Snowmobile races planned Jan. 9-10

Members of the Top O'Lake Snowmobile Race Committee have received permission from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to utilize the south shore branch of the Indian Lake State Park for their snowmobile races on Jan. 9-10.

The DNR has had several provisions which include the provision that everyone entering the park is to verify and purchase a snowmobile must purchase either a both of a 30 annual sticker. The cost of the sticker is \$1.50, and the annual sticker is \$3.00 and Grand Wulfsberg, Regional Highway Supervisor for the U.S., said that this pass was issued since it is a state law.

Snowmobiles are not allowed in the park at all, except on a trail from a camp site and on the ice. Race committee chairman Fred Weinert said that spectator machines would be allowed in the area, only to a safety hazard. The only exception allowed is for racing during the event will be those directly connected with the race.

Weinert added that, even though competitors must purchase a pass to enter the park area, they would be reimbursed for as permitted by the United States Snowmobile Association, a sponsoring body, does not allow a charge for drivers under the competition area.

Park officials have announced that they could provide parking for approximately 400 vehicles in the campground area for spectators, and adequate parking sites for competitors in the lake launch area.

The track committee states the only problem at the moment is a lack of equipment to move snow on the oval, for the 10,000 race.

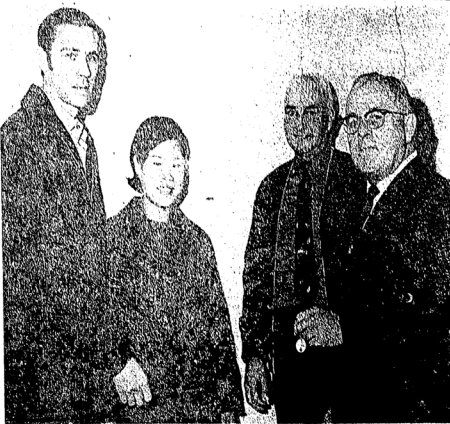

Auditors answer Board's questions

The long-simmering question of school tax levies and the annual audit came up for discussion at the Board of Education meeting Monday night, and this time the question of how the public's money was handled was discussed in closed session.

After an hour and 10 minutes, along with auditor Dennis Schneider of the Escambia CPA firm of Schneider, Lattie and Haapak, the answers to six questions submitted prior to the meeting were made public.

Here are the questions and the answers: From Mrs. Margaret Waters-- Q. In the process of preparing this audit, have you found any monies not accounted for? A. All money was accounted for, and there was no evidence of irregularities. If there had been, the auditors would have reported it at the time it was discovered, or announced it when the audit was completed.

Q. In the process of preparing this audit, have you found the Board of Education, the Superintendent, or the Business Manager, the office staff or the previous Auditor dishonest or incapable of handling their assigned duties? A. There was no evidence of dishonesty on anyone's part. It was beyond the scope of the audit to determine if people are capable or not, and it would be inappropriate to attempt to say if they were. Schneider added that he did think the superintendent was very capable and that the school had a wonderful staff.

Q. In the process of preparing this audit, have you found any irregularities at all? A. None whatsoever. Questions from Leon Wood-- Q. Clarification of last lunch transfer of \$8,114.43. A. Mr. Wood said his answer was included in what he said was a letter rest breakdown. Q. Can the audit be on the cash and general basis? A. It is a state requirement that it be on an accrual basis. The auditors can furnish any supplemental schedules that the board wants, and can provide cash statements, if the board desires.

Q. Please explain the \$5,000 tax write off. A. The procedure is to carry only three years of delinquent taxes on the books because of the tax sale. This year's several prior years were written off (of delinquent taxes not collected) and since the county assumes the collection of all delinquent taxes, as started this year, the collection will be 100 per cent. All transfers from the collecting units are accounted for.

The session was far more subdued than the meeting with the auditors (then from the firm of Ernst and Ernst) in July, 1969, following the boiler conversion job.

Dog warden job is open

Looking for a job with lots of challenge? How does County Dog Warden job sound?

A committee meeting last Thursday night produced the decision to have the Sheriff's department take over the responsibility for enforcing the dog law and assigning the Sheriff the job of hiring a dog warden.

Members of the committee, appointed at last week's meeting of the County Board of Commissioners, were Chairman Lindsay Frenette, Edward Jorgensen, Ernest Hololik and Thurman Skarrill, Sr., plus Prosecutor G.S. Johnson, Sanitarian Boyd Briggs and Sheriff Gray.

The dog warden receives an annual salary of \$1,000, plus fees for boarding and disposing of animals.

Having the committee making its decision was an opinion from the State Attorney General's office "that it is imperative the community enforce the dog law for the reasons of nuisance abatement and public health."

Deer kill drop cited

Michigan's 1970 firearm deer season, cooled down for a more conservative kill than last year, yielded a harvest of 75,000 whitetails, according to a preliminary estimate just tabulated by the Department of Natural Resources.

