





#### Vocational needs

THERE ARE SIGNS that we are beginning to recognize a fact that should long have been obvious: We need to re-direct the emphasis of our public schools to the point where adequate vocational training is made available to that large majority of youngsters who will not have the means or the opportunity to continue their schooling beyond the high school level.

We have made a mistake in emphasizing scholastic programs for the college-bound, and in placing a premium on a rather arbitrary and capricious systems of grades that range inflexibly from A through F.

Experience has shown that a young person who is given vocational courses and job experience as part of his education is far less likely than the untrained to face frustrating or even dangerous un-employment periods after his college days are ov-

Unfortunately, millions of youths still leave American high schools and colleges without what educators call "salable skills." Many adults, too, need opportunities to retrain in order to keep up with technological change.

We are encouraged by the plans of the Manistique Area Schools to start a vocational cooperative training program in retail and distributive fields next fall. We were also encouraged to hear of the possi-bility that vocational classes would be available through Bay de Noc Community College next fall.

This latter prospect, however, still faces a substantial hurdle. State funding will be required if the program is to be offered, and state funding currently hinges on the success or failure of Senate Bill 53.

Let's hope the state doesn't follow the lead of the Federal government in this question.

Congress last year approved, by a rare unanimous vote, a bill to encourage expansion and undating of vocational education. In the Vocational Education Amendments Act of 1968 Congress authorized federal support to about \$3 billion over a four-year period.

Educators hailed the act as a "new charter for vocational education."

But the bright promise of this act now appears dimmed, at least for a time. Congressional delay in the adoption of the budget for the new fiscal year which began July 1 is expected to put off ap-propriation of authorized funds until September or October. This is too late to get new programs going this school year.

More serious, however, are the expected cuts. President Nixon's budget recommendations, if ap-proved by Congress, would reduce appropriations for vocational education to about one-third of those authorized in the act.

'It is one thing for Congressman and state Legisators to pass bills and resolutions offering high-sounding words of encouragement. It is quite a different thing to back up these words with ade-quate appropriations.

It is certainly a cruel hoax to hold out the promise of support for something that is needed so badly, then to back off at the last moment when it comes time to put up the money.

Let's hope Congress acts more boldy to supplement their original intent, and let's hope that our state Legislature also acts boldly on S-53, so that our modest local program can get underway this fall.

I sort of lose track of what it was they were trying to say when I regard the prospect of beautiful Indian Lake being declared a cesspool unfit for swimming and the possibility that wells for the hundreds of homes along the lakeshore are now contaminated.

#### Pollution problems

Pollution? Here, in God's Country, the beautiful, unspoil-ed, remote Upper Peninsula? How ridiculous. Everyone knows that it can't happen here. Only it did.

I don't mean to be pushing the panic button here, or over-react to a problem that should eventually clear up, at least temporarily, by itself.

I do mean to use the occa sion to point up again what has been said here many times... Unless we adopt reasonable and

adequate methods of control and in God's disposal, we will eventually ruin the very beauty that we tout so highly as one of our great assets Indian Lake property owners

may not be very happy with the prospect, but the only permanent solution to their pollution problem is a sanitary sewer system. This will be expensive, but it is possible that if they plan now to tie in with the Manpian now to the in with the Man-istique city system they could avoid the even more expensive outlay for a sewage treatment plant. The city should have

more than a passing interest in such a proposal, for the municipal water supply is located just a short distance downriver from the lake outlet. If Indian Lake is permanently polluted, so is the city water supply.

Zoning regulations that pre-

vent cottages from being crowded side by side and sanitary regulations that require prior approval for the installation of any septic tank system will also help to control the problem. It can't cure existing problems, but it can prevent them from

getting worse.
Gus Scholle, president of the
Michigan AFL-CIO and chairman of the Michigan Natural Resources Commission, took off on the subject of pollution on on the subject of politicion in his usual free-swinging sty-le recently when he talked to the 32nd annual convention of Michigan United Conservation.

"We're just great!" he com-mented. "We've already dis-troyed one Great Lake---Lake Erie---and three others are going. We just have one to go and we'll contaminate it if you just give us enough time."

He said the solution to help reverse "this lousy contamina-tion" can come only from groups like MUCC facing their Congressmen and legislators eyeball to eyeball and telling them they lack the courage to face up to these problems!" he said

Scholle is correct in pointscholle is correct in pointing the finger at state and federal officials. The problem of pollution has grown to the point where it can no longer be controlled by local agencies. That's one reason the Clean Water bond issue passed last fall is so important...it will help to provide the funds so badly needed in many areas for waste water treatment.

Good weather, the lowering of the lake levels and water table, and the healing forces of nature will probably com-bine to eliminate the pollution problem at Indian Lake thisyear. That's not what we are worried about.

Our contern is with next year, and five years from now. and 10 years.

Our concern is not just with Indian Lake, but all of our wa-ter resources, inland lakes, streams and the Great Lake

Our concern is that we will once again put the problem on the back shelf and forget it. Like so many of our problems, it will not go away just because it is ignored.

Too many of us have convinc ed ourselves that pollution is only to be found in crowded, urban areas. Perhaps last week's incident at Indian Lake will help us to realize that they are our problems as well.






