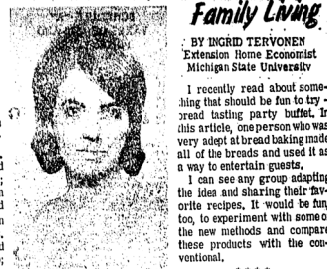

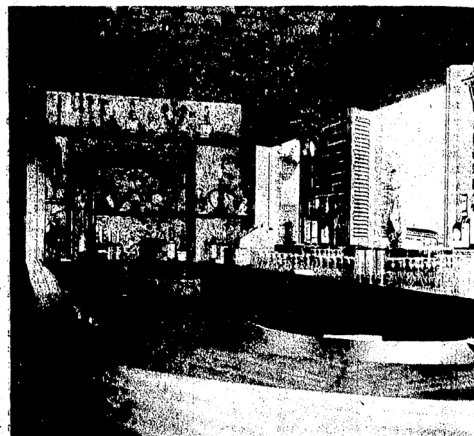

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Highway Needs

LATE LAST MONTH leaders from the two top Upper Peninsula development groups held a joint meeting in Marquette aimed at coordinating their efforts on behalf of this area.

Out of that meeting came a determination to work together on improved highways and transportation for the Upper Peninsula.

The two organizations are, of course, Operation Action-U.P., and UPCAP, the Upper Peninsula Committee for Area Progress.

In explaining the decision to go after better highways, William Wilson, director of Operation Action-U.P. had this to say:

"The reasons were many and obvious.

"Since the completion of the 50-odd miles of I-75, little more has been done than long overdue maintenance of the existing system. The Highway Department will not contest the statement that less than 1 per cent of the state's construction funds are spent in the U.P. Penetrating editorials have been written on the subject, critical of both the Department's past program and the wish-wishy attitudes or splintered efforts of the people in the U.P. The Association of Chambers of Commerce of Upper Michigan in supporting a north-south highway seemed to be at odds with the U.S-2 Association and the past administration of the Department was prone to throw this back at the U.P.: 'Until you can agree on what you need up there, don't come to us.'

"The results have been evident in the past and are reflected in the U.P. highway program presently planned for the next five (really three) years.

"In 1969 a portion of US-11 will be relocated in Houghton and a bridge will be built over the Paint River on US-111 north of Crystal Falls.

"In 1970 two contracts will be let: one to rebuild US-111 between Crystal Falls and Amasa and to relocate US-15 between US-26 and Ontonagon.

"In 1971 four contracts are scheduled:

1. M-28 between Trout Creek and Bruce Crossing.
2. Six miles of M-28 west of Munising.
3. Ten miles of US-2 east of Rapid River.
4. M-26 from US-11 to Eagle River.

"No major projects are scheduled for 1972 and 1973.

"Are these really major projects? How would all of this '5-year construction program' compare in cost with just a single major overpass-interchange downstate?

"It's abundantly clear that we are not getting our fair share of highway construction. Why? Don't we need any more, don't we deserve any more?"

"It will be the joint endeavor of the (UPCAP-Operation Action U.P.) Coordinating Council to show just as clearly the immediate and long-term need for adequate highways in the U.P. and indeed in the Upper Great Lakes Region.

"To be successful this endeavor must involve the federal Department of Transportation, the several Departments of State Highways, our National and State Legislators, commerce and industry, and the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission. This, the Coordinating Council is willing to attempt, and with the proper support, will achieve."

Mutiny on the Lollipop?

According to my Horatio Hornblower readings, British Navy captains used to be in a constant sweat about finding enough warm bodies to fill their ship's muster before they sailed.

Instead of draft boards, they relied on press gangs who went out to scour the countryside and bring back anyone remotely capable of serving aboard ship, and the result was they ended up with some pretty weird characters in the crew. Trying to make sailors out of farmers, blacksmiths and green grocer men was enough to drive any Royal Navy captain to despair, and when they were thrown in with the convicts and the lunatics that were also victims of the press gangs, it's a wonder that Britannia even managed to get underway, let alone rule the waves.

Tony's Topics

Carl Sandburg called slang "language which spits on its hands and goes to work." Perhaps that is why many of us are attracted to the slang, colloquialisms, regional expressions and the "verbal hand me downs" of other cultures. They work!

Dr. Kenneth Roy Johnson has studied the language of the Negro ghetto. He speaks it with the same ease as he delivers his lectures in conventional white talk. He makes his point well - teachers don't understand the ghetto kids, because they don't understand their language. He has convinced 25 large city school districts of the soundness of his proposition. They are paying him as a consultant to teach the teachers to understand Negro ghetto talk.

Dr. Johnson defines language as "the systematic sounds people make with their vocal cords." This along with the response to them becomes the major communication system of a culture. But, a sub-culture deviates from the dominate culture and language is a barrier. Dr. Johnson is working hard to remove them.

