

Deer kill drop cited

Michigan's 1970 firearm deer season, cooled down for a more conservative kill than lastyear, yielded a harvest of 75,000 whitetails, according to a pre-liminary estimate just tabulated the Department of Natural by Res

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As tables of the traffic sur-vey shape up, the DNR esti-mates that hunders this season took 55,000 bucks and 20,000 interless animals. In 1969, Michigan's buck kill reached (56,260 while the antierless har-vest was placed at 40,520. In the Upper Peninsula where action was limited to bucks-only should this season. fireaction was limited to bucks-only shooting this season, fire-arm deer hunters brought home 10,500 antlered animals, as a-gainst 12,540 in 1069. Last year, hunters in that part of the state also harvested 8,170

by the Department of Natural Resources. This season's tentative figure, short of last year's take of 107,000 animals, is based on traffic counts con-ducted by the DNR. It will stand as the Department's best fix on the season's results un-til a postcard survey of li-censed hunders is completed next sprine. next spring

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Carols Express Yule Joy, Echoing Across the Ages

Voices rise in songs of joy and praise. As the joyous season arrives, the vibrant sound of carolers is heard in churches, at family gather-ings, in groups going from house to house to celebrate with song.

with song. Carols are as much a part of the Yuletide as the tree, gifts and Santa himself.

uts and Santa himself. It all began with the first carols in the 13th century, says the Encyclopedia Amer-icana.

The earliest English carols were composed anonymous-ly, perhaps by clergymen or court musicians. Simple tunes and strong rhythms were characteristic, and the musical form featured a re-frain, to repeat before and after each stanza. Words were written, gen-erally, in the English ver-nacular or in "macaronic" form — a combination of English and Latin. The first printed collection of carols appeared in 1521. It included the "Boar's Head Carol," still sung during Christmas dinner at Queen's College, Oxford, England. Even then, however, the practice of passing on car-ols orally, from generation to generation, continued. Among these were carols in. ballad form, such as "I Saw Three Ships" and "The Cher-ry Tree Carol."

ry Tree Carol." Caroling fell into disrepute in the 17th century, and car-ol singing was forbidden by the English Puritans. Those who colonized America car-ried this disapproval with them.

ried this disappional with After the Restoration, in 1660, caroling was once again permitted and the custom slowly revived. Some of the most popular carols date from the 18th and 19th centuries. These include "Adeste Fideles," possibly by Francis Wade: "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," with words by Charles Wesley and music by Felix Mendelssohn: "Joy to the World." with words by Isaac Watts, music by George Frederic Handel. Probably the most popular of all carols is the 19th cen-itury "Silent Night." with words by Joseph Mohr, the

Are Many! Wise Men? Answers How Many

Three wise men? Three wise men? In New Testament stories of the Nativity, only St. Mat-thew tells of "wise men from the east" — and how many wise men followed the star to the manger is not stated. The tradition that there The tradition that there were three probably comes from St. Matthew's descrip-tion of three gifts – gold, frankincense and myrrh. Another explanation for

Another explanation for the number three is the leg-end that the wise men sym-bolized all humanity, in turn represented by the races of

Shem, Ham and Japhet, ac-cording to the editors of The New Book of Knowledge. Early traditions mention varying numbers of wise

men. Twelve was the number traditional in the Eastern church, while in the West, mosaics and paintings showed sometimes two, sometimes three, four or more wise men.

three, four or more wise men. During the sixth century, the idea that there were three came to be generally accepted. In legends, the wise men were given names: Mel-hior, Gasper, Baltasar.


s Are Many! Although St. Mathew did not use the name "Magi." he implied it when he wrote of "wise men." for "magi" was commonly used in Palestine to mean "great. illustrious." Today, Nativity scenes show three wise men or Magi present at the manger along with the shepherds, who hastened to Bethlehem on the night Christ was born. Some historians. however, believe that the visit of the Magi didn't take place until much later — perhaps a year or even two years after the birth of Christ.

Driving Yule Out

Driving Yule Out St. Knut's Day, January 13th. is the traditional time for taking down Christmas greens in Sweden. According to custom, as the tree is dis-mantled, young folk dance while their elders sing, "Twentieth day Knut driveth Yule out." This custom is believed to be derived from the laws of King Canute, written in the early 11th century.

of five shillings." And so, throughout New England Pilgrim settlers had to treat Christmas as just another working day. Gover-nor Bradford noted that "no" man rested all day: on De-cember 25, 1620, say the edi-tors of Encyclopedia Ameri-eana. cana.

Today, in the United States and Canada, Christmas cele-brations are a colorful blend of customs from many lands. The main features of the holiday festivities are much the same everywhere—Santa

Claus, Christmas trees, gifts, greetings, feasting, family visits, carol singing.

Each of these customs has Each of these customs has its own history, and for the student of holiday lore and legend, the fascination lies in the variety of traditions brought by settlers from other lands and assimilated into what is now a truly American or truly Canadian Christmas. Christmas.

Displaying Tree

The custom of the Com-munity Christmas Tree be-gan in the carly 1900's with the people of Pasadena, Calif., who decorated a tall

erry

with lights and tinsel. Madison Square in New York and the Common in Boston were the scene of trees set up in 1912. In 1914 Independence Square in Philadelphia had its first holiday tree.

Around each of these trees choirs gathered and sang carols.