This season's tentative figure, short of last year's take of 107,000 animals, is based on traffic counts conducted by the DNR. It will fit on the season's results until a postcard survey of licensed hunters is completed next spring.

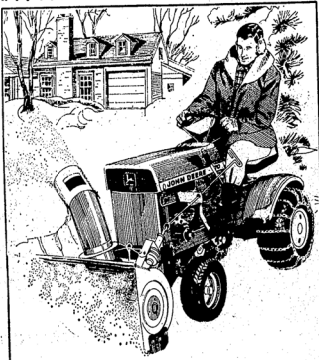
As tallies of the traffic survey shape up, the DNR estimates that hunters this season took 55,000 bucks and 20,000 antlerless animals. In 1969, Michigan's buck kill reached 66,200 while the antlerless harvest was placed at 40,520.

The DNR's tentative picture, short of last year's take of 107,000 animals, is based on traffic counts conducted by the DNR. It will fit on the season's results until a postcard survey of licensed hunters is completed next spring.

fic counts indicate that the northern lower peninsula produced a harvest of 33,000 bucks and 15,500 antlerless deer. Those figures compare with the 1969 totals of 41,800 bucks and 27,500 antlerless animals for that heavily-hunted part of the state.

The DNR's post-season picture points to another record deer kill in the southern lower peninsula, with the buck take there edging up to 12,500 and the region's antlerless deer total remaining steady at 4,500.

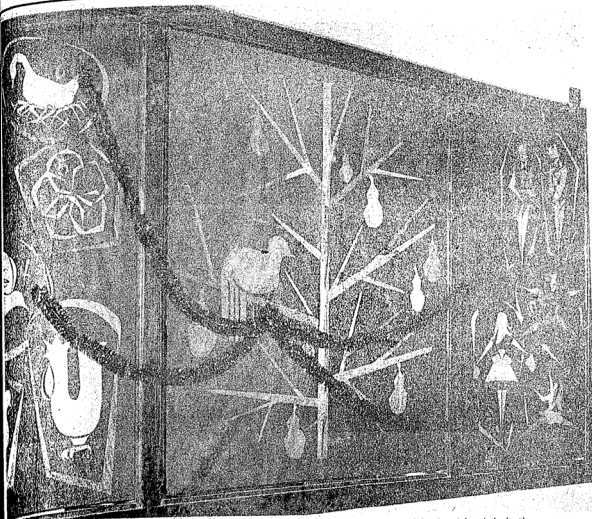

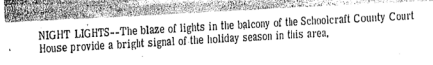

U.P. checked on disabilities

The profile of a typical worker who has been injured on the job in Michigan's Upper Peninsula depicts a married male between the ages of 18-29 with a high school education, white, and lifting. This statistical sketch is the result of a survey recently completed by the Michigan Department of Labor.

The survey of 12,378 compensable on-the-job injuries in the state, which represents about 27% of the total during the 1969-70 fiscal year, showed 463 injuries in the Upper Peninsula. Of those, 136 were back injuries, while 146 of the total involved back joints. Finger injuries ranked third with 50.

All of the injuries resulted in total disability of the employee for six days or more. Seven injuries caused permanent partial disability.

Lifting mishaps caused 143 of the 463 injuries recorded, while 128 were the result of employees being struck by falling or moving objects.

These categories were also leaders statewide.

Statistics on the nature of injuries reveal that struts and sprains led in the Upper Peninsula with 198 incidents, bruises next with 78 and cuts third with 72. Twenty-six fractures, 66 fractures and nine amputations were also included in the totals. Employees involved in material handling figured in 184 of the injuries.

Employees in the 18-29 age bracket accounted for 128 of the total injuries, followed by 114 in the 50-59 age group. Twenty-four females figured in the totals.

To combat these on-the-job injury problems, the Safety Education and Training Division of the Department of Labor currently has a safety consultant assisting area employers with accident prevention programs.

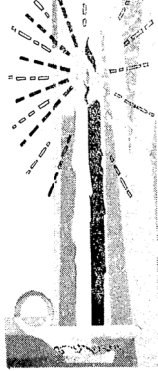
Employers requesting assistance in solving accident problems receive without charge the services of a professional safety consultant who draws up a tailor-made safety program for the particular firm involved. He also trains management people in a loss control program and continues consultative aid for as long as needed. A wide variety of safety literature and posters is also made available to employees of the firms.

Aside from the obvious humane reasons for accident prevention, the overall Safety Director Program has gained wide acceptance statewide among employers who recognize that work injuries increase production costs, the consultants point out.

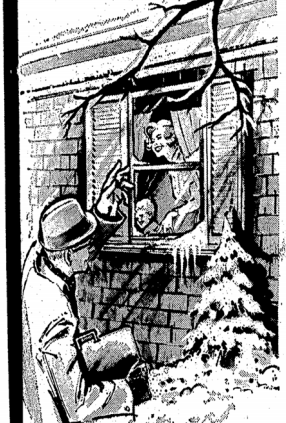

Tree Radiates Yule Meaning

The Christmas tree, a universally recognized symbol of the merriest season, radiates the meaning of the Christmas story.