He explains the Negro communicative system is intricate. The Negroes have six tone levels while the white people use only four. There is nothing in the dominate culture which corresponds to the happy, excited or angry Negro falsetto.

He continues, "It is well known among linguists that a very significant element in a culture will get a wide variety of definitive references." For example the Eskimos have 26 different words for snow.

The Negro has more words for white people than white people do. They also have more words for black than white people. The differences in skin color has made a greater difference in their lives and the number of terms reflects this.

The word "blood" means another Negro. "Pearl" means a beautiful white woman and a "sapphire" is a beautiful black woman. A "Miss Ann" is a white woman who is always looking down her nose at others. "Members" means how many Negroes are there in the organization.

My favorite is "rib." A "rib" is the woman to which a man is romantically attached: There is a firmness in this Biblical reference.

The Negro youth is accused by his white teacher of being ungrammatical. He's grammatical - it's just that the Negro grammar isn't standard English, but it is systematic and consistent. The Negro will say in the verb to be "I talkin' to you" (meaning right now I am talking to you), "I be talkin' to you" (meaning I am talking to you habitually and at a particular time), "I been talkin' to you" (meaning I am talking to you all the time.)

Dr. Johnson's point is, we don't understand the people, because we don't understand the language. But, the language is habitual, consistent, systematic and it has to be recognized as such, and not as bad language.

Educators are going to have to overcome these barriers and to work together to develop a standard English in the disadvantaged child without giving him the notion that he is inferior and ignorant just because he speaks a different language.

CHEDDAR CHEESE IS GOOD! And it can be used in so many ways. You can use it with, after, before or in between meals. How about bread and cheese for breakfast? This is a familiar combination in many foreign countries.

How many kinds of cheese sandwiches do you make? Use your imagination on combina-

tions. Will it be a broiled open-face sandwich of cheddar cheese and bacon strips. Or for something really good, top the cheese with a slice of tomato, then the bacon and broil. I love a hot dog filled with cheddar cheese strips, then wrapped in bacon and broiled.

We have cheese appetizers, cheese with vegetables, cheese salads, cheese main dishes, cheese dips, cheese spreads, cheese breads and apple pie with a chunk of cheddar cheese.

TO STORE CHEDDAR CHEESE - keep it in the warmest part of the refrigerator. It will keep for several weeks if well wrapped to keep it from drying.

Mold on any cheese is harmless. Just scrape it off.

Cheddar cheese can be frozen for as long as six months. Keep the pieces relatively small - less than a pound and less than two inches thick. Freezing may cause the cheese to be crumbly but it doesn't affect the flavor.

NEVER SERVE IT COLD. Room temperature brings out the full, rich flavor of cheddar cheese. Take your choice of mild, mellow aged or sharp.

Letters to the Editor

To the Editor:

Late last month Governor Milliken said, "Just as many of our problems are in the urban areas, much of our potential is in Upper Michigan -- in both peninsulas. In concentrating on areas with the greatest problems, we must not neglect areas of great potential."

In his opening months as Governor, Bill Milliken has hit the nail squarely on the head. He has exhibited a concern and optimism about our future and has already begun to breath life into his words. Last weekend Mr. Milliken made a flying tour of the Upper Peninsula communities to talk with local citizens and gain first-hand information to assist in the orderly development of our resources. Before that he appointed the nine members of the first Great Lakes Fishery Advisory Committee. Four members of that committee are from the 11th Congressional District: William Fochtman of Charlevoix,

Melvin Sellman of Manistique, Roy Jensen of Escanaba, and Richard Hagen of St. Ignace.

The State and the Federal Governments are working on a variety of projects to turn back the tide of history depleting our countryside areas while overcrowding our cities. Many of the federal projects with which I deal are administered by the State, such as Farmers Home Administration loans, Small Business loans, and highway funds. Other Federal programs, like the Office of Economic Opportunity grants, must be approved by the Governor. The need for close cooperation between the Governor and Congressman -- and understanding of our problems by the Governor -- is critical.

The overall potential of Northern Michigan staggers the imagination. Tolls on the Mackinac Bridge are down, the coho are biting, and 100,000 snowmobiles race across the Michigan landscape. The opportunity

for us to share increasingly in the fruits of the annual billion dollar tourist trade in this state is tremendous. There will be no manna from heaven. Continued growth will take hard work, understanding and cooperation by local citizens, private companies, the Federal -- and State-- government. It is essential that our Governor care about Northern Michigan. It is fortunate that Bill Milliken is our Governor.



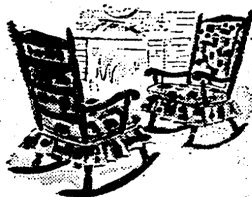
