Street paving projects cut

A paving bid that was higher than expected, plus the possibility of future financial commitments, has led City Council to cut their planned street paving program for this year almost in half.

Council had originally planned to spend \$57,000 improving this year, using two years of anticipated street revenues. Only one bid for the work was received, however, and City Manager Robert Noe suggested that the work be cut to \$30,000 worth, still using two years revenues.

The single bid of \$12.80 a ton was received from Howell Construction Co. of Indian River, Noe said he had anticipated a lower bid because the firm's hot mix plant is currently set up on the old Ann Arbor ferry docks for use in the US-2 paving contract that the company has this summer. Their bid on the state job was for \$9.80 a ton, he said.

Four streets are involved in the proposed paving.

Original plans had called for Houghton Ave. to be capped from Deer St. north to Center St. Under the new proposal, however, it will be capped only as far north as the Soo Line tracks. Arbutus Ave. will be paved from Bangs to Steuben St. instead of from US-2 to Cattaraugus.

The original plan to pave Maple St. from E. 16th St. to the new city hall and Main St. between River and Pearl Sts. will be retained.

Noe also recommended that curbing be installed on Houghton, Arbutus, Maple and Main Sts., where the paving is to be done. A special assessment will be levied to cover the cost.

Council passed an ordinance setting up a process for special assessments, as allowed under the new city charter. Mayor Leo DeMars voted against the ordinance, saying he felt it penalized the taxpayers by allowing high assessments on undeveloped property. Under the old charter such assessments were limited to 25 per cent of the assessed valuation of the parcel.

The city still plans to go ahead with the other portion of their summer street improvement program—sealcoating. Noe said that plans now call for Second, Third and Fourth, Caribou and Cattaraugus Sts. to be sealcoated this summer.

At the meeting, N. First St., appeared before the board to request sealcoating of that street in his area, particularly Badger St. between First and Fifth Sts. He noted that the street received heavy traffic as an alternate route to the Riverside area. Council said that funds for the project were not available this year.

City Attorney William Hood reported on a telephone conversation he had with Fred McIntyre, vice-president-sales, Michigan Consolidated Gas Co.

Pilot project in second phase

For the second phase of the pilot project aimed at the utilization of woods were outlined last afternoon at a regular meeting of the board of directors of Upper Great Lakes Timber, Inc., held at the Surf.

The pilot firm was organized two months ago as a development project for Michigan and Wisconsin. The Upper Great Lakes Commission, The Federation of new techniques to help the economy of the area, which included the use of Wisconsin and Minnesota. S. Hololik of Manistique is president of the firm, said

that the first year's operation was spent in the running of a lumber camp with mechanized equipment, and in an evaluation of the operation located in the northern part of Marquette County.

Two management appointments for the second phase of the project were approved at Thursday's session. Peter C. Grievess of Newberry has been named as general manager, with William A. Henriksen of Marquette as assistant. Grievess is a 1959 Michigan State University graduate, and has worked in Alabama and Wisconsin, with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and with MSU Extension. Henriksen is a 1951 MSU graduate and has worked

with the U.S. Forest Service and Cliffs-Dow in Marquette. The two men will set up demonstrations of new techniques and new equipment that have been developed, following an evaluation gained by investigation of logging, harvesting and marketing techniques from coast to coast and in Canada. "We're aiming at the total utilization of our forests," explained Hololik, adding that this means that all species common to the area can be utilized, instead of only selected species. Ultimate goal of such a project would be to induce a wood processing plant to locate in this area and to use these substantial species that are now largely unharvested.

Attending Thursday's meeting here with Hololik were Myrton M. Riggs, Cheboygan Daily Tribune, director and treasurer;

Board asks prosecutor to enforce state Plat Act

A resolution urging Prosecutor G.S. Johnson to begin strict enforcement of the state Plat Act was passed by the Board of Supervisors at their July meeting Tuesday night. Johnson had requested direction in the matter because of increasing problems with violations.

The state law says that not more than four descriptions may be sold out of a single parcel of land within a 12-month period without platting. Tax Director Harold Peters presented a report listing violations in all eight townships in the county. These have accumulated over the past 20 to 25 years, he said, and are now becoming a serious problem that can cloud titles for people not purchasing land, and also make it difficult for property owners who wish to comply with the law to dispose of their property.