As a religious symbol, the tree with its lights and greenery represents both the story of the infant Jesus and the belief in Christ as the "Light of the World."

Although only a century and a half old in America, the custom of the tree has a history that is measured in many centuries.

At about the same time, people also decorated for the Christmas season with the pyramid-shaped frames of light, symbolizing the birth of Christ as the Light of the World.

Early efforts to combine the Paradise Tree and the Christmas Light pyramid are recorded in manuscripts from Germany dating to the 16th century, collected by the Hallmark Cards research library.

The first tree was thought to have been brought to the United States by Hessian soldiers during the American Revolution. These homesick soldiers and other immigrants carried the tree throughout the country.

A major setback almost occurred in Cleveland in 1851 when a pastor decreed a tree in his home. His parishioners, however, bent and recanted after an explanation of its religious aspects.

Conservation-minded President Theodore Roosevelt again nearly stamped out the practice when he banned trees in the White House. After one of his sons staked a Christmas tree in...

to the White House, a forestor convinced the President that thinning helped forests.

For Festivity Traditional Christmas trees in Spain is a sort of tree called "arbol de la navidad." The ingredients are sugar, flour, egg white almonds.

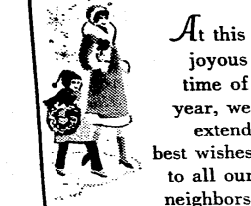

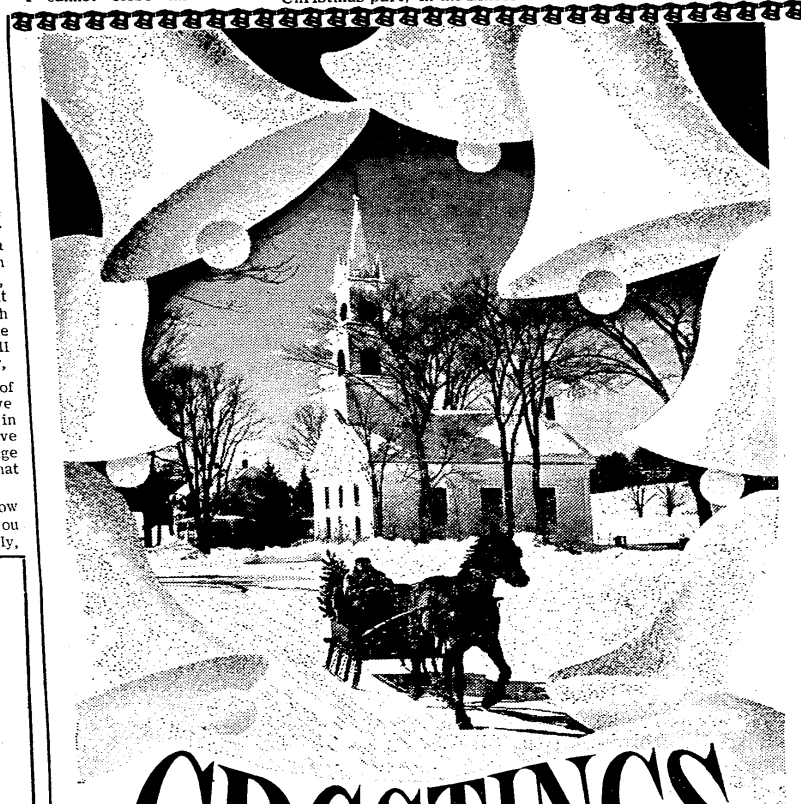

CRISIS IN CONFIDENCE

Some call it "a crisis in confidence." At a recent conference on Restoring Confidence in Public Schools, Dr. Leonard Fein, Associate Professor of Politics and Social Policy, Brandeis University, indicated that the reason for the crisis is that schools have succeeded too well. Schools have taught their students to think and to question. The thinking and the questioning is now directed toward the schools.

Here are some comments from other conference speakers on the same theme:

"Schools cannot belong entirely to Caesar—they belong to the people."

"Community control is not a remedy—it will not save us."

"Schools need to develop options for their clients."

"Leaders must be beyond the crowd and they must risk the anger of the crowd."

"The crisis in confidence will not go away until the parents are convinced that the kids are getting a fair shake."

"The discontent in education is not the property of urban areas alone."

"The dissenter is saying the schools are not operating on our behalf."

"The people don't know what they want, but they know it when they see it."

"The community is disgruntled, but not rebellious."

"You've got to listen more than you talk."

"We don't teach people how to listen—it takes two to communicate."

"The crisis in confidence goes both ways. The image you have of parents determines how you deal with them."

"Institutions are a part of the concept of standardization. What we have to do is to develop institutional options."

"If there is no hope, behavior becomes expressive. People do things to make them feel better, but they do not do things to solve problems."

"Keep the community on its toes by change and by making things happen."