The custom of lighting the The custom of lighting the National Community Christ-mas Tree in Washington, D.C. began in 1923 when the Uni-versity of Vermont sent a large tree to President Calvin Coolidge.

Add Special Touch

In Quebec, customs from France lend their special touch to a Canadian Christmas.

France gave Canada the "creche," gatherings after midnight Mass with family midnight Mass with family and friends, savory pork pies called "tourtieres," collecting gifts from door to door for the less privileged persons of the community.

After mass on Christmas Eve, the people of Quebee gather at homes of loved ones to participate in a night-long feast called "ré-veillon."

Performing Pageant

From Germany came the Nativity pageant, and the first play of this sort in they U.S. was performed at the German Catholic Church of the Holy Trinity in Boston, in 1851, Children dressed as in 1851. Children aressed as Oriental shepherds offered gifts to the Christ Child at the altar, singing carols at the same time. The gifts were later distributed to the poor of the parish.

Play Delights

A hybrid Spanish-Indian play, called "Los Pastores," introduced by Spanish monks, may still take place in the backyards of San An-tonio, Tex., at Christmastime. With no props, curtains and a cast of amateurs, it yearly delights with its spiritual in-wated ions. novations.





Flowers Speak Language of Love In Modern or Victorian Era

Like holly, ivy and mistletoe, flowers share in the legend and lore of Christmas. In terms of the Victorian era, the floral legend is an especially meaningful one.

A Victorian lady who received a bouquet from her admirer could either smell it or read it as if it were a letter. Often, it was a letter.

Young engaged couples, strictly chaperoned, found a way to communicate words of affection via flowers. Each flower had a special meaning.

Flowers in sequence could be used to spell out a fervent pledge of love. To help in composing — and translat-

ing — these messages, there were numerous tiny dictionaries listing flowers and their meanings.

meanings. The flowering honeysuckle, for instance, spoke of "bonds of love." A red rosebud told a lady that she was "pure and lovely." Red double pink meant "woman's love." And heliotrope carried a bold message, "I love you." This Victorian language of

message, "Liove you." This Victorian language of flowers greatly influenced the design of Christmas cards of the time — witness the card illustrated here, from the Norcross Historical Collection of antique cards.





He is said to have eyes in the back of his head, the better to see whether boys and girls have been naughty or nice.



Traditionally, Advent wreaths are made of ever-greens, trimmed with rib-bons, and hold four candles to be lit during the Sundays of Advent. The wreath. which has no

The wreath, which has no beginning or end, represents eternity, and the evergreens symbolize growth and life, according to the editors of the New Book of Knowledge.

Like many other Christian holiday customs, the Advent wreath originated in pagan ceremonies.

ceremonies. During the dark days of the winter solstice, the sun-worshippers of northern Eu-rope sought to please their absent god, the sun, and per-suade him to return, by using a wheel trimmed with green-ery. ery.

The wreath was made of an actual wheel, taken from a cart and wrapped in greens. Lights, too, were added.

ESTABLISHING CRIB ESTABLISHING CRIB Though legend says that St. Francis of Assisi first in-troduced the Christmas crib in the 13th century, history records that the first manger scene was created by Pope Liberius in 354 A.D.







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Legend, Lore Of Holiday_Takes Varied Forms

Varied Forms The belief that Santa has a reindeer-drawn sleigh and enters homes through the chiminey may have 'come from Scandinavia. An old Norse legend about the god-dess Hertha said that she rode on a reindeer's back.

Her appearance in the fireplace place in mid-winter was thought to bring good luck to the home. .

... "Silent Night. Holy Night" was written in 1818 by a vil-lage priest in Hallein, Aus-tria. Father Joseph Mohr wrote the words, to an ac-companiment created by his organist, Franz Gruber. . Legend has it that the church organ was out of order — damaged by mice — and so "Silent Night" was first sung to a guitar accom-paniment.

Who invented that popular holiday beverage, eggnog? It has been part of the festivi-ties for so many year: that nobody really knows its ori-gin gin.

One possibility is that egg-nog came from the Old Eng-lish hot drink, sack-posset, which was also made of eggs, milk, nutmeg and sugar.

Among the earliest Christ-mas tree ornaments were some that resembled the sun, stars and moon, or animals. Using signs of nature as decorations can be traced back to the feasts of the win-ter equinox, when sun-wor-shipping pagans hung simi-lar trinkets on trees.

* * *

"The cattle were lowing." says the carol, "Away in a Manger," and Nativity paint-ings often show the animals of the manger. Sweden has an unusual gift-giver — it's a goat! Ac-cording to tradition, the Yul-bock or Yule goat comes to the door of Swedish homes on Christmas Eve and tosses

on Christmas Eve and tosses the family's gifts through the doorway. Another legendary guest at Swedish holiday celebra-tions is Tomte, a kind-heart-ed elf who guards the home. A dish of food is placed in a quiet corner, so that Tomte may feast as he secretly ob-serves the family fun.

Enjoying Pudding In Denmark and Norway the legendary good spirit of the house is Nisse, who watches over home and farm and is sometimes said to be the gift-bringer, too. Twelfth Night is, in Span-ish tradition, the time for giving gifts, and the tradi-tional gift bearers are the Wise Men, who as they jour-ney each year to Bethlehem bring gifts for good children.