Briggs said Tuesday morning that some private, not county roads, because the land they serve has never been platted, he pointed out. It was also noted that some township supervisors have not accepted plats that have been presented. The unavailability of supervisors was also cited as a problem. Peters noted that in some townships the descriptions overlap and sometimes duplicate, and that metes and bounds descriptions are often too vague to determine the actual location of the parcel involved. He cited one area north of Seney where one property owner had built a cabin on his neighbor's property.

Housing project approved

A tentative starting date of Aug. 15 for Manistique's recently approved low income family housing project has been set by City Manager Robert Noe.

Noe reported last week he had received approval of the 25-unit project costing \$548,000 from Housing and Urban Development officials in Chicago. City Council last night took the first step in the job by approving plans to purchase the old Hewitt Grocery property on N. Maple St., as the site for

the project. The building will be torn down, and bids in the housing received. Noe said he will invite 18 three-bedroom units and two two-bedroom and five four-bedroom. The city is also hopeful of instituting a home-ownership program to enable residents to purchase their homes under a special financing plan.

Tests of water samples taken from Indian Lake are continuing this week, with final results due by next Tuesday as the pollution problem along the lake's southern beaches eased last week.

The ban on swimming at Indian Lake State Park was lifted late Friday afternoon. The beach was closed Monday when samples taken along the south shore of the lake showed a high bacteria count. The pollution was centered in an area starting at Harrison Beach and extending west past the state park.

County Sanitarian Boyd Briggs had theorized that the heavy rains and high water levels caused septic systems at the lake to fail. Briggs said Tuesday morning that samples just received from the State laboratory at Powers were "looking favorable," and were well below the pollution level. Water samples are being taken daily and driven to Powers, he said, until the complete testing cycle requires 36 hours. City Recreation swim buses resumed their regular daily schedule Monday, State Park Manager Vic Haas said that the park, where attendance had dropped because of the swimming ban, was once again full.

Cyclist dies in accident

Sgt. James L. Babbitt, 23, of Thompson, home on leave after overseas service in Thailand, was killed Monday at 11:49 p.m. when his motorcycle struck a State Police said that Babbitt was traveling north on County Road 483 in the village when he missed a slight curve and ran off the road. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Schoolcraft Memorial Hospital after being taken there by Public Safety ambulance. The accident occurred 100 feet south of Mill St. Babbitt was awaiting orders to go to K. I. Sawyer Air Base near Gwin.

Park to shut down

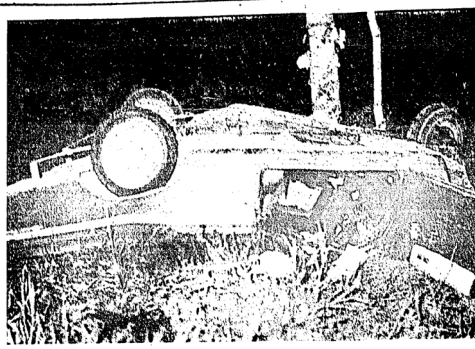

development, county low-income housing, city low income city sewage plant to meet state phosphate removal requirements.

Other projects on the 26-item list, in order, were: Sewage treatment for major industry (Manistique Pulp and Paper Co.), city water filtration plant, city off-street parking, senior-center high school expansion, remodeling and development, county nursing care facility, industrial site development in the city, by the LC, and in conjunction with the airport, a new court house, Soney fish hatchery, Indian Lake sewage treatment, US-2 development, vocational education for Co., county road storage facility, armory, county building codes, Soney museum and land project, oblong quarry development to benefit street improvement and water sports development, and natural gas.

It was stressed that the list would be revised and added to periodically.