"Talk to the taxpayers on what the taxpayers consider important."

"School budgets appear to be an exercise in mystery."

"You get your money's worth when you decide what you want."

"Test scores should be used to troubleshoot the system."

"Let's not have cookie-cutter schools—everyone stamped in the same mold."

"We have to look at resources. We have to see how we can get more out of what we have."

"It is an educational fantasy that it is through control that we can solve educational problems."

"A student, upon entering school, has spent more time watching TV than he will ever spend in school."

"We have accepted a factory model for schools because of the large numbers, but the factory model is inappropriate."

"Give up the notion that there are things which must be learned."

"Structurally, the school is

isolated."

"Curriculum is something the student creates."

"Let students and their parents decide what they want to learn."

"The only thing which will make society habitable in the future is the idealism and the energy of the young."

shipped for centuries.

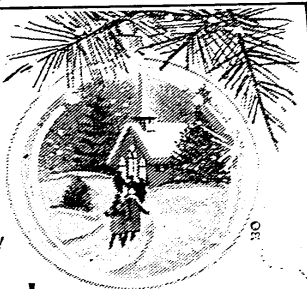
In commemoration of the

Carols Express Yule Joy, Echoing Across the Ages

Voices rise in songs of joy and praise. As the joyous season arrives, the vibrant sound of carolers is heard in churches, at family gatherings, in groups going from house to house to celebrate with song.

Carols are as much a part of the Yuletide as the tree, gifts and Santa himself.

It all began with the first carols in the 13th century, says the Encyclopedia Americana.

The earliest English carols were composed anonymously, perhaps by clergymen or court musicians. Simple tunes and strong rhythms were characteristic, and the musical form featured a refrain, to repeat before and after each stanza.

Words were written, generally, in the English vernacular or in "macaronic" form — a combination of English and Latin.

The first printed collection of carols appeared in 1521. It included the "Boar's Head Carol," still sung during Christmas dinner at Queen's College, Oxford, England.

Even then, however, the practice of passing on carols orally, from generation to generation, continued. Among these were carols in ballad form, such as "I Saw Three Ships" and "The Cherry Tree Carol."

Caroling fell into disrepute in the 17th century, and carol singing was forbidden by the English Puritans. Those who colonized America carried this disapproval with them.

After the Restoration, in 1660, caroling was once again permitted and the custom slowly revived.

Some of the most popular carols date from the 18th and 19th centuries. These include "Adeste Fideles," possibly by Francis Wade; "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," with words by Charles Wesley and music by Felix Mendelssohn; "Joy to the World," with words by Isaac Watts, music by George Frederic Handel.

Probably the most popular of all carols is the 19th century "Silent Night," with words by Joseph Mohr, the

village priest of Hallein, Austria.

Many stories are told about the way this carol came to be written. One legend says that on a snowy Christmas Eve in 1818, Father Mohr went to bless the newborn baby of a poor parishioner.

On that night he was so

Manger Is Theme Of Latin Yule

Though Santa and gaily decked trees often appear nowadays in Central and South America, Christmas is

traditionally a time for religious observances. Mass, at midnight on Christmas Eve or early Christmas Day, forms the heart of the holiday in Latin America, and the creche or manger scene marks the season throughout churches and homes, say the editors of the Encyclopedia Americana. Bountiful feasts, processions and other special events

may provide a festive note, but custom says that gift-giving time is Three Kings' Day — Twelfth Night, January 6th, when the Wise Men brought their gifts to Jesus. Children put their shoes under the bed or in the window, hoping to have them filled with toys and gifts. Water and hay are set out for the Three Kings' horses or camels.

While many Latin American countries share these traditions and celebrate Christmas in similar ways, each country also has its own special festivities.

In Venezuela

Hallaca, a native Venezuelan dish, is an awaited delicacy during the Christmas season. It is made of corn meal with pork and chicken stuffing and numerous other ingredients, and then wrapped in plantain leaves to form a type of pie.

In Argentina

It's a mid-summer Christmas in Argentina, and the traditional feast is generally served outdoors. Rosebuds and jasmine deck the table, which has as edible centerpiece a whole roast suckling pig.

In Brazil

Brazilian lore and legend says that Three King's Day is a time for poetry contests. Verses accompanied by guitars are featured.

In Chile

Unique among Christmas customs in Chile is a grand fiesta that centers around horse racing.

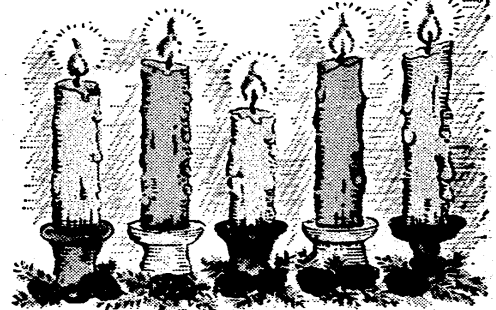

How Many Wise Men? Answers Are Many!

