# Chamber dinner is held

Reports on past actions, comments and future goals were heard at the annual dinner meeting of the Top O' Lake Michigan Chamber of Commerce, held last Wednesday evening at the Surf.

More than 70 members attended the meeting. Tourist dollars make up more than one-half of Schoolcraft County's retail sales volume, 110 members.

This county depends on outside efforts to sell and promote the area. The Chamber is proposing a 10 per cent assessment on membership dues to pay for a special advertising program in metropolitan areas.

"We must reinvest our profits into the growth of our community and the growth of the Chamber of Commerce," he said. "We should not dwell on the mistakes of the past, but look forward to the future. We must keep up with the growth of America."

He predicted the ultimate need for a full-time director to work on industrial development as well as tourism.

Mrs. Jeanne Larson, co-chairman of the membership committee, reported that the current drive has now enlisted 154 members, and that they are hopeful of reaching a goal of 200 members yet this year.

Clyde Strasler, Chamber treasurer, reported total receipts of \$12,844.13 in 1968, and a balance of \$3,999.87 at the end of the year.

**Chiefs defeat Neegaunee**

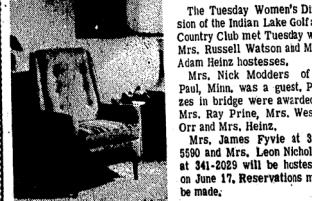

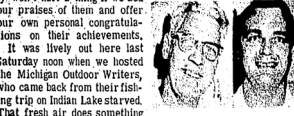

Ex-resident dies in rescue

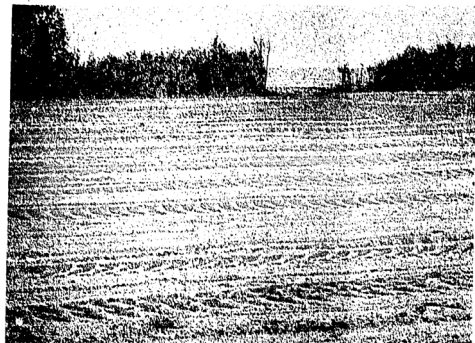

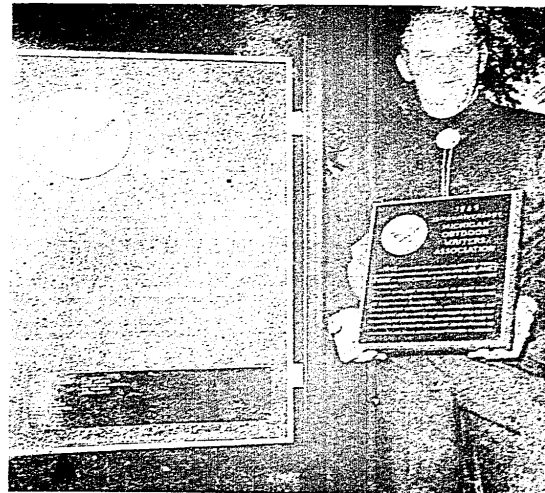

Graduation day

THIS IS THE TIME OF YEAR when newspaper editors sit down at their typewriters and prepare several thousand well-chosen words of advice to graduates everywhere.

There is nothing wrong with this, particularly, as it gives the editor a chance to sound off on a wide variety of subjects, but there is the sneaking suspicion that most graduates, at this particular point in time and in their lives, either fail to read the words of wisdom or worse yet, fail to take proper notice and pay the proper reverence.

This editor, at least for this year, has decided on a new approach.

Instead of discussing the cold, cruel world with the graduates, we will this week discuss the graduates with the cold, cruel world. In a nutshell, they may be ready for us, but are we ready for them?

Each year we dress a graduating class in robes and mortarboard, orate at them, and then hand them a slip of paper that tells them they have completed a prescribed course of study successfully. Some people will assume that this act is symbolic of the completion of education. Unfortunately, some of the people who assume this will be the graduates themselves.

Each graduate enters this new phase of life charged with enthusiasm and the irrepressible optimism of youth that enables them to think in terms of changing the world. Sometimes we older people are inclined to smile knowingly at this attitude, and be rather condescending about such enthusiasm, but fortunately, the youngsters pay very little attention to us.

We may be cynical about changing the world, but we should also be realistic. The world is changing, and the important thing is to work to make that change for the better instead of the worse.

We are inclined to be skeptical because our efforts at changing the world, which started with our own graduation 10, 20 or 50 years ago, does not seem to have met with any notable success. Yet are we prepared to admit that our world of 1969 is not a better world than that of 30 years ago?

