The English Statesman Discusses What Can Be Done With The Turks.

Why does not such a governmental go to pieces according to the law of nature which happily prescribes corruption and weakness being dissolution in their train? There are three reasons. One is the jealousy of three great European powers, which has had the effect of preventing two of them from annexing what remains of Turkish territory. Another is the fact that the Moslem population, being in the majority, is so fanatical in its religious convictions (who are the greatest sufferers) that it is not only willing to help the government to hold the Christians down, but even disposed to tolerate evils which would produce Moslem insurrections were there no Christians in the country. There is, however, a great deal of latent discontent among the Mohammedans, and but for the fact which makes them so fanatical, they would have been long ago expelled from the country. The third reason is the enormous advantages which the Moslems derive to a government which tolerates them to purchase them. The Moslems are more likely to succeed than not, because the Moslems were more on a level with regular taxation than in these days of swiftly firing guns and rifles of long range. There is therefore little ground for hoping for the extinction of the Turkish power by natural causes.

Valuable Hints From A Student. W. K. Morehead, who had charge of a large section of the "mound-builders" exhibited in the ethnological department of the Chicago World's fair, made a wonderful discovery upon opening a mound in the Little Miami valley near Milford, O., recently. It consisted of an unperforated number of human skeletons of various sizes, with their arms, legs, and feet, and a few pieces of pottery, including some ornamental and silver and brass. The find is regarded as ethno-logical and scientific as a new discovery, and has attracted considerable attention.