Russell Tennant of the Civil Defense committee presented a report on shelter spaces in the county. He said that facilities at inland and the paper mill have been added, and that there are now 2,013 spaces in large-size shelters now available, with 1,700 to be added during the next year. In addition, 3,877 home shelter spaces are available, he said. 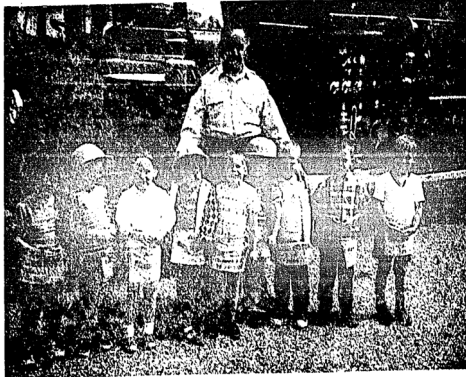

who said that he could not conceive of the possibility of Manistique getting gas this year. Flood told the council he felt that the gas company has a legal commitment to commute. The possibility of having another utility to furnish service or setting up a municipality for distribution was also presented.

Flood added that because of the strong case for legal uniformity to come here there was the possibility of a suit against the firm to recover damages caused by the clear. He added he felt the city was being used by the company to help promote their efforts to secure an additional rate increase.

In other action, Council heard a complete report on the urban renewal planning grant of \$17,141 allocated to the city, and are planning a meeting later this month with Max Pullers of the planning firm of Vilcaan-Leman.

Approved a one per cent collection fee for county and school tax bills handled by the city treasurer, with the fee to be

increased by three per cent after Feb. 15. This will bring in approximately \$2,500 annually. Heard Jack Weaver outline a proposal for a half-mile-long mobile track that would be located between the quarry and Cardinal Field, and gave him informal approval to go ahead if it is determined that the city is the owner of all the land involved.

Approved the exercising of the option to buy the old Health Grocery property, site of the new low-income housing project, from the State Savings Bank at a cost of \$9,500.

Marvin Van Eyck, engineer with the firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley, reported to the council on his preliminary report on expansion of the sewer treatment plant. He said he met with officials of Manistique Pulp and Paper Co. to discuss possible joint treatment of wastewater. He also said in question of sewer expansion articles—mainly, whether or not the Indian Lake area should be included in planning—was decided. He and the council in several sessions of the regular meeting. Council agreed to order a piece of city-owned property just west of the commission building. Ed Sault has offered to purchase the parcel.

HELSINKI, FINLAND JULY 8: We have been here for only two days but are already finding our way around and enjoying every bit of it. The flight on a new Finnair jet took eight hours from Detroit to Helsinki. We flew just south of Greenland and Iceland

-- the shortest route because of the curvature of the earth! If you don't believe me, try it on a globe. We had sunlight throughout the trip and arrived here in bright sunlight at 5:20 a.m. Helsinki time, which is seven hours ahead of ours at home.

Almost everyone on the plane was Finnish or of Finnish descent. Some found old friends. The crew were all young people from Finland or of Finnish descent. The meals were excellent and it seemed they were serving something all the time.

We're living in a student dormitory that is converted into a hotel for the summer months. The building itself is old but the furniture and furnishings are modern. Our furniture is of beautiful teakwood. Units of two bedrooms have privacy -- their own entrance and bath. It is very conveniently located to the downtown area. Everything seems to be within walking distance for us.

We went down to the farmers' market this morning. They have everything for sale from flowers, fruits, vegetables, fresh and salted fish to home crafts and weaving of all kinds. Ripe strawberries are in season and they looked just wonderful. Very small new potatoes, relished by all good fins, were on sale too. Language has been a barrier

to some extent but we always manage to be understood or find someone who speaks English. Understanding menus and ordering food has been the most difficult. We usually don't know quite what we're getting but thus far it has been good.

There are many coffee shops that serve coffee and delicious pastries, also a Finnish ale. Others serve full meals.

We plan to shop tomorrow and then I'll be flying to Vaasa. From there I'll be renting a car to drive to Ylikarva where my father was born.

We'll also be taking two tours that should be very interesting.

I'll try to tell you about them at another time.

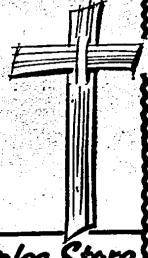
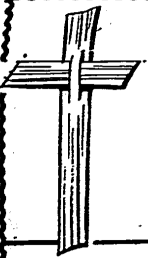