Man and his civilization have both advanced and retreated during that span of years, and if we are to profit by experience, we should at least now recognize that changes of any consequence are not accomplished overnight. Sometimes they seem to come with agonizing slowness, while others seem to overwhelm us with frightening speed.

Our Class of 1969 will discover the same thing as they make their way into our world. The odds are that they will be better prepared to cope with these changes than we were.

And if we tell our graduates not to expect to change the world overnight, we should also be prepared to recognize that we cannot expect these youngsters to change overnight as well. The passage of time does not necessarily bring wisdom, but it does bring a sense of proportion and values and perspectives that are achieved no other way.

The Class of 1969 may not control the changes of 1970 for our world, but they have the potential for change in 1975 and 1990 and beyond the year 2000. These are the movers and the shakers of the future, and just as they should not expect too much from the world, so should the world not expect them to effect immediate transformations.

They stand tall on graduation day, and cast the shadows of the future. Let's hope that we have prepared them to help make that future one of promise.

GRADUATIONS A high school graduation is the ceremony of conferring diplomas. In Manistique, it takes a week. We begin with the rehearsals for baccalaureate and conclude with the all night Graduation party.

Between this beginning and this ending are the church breakfast, baccalaureate, honors night, class night, the actual commencement, the reception line, the Graduation party and the recovery from the week of activities.

This climax to each school term in some ways indicates the value placed upon education or at least the outward signs of it.

It is a "pat on the back" for the seniors, their parents, the school staff, the school board and the community--because by emphasizing graduation, we indicate to ourselves and perhaps others that we care enough about education, for everyone, to make it possible.

This does not happen in all parts of the world--not even in all parts of the United States. Some states do not provide support for students enrolled in high school. Where such aid is not provided, the rate of graduates to total students is correspondingly small.

It's a great sociological experiment--this trying to provide a free education for everyone through twelfth grade. And while the experiment is not failing, it's running into trouble.

Some communities are concerned about whether or not their schools will open next

fall. Others, even in Michigan, are concerned as to whether or not their schools will stay open the entire year. Some few have actually closed during this past year.

But, most of them, like Manistique, have managed to make a full term for another year. The capped and gowned graduates can proudly march down the aisle to strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" and receive their diplomas while proud parents look on.

So this educational experiment continues in the cities, the small towns and the rural areas. But it has taken some effort and it will require an even greater effort to keep the experiment going. But this year for the class of '69 it's still going and congratulations are in order.

# VISTA report

A couple of years ago, a family friend complained to me about his son, "He's a sophomore in college, and he doesn't know what he wants to do. He's got no direction."

The father explained that he, a chemical engineer, had planned from his early youth to be an engineer. He set his goal, and made it. Why couldn't his son do the same thing, he asked.

He was not satisfied by my saying that his son was like many college students. College, in many ways, is like a department store, I told him. Students are shopping around for what they want to do with their lives.

I explained that I did not decide that I wanted to go into journalism until I was a senior in college. And since I talked to him, I have decided that I want to be a teacher, an occupation I would have rejected several years ago.

One of the characteristics of our society is the flexibility it allows. Youths are able -- and often encouraged -- to put off career decisions and to look around for what they want. No more are sons expected to follow their father's trade and daughters trained in the kitchen in anticipation of an early marriage.

For the high school graduate

there are a number of factors that prevent plans from being rigidly set. Boys, in particular, cannot plan too far ahead, since their lives are kept in limbo by further schooling and the military service.

These youths should not be condemned for not knowing where they are going. And we should accept that they are going to poke around this world of ours, seeking what they want to do, what they are able to do, and what kind of lives they want to lead.

Many of today's youths are looking for something better. While they may be comfortable in the lives they lead, they are haunted by the possibility that there may be something better. And something more worthwhile than mere comfort.

And this attitude is nothing new. How many adults have changed jobs or moved to another area -- perhaps more than once -- because they were dissatisfied with what they had and sought an improvement? How many adults are in jobs far removed from those they first entered or were trained for?