Three wise men? In New Testament stories of the Nativity, only St. Matthew tells of "wise men from the east" — and how many wise men followed the star to the manger is not stated. The tradition that there were three probably comes from St. Matthew's description of three gifts — gold, frankincense and myrrh. Another explanation for the number three is the legend that the wise men symbolized all humanity, in turn represented by the races of

Shem, Ham and Japhet, according to the editors of The New Book of Knowledge. Early traditions mention varying numbers of wise men. Twelve was the number traditional in the Eastern church, while in the West, mosaics and paintings showed sometimes two, sometimes three, four or more wise men. During the sixth century, the idea that there were three came to be generally accepted. In legends, the wise men were given names: Melchior, Gaspar, Baltasar.

Although St. Matthew did not use the name "Magi," he implied it when he wrote of "wise men," for "magi" was commonly used in Palestine to mean "great, illustrious." Today, Nativity scenes show three wise men or Magi present at the manger along with the shepherds, who hastened to Bethlehem on the night Christ was born. Some historians, however, believe that the visit of the Magi didn't take place until much later — perhaps a year or even two years after the birth of Christ.

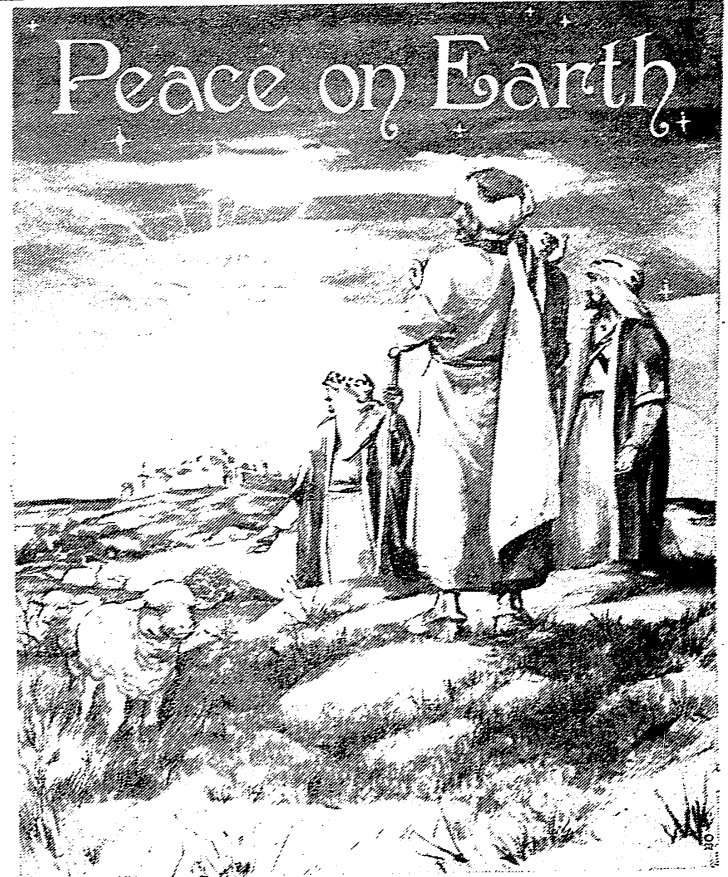

Holiday Blends Many Customs

"Anybody found feasting or observing Christmas day in any way shall pay a fine of five shillings."

And so, throughout New England Pilgrim settlers had to treat Christmas as just another working day. Governor Bradford noted that "no man rested all day" on December 25, 1620, say the editors of Encyclopedia Americana.

Today, in the United States and Canada, Christmas celebrations are a colorful blend of customs from many lands. The main features of the holiday festivities are much the same everywhere—Santa

Claus, Christmas trees, gifts, greetings, feasting, family visits, carol singing.

Each of these customs has its own history, and for the student of holiday lore and legend, the fascination lies in the variety of traditions brought by settlers from other lands and assimilated into what is now a truly American, or truly Canadian Christmas.

Displaying Tree

The custom of the Community Christmas Tree began in the early 1900's with the people of Pasadena, Calif., who decorated a tall

with lights and tinsel. Madison Square in New York and the Common in Boston were the scene of trees set up in 1912. In 1914 Independence Square in Philadelphia had its first holiday tree.

Around each of these trees choirs gathered and sang carols.

The custom of lighting the National Community Christmas Tree in Washington, D.C. began in 1923 when the University of Vermont sent a large tree to President Calvin Coolidge.

Add Special Touch

In Quebec, customs from France lend their special touch to a Canadian Christmas.

France gave Canada the "creche" gatherings after midnight Mass with family and friends, savory pork pies called "tourtières," collecting gifts from door to door for the less privileged persons of the community.

After mass on Christmas Eve, the people of Quebec gather at homes of loved ones to participate in a night-long feast called "réveillon."

Performing Pageant

From Germany came the Nativity pageant, and the first play of this sort in the U.S. was performed at the German Catholic Church of the Holy Trinity in Boston, in 1851. Children dressed as Oriental shepherds offered gifts to the Christ Child at the altar, singing carols at the same time. The gifts were later distributed to the poor of the parish.

