HIS EMINENT FITNESS FOR THE SUPREME BENCH IS CONFIRMED BY ALL.

Judges Do Not Regulate College—Democratic Congress Should Have Done So—Next Republican Congress Will Do So.

The nomination of Judge J. B. Moore, of Lapeer, for justice of the supreme court was one of the best that has ever been made in our state. He is a ripe scholar, a lawyer of many years practice, and a lawyer of a great deal of experience in the history of the state has been elected to the court of last resort. Personally he is courteous, and his manners are peculiarly winning, while his public character is singularly pure, and is fit to sit without a stain. Recognizing the peculiar qualifications and undoubted fitness of the judge for this judicial position, and also the fact that under ordinary circumstances his election by an overwhelming majority would be among the certainties in Michigan politics, the opposition has elected an ingenious device by which they hope to accomplish his defeat. This is the injection of the financial question into a judicial and constitutional question in the case of the supreme court and two members of the University are to be elected in April.

The state has been flooded with posters, and later will be with cards, outlining Mr. McArthur and coupling his name with the, at present, quiet paper for "16 to 1" support of the silver question.

We learn that John Mutar will erect a new residence in the Oakland addition this season. We hope many others will follow his example.

I have just been reading it for these days, and I find it a very moral and nice book."

Recent Naval Developments.

A British naval officer of high standing sends to the London Times a summary of certain important facts in connection with the recent naval engagement in the East. Here is some of the most interesting: Contrary to prophesy, large guns were not disabled through being loaded or primed by small projectiles. The maneuvered ends of the two Chinese battleships remained intact after Yala, and the vessels came out of action in a seaworthy condition, as far as the structure of the hull was concerned. Torpedoes were ineffective in any way. The only success of the torpedo boats was in the destruction of some of their numbers, were effective against a fleet detached from maneuvering. Japanese

torpedo boats were fired on and driven from their objective by friendly war-ships, during an early and abortive attempt to enter the harbor of Wei-Hai-Wei. A flotilla of fourteen torpedo boats then appears to have been annihilated, with a solitary exception, by a small number of moderate-sized cruisers. The last of one well-placed twelve-inch gun of a protected cruiser, and drove her out of action. The engines of the surviving ship of either fleet were intact, although fire was concentrated on the engines of the vessels. Fighting tops were useless at the average range of the action as fought. Builders were not damaged, although in a few instances the connections between the rudder and the bridge were impaired. Woodwork, either in the form of bulks, bulkheads, or decks, was absent from the cut-aways. Explosives are not a constant requisite in a fleet at sea, but the power of moving rapidly for a special maneuver is of supreme value.

Such a suggestion places the responsibility of polygamy upon women rather than men, and is inconsistent. There is no danger from polygamy in Utah, however. It has been abandoned by the Church of Latter Day Saints, and will not be prohibited by the constitution of Utah.
