about 15 minutes by Henry Dietrak and three sons and Leo Petrusik, all of Pontiac, and G. L. Phillips, son of Birmingham.

Paul Kussow was not injured in the mishap.

**SCHOOLCRAFT VISTA report**

"So I'm a VISTA now... what does that mean?"

That's the question being asked by a group of 40 VISTA trainees who last week began training for VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America). The 40 are part of a "class" of 1,600 which will begin training this summer.

To help them answer their question, VISTA provided six weeks of training, which for this group began with a week of orientation at Michigan State University. I spent the week in East Lansing along with five other VISTAs from Michigan and Ohio to assist with the training program.

The trainees are provided with specific information on various programs and projects they may be working with. The VISTAs meet regularly with the trainees to enable them to draw on our experiences as VISTAs.

Besides discussing specific details of possible programs, speakers before the trainees also spelled out their general views of a VISTA and his work. Some advocated VISTAs helping organize people to work together as a group, using group power to help meet the needs of individual members and the group as a whole. Others suggested that each VISTA work on a much smaller scale -- on a one-to-one basis with individuals and families in an attempt to break the bonds of poverty. A third notion expressed was for VISTAs to set up and provide direct services to low-income families.

There are VISTA projects in all three categories suggested -- and, no doubt, most trainees will find their VISTA year will be a blend of all three.

Ten from the group are now in the Upper Peninsula for the second phase of their training -- a five-week field assignment with the Alger-Maronette Community Action Board.

For this part of training the trainees will work along side of VISTAs and other community action agency personnel. They will also take on individual projects, which are set up to help them become acquainted with the communities in which they are working and living.

Once the training is over, the 10 will move into year-long jobs as VISTAs with the Alger-Marquette agency and the Dickinson-Iron Community Action Agency. (None will be assigned to the three-county area served by the Manistique-Delta-Schoolcraft Community Action Agency.)

Most of the 40 trainees who started their VISTA careers at Michigan State last week are recent college graduates, but there is one couple near retirement age and one-year old Winnie Spencer, who will be working in Ohio.

They came from all parts of the country -- and have joined VISTA for various reasons. Common elements in their motives, however, are a desire to help people, and, at the same time, to grow and learn about themselves.

Both as trainees -- and as full-fledged VISTAs -- they will have to build their knowledge of three areas: (1) they must know the communities they live in, (2) they must know the agency they are assigned to, and (3) they must know themselves.

Each VISTAs job will develop from the interaction of these knowledges.

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

The Commission determined the company's rates on the assumption that the prime rate for bank loans was 6.2 percent. "There is no dispute, however," the company said, "that on the day the order was issued the prime rate was 7.5 percent, just three days later it was increased to 8.5 percent."

"The Commission clearly erred in failing to fix rates for the future upon the basis of actual interest costs, and in refusing to consider a 20 percent increase in this type of interest charges."

The Commission's order allowed the company a rate of return of 6.67 percent. The rate of return is the amount a utility is permitted to earn on its investment, out of which it must meet its interest costs on bonds and bank loans, and pay dividends to stockholders.

"The allowance of a rate of return of only 6.68 percent, when the cost of capital is at an all time high -- when, for example, the prime interest rate which the Company must pay for money borrowed from banks is 8.5 percent -- is arbitrary and without foundation," the utility told the Court.

In 1960 (when Michigan Consolidated rates were last increased) the Commission concluded, Michigan Consolidated should be permitted to earn a rate of return of 6.66 percent. It is common knowledge that money costs have soared since that time.

As a result of basic errors, the Commission determined a level of earnings for Michigan Consolidated that is far too low to permit it to raise the capital necessary to provide the homes and industries of this state with the natural gas they desire and require."

post offices after July 1. Postmaster John Kelly announced this week.

The maximum parcel-post weight limit was increased from 30 pounds on shipments between the larger post offices in the third through eighth parcel post zones. (More than 150 miles.) On packages sent locally and one office in parcel post zones one and two, the ceiling has been 40 pounds. The maximum size of packages sent between all first-class offices remains 72 inches in combined length and girth.

The size limit on parcels sent to or from smaller offices, rural or star routes, military post offices, and all Alaskan and Hawaiian post offices stays at 70 pounds, with a combined length and girth of 100 inches. Postmaster John Kelly added.

Public Law 89-593, enacted September 20, 1966, authorized the postal service to increase weight and size limits on shipments between larger cities. On July 1 of 1970 and 1971, the length and girth limits are scheduled to rise to 78 and 84 inches, respectively, on shipments between first-class post offices.

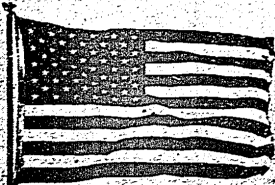

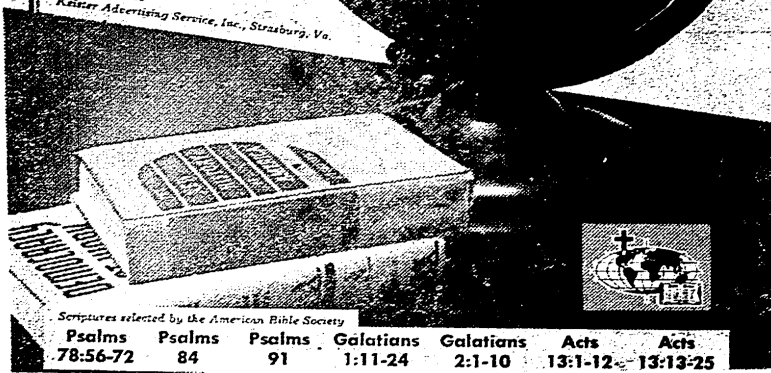