Play Delights

A hybrid Spanish-Indian play, called "Los Pastores," introduced by Spanish monks, may still take place in the backyards of San Antonio, Tex., at Christmastime. With no props, curtains and a cast of amateurs, it yearly delights with its spiritual innovations.

It runs from Christmas to Candlemas, in homes located in out-of-way places so only the initiated can find it. The object is to prevent the merely curious observer from watching this spiritual miracle play.

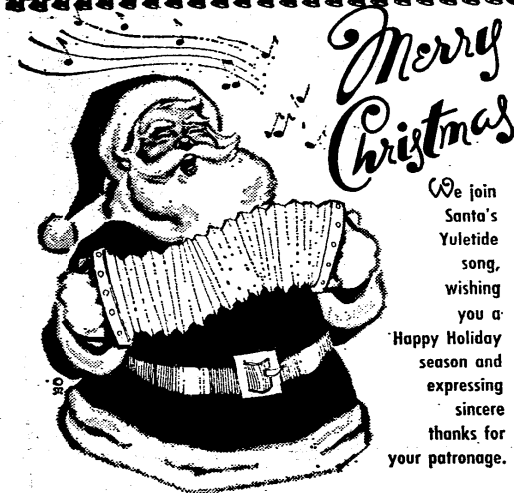

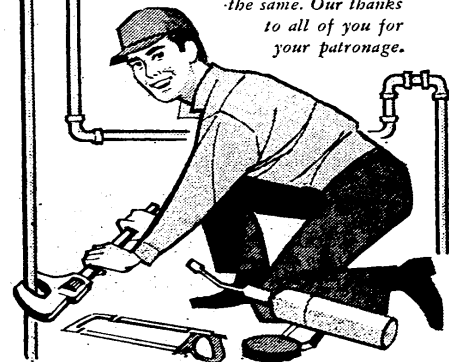

Flowers Speak Language of Love In Modern or Victorian Era

Like holly, ivy and mistletoe, flowers share in the legend and lore of Christmas. In terms of the Victorian era, the floral legend is an especially meaningful one.

A Victorian lady who received a bouquet from her admirer could either smell it or read it as if it were a letter. Often, it was a letter.

Young engaged couples, strictly chaperoned, found a way to communicate words of affection via flowers. Each flower had a special meaning.

Flowers in sequence could be used to spell out a fervent pledge of love. To help in composing — and translating —

these messages, there were numerous tiny dictionaries listing flowers and their meanings.

The flowering honeysuckle, for instance, spoke of "bonds of love." A red rosebud told a lady that she was "pure and lovely." Red double pink meant "woman's love." And heliotrope carried a bold message, "I love you."

This Victorian language of flowers greatly influenced the design of Christmas cards of the time — witness the card illustrated here, from the Norcross Historical Collection of antique cards.

The lush summer blooms are typical of the Victorian admiration of flowers, regardless of the season.

Though sentiments may be expressed differently, flowers still bloom on modern Christmas cards. A current card offers one example. Poinsettias flower on a background of mistletoe, and the message reads, "Just for you, honey, all my love at Christmas."

In Colombia

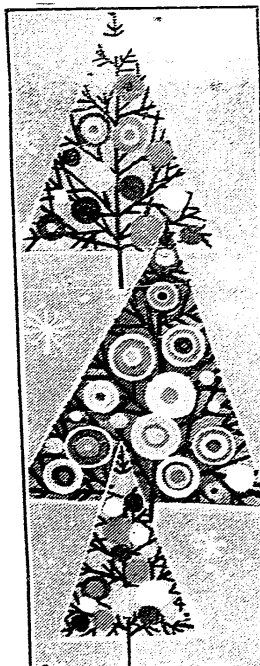

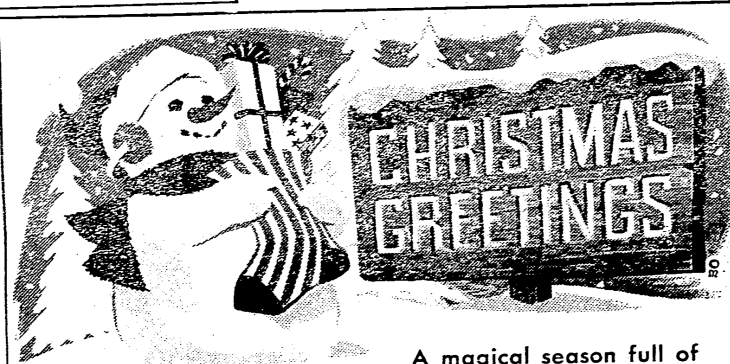

Scholars Study Source of Star Pioneering in East

"There shall come forth a Star" — Numbers 24:17.

In this Old Testament prophecy by Balaam, was a real star meant, or does "Star" refer to a great person?