Today's youths are still looking and wondering if they will find something better. This search is one of the roots of today's campus disorders. The tactics of disgruntled students may be rejected by society, but

We should not write off demonstrations as the work of a perverted and misguided minority. The violence and disruption should be deplored. But let's not console ourselves by thinking that the other 97 per cent of the students are happy and content in today's world -- whether it be the world of their family, their community, their university, or the entire world. There is dissatisfaction, a desire to change things, and resultant frustration. Many students feel this way. Let's give today's youth the time they need to find themselves. For them to decide where they are heading in this

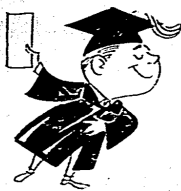

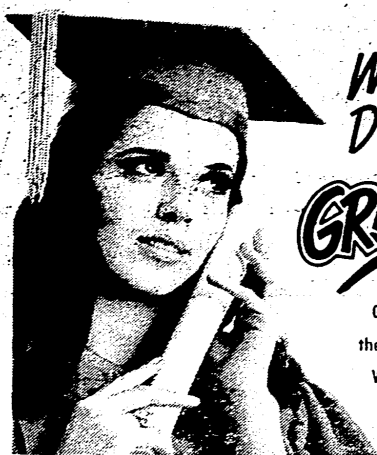

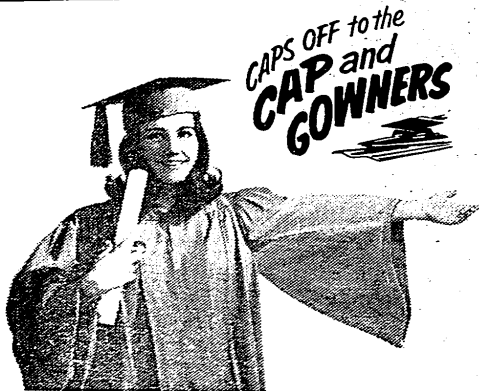

JUNE IS DAIRY MONTH. And our Upper Peninsula produces the best milk, butter and cheese. Have them any time of the day.

Cheese for breakfast? Why not? For a great start, try cheese and bread, cheese and eggs or an open faced broiled cheese sandwich topped with bacon and tomato slices. Or try a mixture of scrambled eggs and cottage cheese--adding the cheese after the eggs are cooked.

The last time I had overnite guests we tried a recipe from my Finnish cook book and liked it well enough to do it again. We used individual casseroles and layered the ingredients in the buttered dish--ham, Swiss cheese, eggs and light cream. This was then baked until the eggs were set.

**HERE'S A QUICKSANDWICH TO TRY.** It can be heated in an outdoor grill or in the oven. Split hard rolls in thirds. Spread each surface generously with butter. Place a ham slice or one-fourth cups ham salad on the bottom section of the roll. Top with the next section of the roll, then with a slice of cheese. This can be Swiss or almost any mild cheese. For a little extra flavor you might like to sprinkle about 1/2 tablespoon of Blue cheese on top of the other cheese. Cover with the top of the roll and

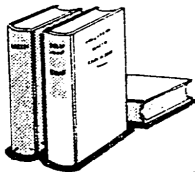

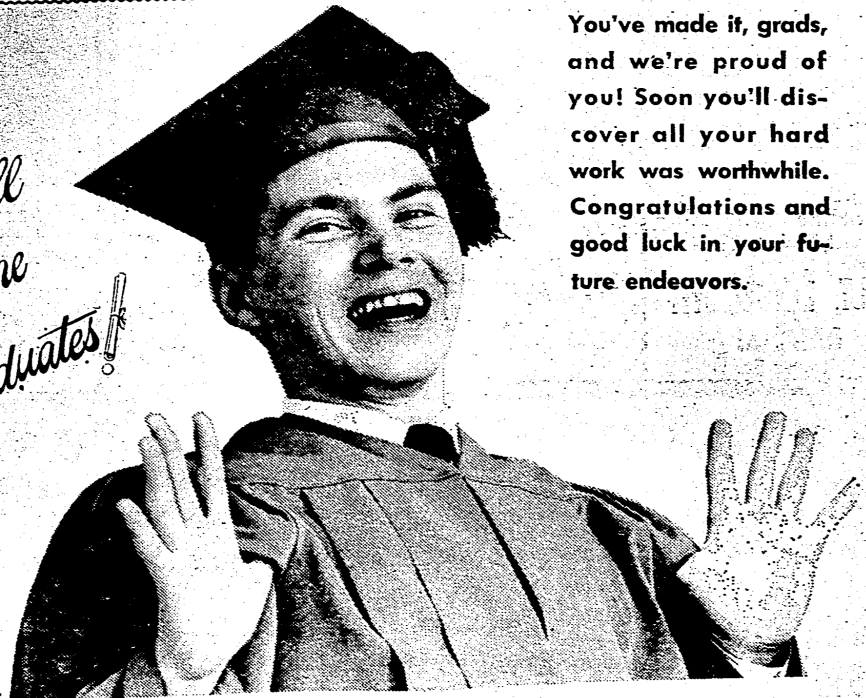
