Gas delay explained

City Council members listened politely Tuesday night as representatives of the Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. explained why prospects of natural gas service to this community are dim, and advanced their slimming some pointed verbal slurs at the company.

Fred McElroy, vice president-sales, explained his company's inability to deliver as promised, having his presentation on the fact that a recent rate increase granted by the Michigan Public Service Commission was inadequate in view of the tight money market.

Councilmen admitted the company had a problem, but pointed out that the community also had problems, having invested heavily in gas heating equipment for several major building projects, after being assured last fall that gas service would be available this summer.

City Attorney William F. Hood, in fact, stated he felt the company had made a legally and morally binding commitment to the community, and that the firm could be responsible in a suit for legal damages. The rate problem cannot be used

as an excuse to break a commitment made to this community, he contended.

It was pointed out that earlier in the day McElroy had received a one-year agreement with the Manistique Area Schools, agreeing that the firm would pay the difference between natural gas cost and the cost of propane fuel the school was now forced to use because of the delay in service.

McElroy said that any commitment as to under what circumstances gas will become available to the community would be qualified to the point where it would not be meaningful. "We have every hope to be able to serve Manistique, and will do so when the MPSC grants us a rate of return that would be favorable," he said.

Cost of putting in a distribution system for Manistique was estimated at about \$750,000.

McElroy said that his company's engineering drawings were on file with the city, but that his company would not join with the city in filing a petition with the Federal Power Commission to alter their allocation from the gas line to another firm, or to the city.

Treatment is needed clean harbor area

Primary treatment of paper mill effluent will eventually be a factor in helping to relieve effluent disposal problems Manistique Pulp and Paper Co., President Frank S. Howard said this week.

Howard said that opening of the upper gates on the flume last year have flushed some of the sludge that accumulates. The area, where the effluent is stored, is sealed at both ends so it does not leak, he said.

The harbor area was covered with sludge Friday evening and cleared by Saturday morning.

Howard explained that the local mill gives a primary treatment to the effluent, which is non-organic in nature compared to regular sewage. He pointed out that the mill is currently discussing joining with the city in extending the waste water treatment plant to allow the mill to discharge its effluent there.

Howard also pointed out that the mill is bothered by material from Weston Creek into the area. This water carries sewage; he pointed out, and the mill is constantly having to clean it as it passes through.

Ungraded classes for Lakeside

The new Lakeside School was opened last March it was believed to be unique among the schools in the area. The new classes and new methods of teaching to be introduced. All some of those new ideas will be tested. It will be a pilot program, with review, revisions and reworking as the school year progresses and the system is evaluated.

Principal Gladys Mercier and her staff have worked out what they feel is the best step toward ungraded classrooms in the new school in Manistique. It calls for the grouping of young students according to ability in both upper and lower grades for at least part of the school day. The remaining portion will be in traditional classroom instruction.

The second and third graders, for instance, will meet from 8:30 a.m. to their home room for opening exercises, which include the pledge of allegiance, attendance-taking, collection of money and similar routines. At 9 a.m. they will break into ungraded sections for an hour of reading instruction. For students who have difficulty, from all three grades will be one group. Average readers in the first three grades will have a separate group, while accelerated readers will be in a section. Teachers will be Mrs. Catherine Boudreau, Mrs. Hales and Mrs. Clifford Cool.

Following recess, from 10:30 to 11:25, the youngsters will be grouped according to ability for math, using the same teaching methods as for reading.

From 11:30 to 1:30, they will once again be divided into ungraded groups for a session in language arts. At 1:30 p.m. they will return to their home rooms for science, social studies, art, interpretation, dramatics and study periods. Fourth, fifth and sixth grades will also break into groups for ungraded instruction in math. From 9:50 to 10:30 a.m. they will return to their home rooms for work in spelling, reading, music or study. Following recess, they will again be in ungraded groups for reading. These teaching assignments will be divided among Mrs. Margaret Mueller, Mrs. McKilligan and Mrs. Mercier.

After the afternoon the upper elementary grades will switch to a traditional system, with Mrs. Mercier teaching science, Mrs. Hales teaching language, and Mrs. McKilligan, social studies. The afternoon will be divided into three sessions, so that students by ability will be regrouped during each class period.

The ungraded approach to the ungraded classroom, best described as flexible grouping, allows children to progress at their own pace. Mrs. Mercier said, "The 'open spaces' design in the building allows the groups to easily divide and regroup throughout the day."

He also served as the first chairman of the Community School Advisory Board and was active with the committee promoting the Medical Care Facility for the county.

Mrs. Pitts, a native of Canada, has been active in community affairs and musical activities.

Sex education class is cited

The sex education program of the Manistique Area Schools was cited on behalf of teaching guidelines proposed by the State Department of Education at a public hearing Monday night at Graevest School in Marquette.

