To enrich the world with noble children, to give to the country more brave hands and honest hearts—what in comparison with it is the independence of a single woman or her worker's average work.

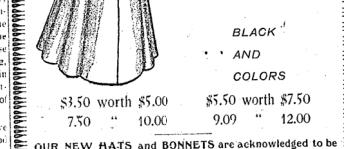