For centuries, Biblical scholars have considered this question. Many believe that the prophecy led the wise men to watch for and follow

the "star in the east." of which St. Matthew wrote in his story of the Nativity.

The star itself is the source of many theories. Perhaps the best of all is that it was a miraculous appearance and as such needs no explanation.

However, astronomers through the ages have sought to connect the star seen by

the wise men with other reported celestial objects — a comet, perhaps, or an especially brilliant star that only appears at long intervals.

Still another theory suggests that the star may have been a configuration or grouping of planets. In 1604, the German astronomer Johannes Kepler theorized that Jupiter, Saturn and Mars might have occurred in such a configuration at about the time of Christ's birth.

The fact that the star and the visit of the wise men were described only by St. Matthew has led to still another question. Did only the wise men see the star?

That they were so privileged is sometimes explained by the legend that the wise men were astrologers whose

special interest helped them to notice the unusual brilliance of the three planets grouped together.

Christkind was represented by a child dressed in white robes, with a crown and wings of gold.



Cities Put Up Evergreens

Comes Christmas, and cities everywhere renew the tradition of setting up a community Christmas tree—a custom which began early in this century.

In 1909, citizens of Pasadena, Calif., decorated an evergreen on Mount Wilson as the tree of the city.

The year 1912 saw community Christmas trees erected in Madison Square, New York, N. Y., and on the Common in Boston, Mass. Independence Square in Philadelphia, Pa., showed off its first community tree in 1914.

President Calvin Coolidge inaugurated the custom of a national community Christmas tree in Washington, D.C., when he was presented with a large evergreen by the University of Vermont, in 1923

Picturing Nativity

The Christmas crib or presepio is an especially treasured part of the Portuguese holiday celebration. Every home and church seems to have one, and some of those in the churches are masterpieces of art.

Especially famous is the presepio in Estrella Church, Lisbon. This Nativity scene depicts the people of Beth-

lehem, in terra cotta figures. Unique among the crowd are the figures of an elephant and a bagpiper.

In Sweden

An ancient custom that is still observed in some Swedish households today is that of "dipping bread into the pot." Each person dips a piece of bread into pork and sausage drippings and eats it for good luck.

Wreaths Got Pagan Start

During this holiday season, a wide variety of colorful wreaths deck the doorways of homes in this community.

The use of wreaths at holiday time stems from the customs of Advent season—the four Sundays before Christmas. Traditionally, Advent wreaths are made of evergreens, trimmed with ribbons, and hold four candles to be lit during the Sundays of Advent.

The wreath, which has no beginning or end, represents eternity, and the evergreens symbolize growth and life, according to the editors of the New Book of Knowledge.


Like many other Christian holiday customs, the Advent wreath originated in pagan ceremonies.

During the dark days of the winter solstice, the worshippers of northern Europe sought to please their absent god, the sun, and persuade him to return, by using a wheel trimmed with greenery.

The wreath was made of an actual wheel, taken from a cart and wrapped in greens. Lights, too, were added.

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**Legend, Lore Of
Holiday Takes
Varied Forms**

The belief that Santa has a reindeer-drawn sleigh and enters homes through the chimney may have come from Scandinavia. An old Norse legend about the goddess Hertha said that she rode on a reindeer's back.

Her appearance in the fireplace in mid-winter was thought to bring good luck to the home.

"Silent Night, Holy Night" was written in 1818 by a village priest in Hallein, Austria. Father Joseph Mohr wrote the words, to an accompaniment created by his organist, Franz Gruber. Legend has it that the church organ was out of order — damaged by mice — and so "Silent Night" was first sung to a guitar accompaniment.

Who invented that popular holiday beverage, eggnog? It has been part of the festivities for so many years that nobody really knows its origin.

One possibility is that eggnog came from the Old English hot drink, sack-posslet, which was also made of eggs, milk, nutmeg and sugar.

Among the earliest Christmas tree ornaments were some that resembled the sun, stars and moon, or animals.

Using signs of nature as decorations can be traced back to the feasts of the winter equinox, when sun-worshipping pagans hung similar trinkets on trees.

"The cattle were lowing," says the carol, "Away in a Manger," and Nativity paintings often show the animals of the manger.

Appropriately, tradition says that cattle and other domestic animals should have a special feast on Christmas Eve. It's legendary, too, that cattle are given the power of speech for a few moments at this time.

Mistletoe, said to hold a license for kissing, was re-

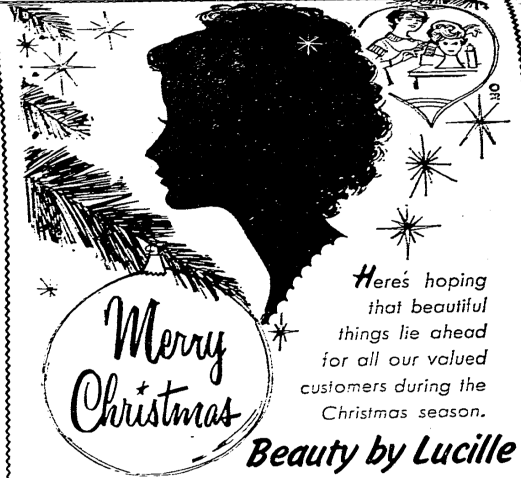
nown in ancient times for many mystical powers. Because of its pagan associations, it was long forbidden in churches.

