



Michigan State Police Troop-ers in the 8th district are uners in the 8th district are undergoing training to qualify as operators of a new electronic speed computer, VASCAR, to be used in partor at rating about July 1, according to Capitain Robert Bilgen, commander of the 8th District.

The 8th district includes the Manistique post,



Frequently dietary deficiency is blamed, but cirrhosis seldom, plained, out cirrnosis seldom, if eyer, occurs to non-alcoholics suffering from malnutrition. It is a known fact that "boozers" often have faulty eating habits, but the blame is liquor, not lack of food.

In laboratory tests, it has been found that liquor may dambeen found that uquor may cam-age the liver of a laboratory animal, but the animal never gets cirrhosis. It seems that alcohol exerts this unique effect only on man.



In a way it's like the people who go to church every Sunday and sleep through the sermon, or placidly nod in agreementas the minister discusses Old Testament theology and fulminates against sin and corruption and dishonesty. They don't go to church to be disturbed by controversial sermons thoughts. They want to be com-forted, not challenged.

This complacent Christian has a good deal in common with the Professional Patriot. Both embrace popular causes with evangelistic fervor and enthusiastic indignation, the first to piously proclaim their selfrightousness, the second to pounce upon those who dare to question the lessons of history and who may have the temerity to seek new answers to old

questions.
Hell hath no fury like the Professional Patriot on the scent of a Communist plot to take over our schools or our churches or the Federal Reserve System or infiltrate the Humor in Uniform section of the Reader's Digest.

By any reasonable standard I consider myself as a loyal and patriotic citizen. I have always paid my taxes, voted in every election, and served overseas with the Army in World War II. If this isn't enough to satisfy those zealous scrutinizers and inquisitors, I can point to an FBI security clearance to han-dle Top Secret classified material, picked up during wartime service in the art of cryptography--encoding and decoding messages--which is sort of a professional certification that been a communist.

In spite of all this I am per-

iodically confronted by those bright-eyed breast thumpers who want to send me straight to Russia because I regard the war in Vietnam as a foolish, empty, obstinate exercise in futility: because I question the leadership of our nation in sending young men to die for an un-certain cause in an uncertain corner of the world; because I insist that the greater betrayal is to attempt to "save face" by staying in a lost cause rather than saving lives by admitting our errors and withdrawing to allow communism to cope with the continual corruption and opportunistic greed that seems to be the predominant features of the democracy we are attempt-

ing to save. We were wrong to go into Vietnam in the first place. We were wrong to persist and escalate. We are wrong in staying. It is an unjust, useless war that is not only alienating many of our former friends in the world of nations, but is causing our own youth to throw down the gauntlet to the establishment in question of the old values and the old ways that led us into Vietnam in the first place.

So I will not pound the drum and wave the flag on this Independence Day of 1969, Instead I will look back in the pages of the history of this nation and reassure myself that despite our mistakes, despite our misdirection, despite our lapses, this nation still holds the best record available for de-dication to the principles of liberty and justice for all.

We are not perfect. We never have been, and being human, never will be. But our nation, on this Fourth of July, still offers man's best hope for finding himself and his destiny. We do not need the Professional Patriots and their shouting to remind us that My Country 'Tis of Thee, Sweet land of Liberty.



post offices after July 1, Postmaster John Kelly announced this week.

The maximum parcel-post weight limit was increased from 30 pounds on shipments between the larger post offices in the third through eighth parcel post zones. (More than 150 miles.) On packages sent locally and to offices in parcel post zones one and two, the ceiling has been 40 pounds. The maximum size of packages sent between all first-class offices remains 72 inches in combined length and girth.

The size limit on parcels sent to or from smaller offices, rural or star routes, military post offices, and all Alaskan and Hawaiian post offices stays at 70 pounds, with a combined length and girth of 100 inches, Postmaster John Kelly added.

Public Law 83-593, enacted September 20, 1966, authorized the postal service to increase weight and size limits on shipments between larger cities, On July 1 of 1970 and 1971, the length and girth limits are scheduled to rise to 78 and 84 inches, respectively, on shipments between first-class post offices.


