Gas delay explained

City Council members listened politely Tues-day night as representatives of the Michigan Consolidated Gas Co, explained why prospects of natural gas service to this community are dim, and adjerrined after aiming some pointed vertial shafts at the company.

Fred Mchipte, vice-president-sales, explain-ed his company's inability to deliver-as-promis-ed, basing his presentation on the fact that a recent rate increase granted by the Michigan Public Service Commission was Inadequate in view of the light money market.

Councilmen admitted the company had a prob-lem, but pointed out that the community also had problems, having invested heavily in gas heating equipment for several major building projects, after boing assured last fall that gas service would be available this summer.

City Attorney William F. Hood, in fact, stated he felt the company had made a legally and morno reit the company had made a legarly and mor-ally binding commitment to the community, and that the firm could be responsible in a suit for legal damages. The rate problem cannot be used

as an excuse to break a commitment made to this community, he contended, It was pollated out that earlier in the dry Mc-Indyre had renewed a one-year agreement with the Manistique Area Schools, agreeing that the firm vould pay the difference between natural gas cost and the cost of propane fuel the school is now forced to use because of the delay in ser-vice,

vice, Mclatyre said that any commitment as to un-Methyro said that any commitment as to under what circumstances gas will become available to the community would be qualified to the point where it would not be menninged. 