A German legend held that, if a sprig of mistletoe was carried into an old house, the ghosts of the house would appear and answer questions.

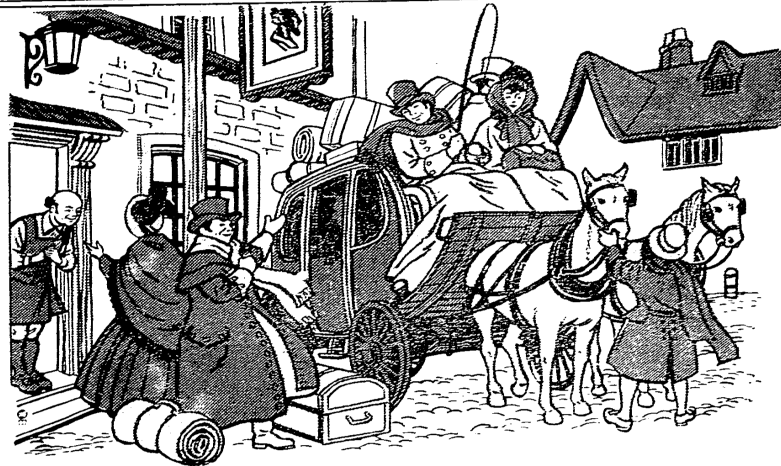

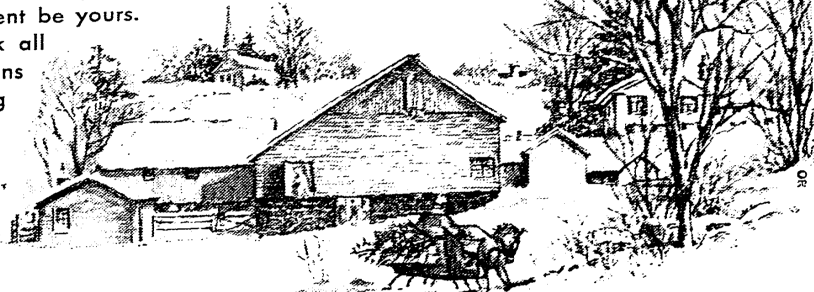

As a certain white-bearded, jolly old gentleman makes his rounds on Christmas Eve, delivering happy surprises to children the world over, he may look forward to being, in turn, surprised.

In the legend and lore of Christmas, giving to Santa is a time-honored tradition, with the gifts usually taking the form of food or beverage. Today, many families encourage children to be generous, by observing the custom of setting out treats for Santa — perhaps some candy, a dish of cookies, a glass of milk.

Through the ages, the gift-giver now known as Santa Claus has been called by many different names, but Santa's predecessors, like Santa himself, were often greeted with special treats.

Filling Pockets

In Italy, Befana is the gift-giver who preceded Santa. She took her name from the name for Twelfth Night — Epiphania, or Epiphany and brought her gifts on Epiphany Eve, January 5th.

To make ready for Befana, tradition says, Italian children empty their pockets and hang up their clothes. Then into each pocket goes a surprise — something good to eat.

After taking out the treats, Befana refills each pocket with gifts for the children.

Guarding the Home

Sweden has an unusual gift-giver — it's a goat! According to tradition, the Yulbock or Yule goat comes to the door of Swedish homes on Christmas Eve and tosses the family's gifts through the doorway.

Another legendary guest at Swedish holiday celebrations is Tomte, a kind-hearted elf who guards the home. A dish of food is placed in a quiet corner, so that Tomte may feast as he secretly observes the family fun.

Enjoying Pudding

In Denmark and Norway the legendary good spirit of the house is Nisse, who watches over home and farm and is sometimes said to be the gift-bringer, too.

His Christmas treat, the rice pudding traditional at Scandinavian holiday feasts, is placed beside the kitchen door or, on farms, in the hayloft.

Treating the Donkey

Today's Santa relies on his reindeer for transport, but the gift bringers of yesterday had other animal helpers, who usually shared in

the holiday giving and receiving.

In Holland, for instance, legend says that St. Nicholas arrives early — on St. Nicholas Eve, December 5th — riding a white donkey.

For the refreshment of the good saint's donkey, children stuff their shoes with hay and set out a dish of water. Carrots and a potato are sometimes added.

Feeding the Horses

Twelfth Night is, in Spanish tradition, the time for giving gifts, and the traditional gift bearers, are the Wise Men, who as they journey each year to Bethlehem bring gifts for good children.

To feed the Wise Men's horses on their long pilgrimage, Spanish children fill their shoes with straw and set them on balconies or window ledges.