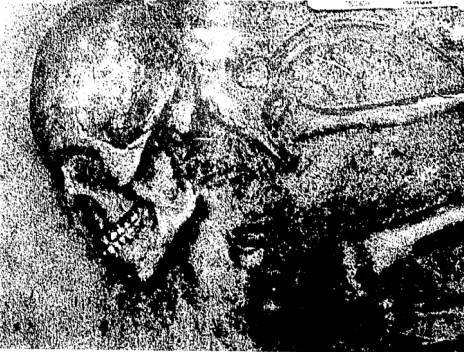
Supt. Edwin E. Wuelte of Manistique, a member of the state department's advisory committee on sex education, told the group that the local program was started in 1963, developed by the local "Ministerial" Association, and approved by the board of education.

"It has proceeded without difficulty," he said.

He added that the proposed guidelines from the State Department should be a 100. It was pointed out that the materials furnished is not available, and that parents may request to have their youngsters excused from such teaching if they so desire.

"From our experience we endorse the guidelines," he said, "and encourage the committee to continue the work."

Approximately 200 parents and school officials attended the meeting, at which a wide variety of testimony was offered.

Indian burial site discovered

An Indian burial that may date back as far as 800 years has been uncovered by Summer Science Camp archeology students excavating on Summer Island off the tip of the Garden Peninsula.

Student Ron Reid of Genesee, Mich., uncovered the burial in a test trench investigating a large circular earthwork structure. The discovery was made July 12.

Substantially older than the historic earthwork, the skeleton, an adult male, lay in a flexed position on its right side, the knees drawn up tightly against the body. The fact that many of the long bones and ribs are fractured suggests that the body was forced into this position after rigor mortis had set in, camp officials say.

Summer Science, Inc. is a non-profit camp operated on the island by a group headed by Dan Stevens, Ann Arbor. More than 30 boys from the Midwest are finishing its first camping session for the summer.

Of great interest to the student scientists were

the fragments of a stone projectile point lodged in the sternum, or breast bone, and the fourth rib oblique cut on the back surface of the femur, or thigh bone, both of which occurred before death. The actual cause of death is as yet unknown.

The excavations are being conducted by eight of the students at the camp. The archeology project, directed by Peter Carruthers of the University of Wisconsin, and Susan Rull, a graduate of Western Michigan University, is investigating a fishing settlement on the eastern side of the island which thrived during the late 1800's and may have been destroyed by fire during the early 1900's.

The finding of the burial was unexpected. Stevens said, it appears to be associated with an Indian occupation excavated nearby by Dr. D. D. Brose of Case-Western Reserve University in 1957. Although no definitive artifacts were associated with the find, it may date to around 1200 to 1300 A.D., the announcement said.

The Manistique Chiefs dropped into a Waubesa League tie for first place with Escanaba, by losing to Powers Wednesday 4-3.
 In spite of outitting Powers 6 to 4, and a homerun by Gary Sample, scoring three runs, and another homer by Paul Demers scoring two, the Chiefs were unable to get the necessary runs to sew up the title. Both Escanaba and Manistique now have 7-2 records in Waubesa League.
 Manistique opened the American Legion tournament in impressive manner Saturday at Escanaba as they defeated the Escanaba Cubs, 6-1, at Alliance Field Saturday morning. Manistique had six runs on eight hits, including doubles by Gary Sample and Don Chartler. Russ King allowed Escanaba only two hits, gave up one walk and struck out eight. Al Larsen was the losing pitcher.
 The story was different in the second game, when Manistique met Menominee at 2 p.m. Sunday, as Menominee won 5-2. Menominee scored five runs on six hits, while Manistique made two runs on four hits. Several errors by the Chiefs contributed to their problems. Jacques was the winning pitcher for Menominee. Kendall Peterson started for Manistique, relieved in the fourth by Russ King. Cite danger in bite cases

A warning on animal bites, now biting their seasonal peak, was issued this week by Sgt. Paul Uerling, commander of the Manistique State Police post. Uerling said a dozen bites had been reported since May, from dogs, cats, muskrats, tamsters and rabbits.
 He cited information on rabies issued by the Michigan Department of Health. Anyone bitten by an animal should see their physician immediately, and be sure that the health department or police department is notified.
 "Any animal that has bitten a person may have rabies," the health department information states. "The only way to find out is to have the animal confined under observation for 10 days. If the animal is alive and well after 10 days it could not have given the disease. If it dies within this 10-day quarantine period, however, the head will be sent to the laboratory for analysis of its brain for evidence of rabies."
 "An animal suspected of rabies should not be killed if it can be avoided. However, if it becomes necessary to destroy the animal, it should be killed in a manner that won't destroy the brain, because it is needed for laboratory analysis."

Summer programs attendance good

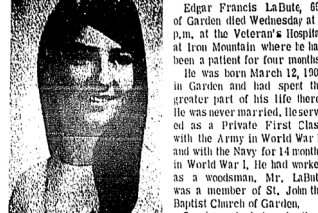
The Educational and Recreational Enrichment summer program of the Manistique Community School has entered its fifth week of activity.
