with us here on Thursday. It is now our full support. The complete furnace plants in the northwest will cast the first iron today.

The inauguration of this mammoth enterprise marks a new era in the progress of Manistique. No longer can it be spoken of as a deserted town. While recognizing the fact that the large lumbering interests centered here will continue to be the most important of our manufacturing concerns, the successful character of a business of a totally different character will produce a diversification of pursuits for our people that cannot fail to redound to the welfare of the whole community. A grand and magnificent future lies before this village, and with prophetic vision we see it a large and important city of several thousand inhabitants, with many natural advantages in course of full development and the center of a large and thriving rural population. From this time out there will be many acres of land cleared and placed under cultivation yearly and it will soon be found that a flourishing mill is an imperative necessity.

The furnace proper will demand the services of from fifty to seventy five men, but this only a small portion of the number for which the industry will find employment. Already the company have coal kilns in full working order at Corlone, Gulliver, Indian Lake farm, Orr's farm and Cook; and others will yet have to be built. These require a whole army of wood choppers, besides coal burners and attendants. It is impossible to estimate at present exactly how many will be directly or indirectly employed in the service of the Furnace Co.

Everything was all perfectly ready for firing up on Friday, but the managers apparently share the superstitious dislike of sailors for entering upon a new undertaking upon that day; so the start was delayed until after the hour of midnight, when the pride of Manistique went into commission.

It is expected that Colorado will vote an appropriation of \$200,000 for the purpose of state display.

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The plan for the fair buildings are practically approved, and are said to be examples of magnificent architecture. Leave to modify minor details only has been reserved. Senator Wisner has introduced his much talked or bill placing all state penal and reformatory institutions under the management of one general board of prison managers.

All other orders were abandoned in the house Wednesday morning, and the members gave their attention to reading and introducing bills. There were 116 bills introduced, bringing the total number up to 284.

Mr. Wachtel introduced by request a bill to create the county of Maple from portions of the territory of Cheboygan and Presque Isle. There was a similar measure six years ago, the name proposed then being Sismong.

All introduced by Representative Carpenter of Oakland, proposed to prohibit the killing of porcupines for five years from November 1, next. The bill provides a penalty of five fine, and imprisonment for from thirty to sixty days.

A WATER SUPPLY.

John Loose, the foreman of the east side fire engine company, has evolved a scheme for procuring an adequate supply of water in case of fire. He suggests that a main should be brought from the upper dam and that it be of sufficient size to supply both engines, and also a steam engine if one be procured. Side mains might be carried down such streets as would be necessary to bring all parts of the village within easy reach of water, and systems should be located at suitable points with a capacity of 25,000 barrels of water. We have only roughly given the plan outlined by Mr. Loose, and of course we have not the slightest idea as to whether it will be adopted. The expense would be from \$7,000 to \$10,000 which might be raised by bonding the village. We have heard it said that the wells are to be sunk deeper, and that George Boldus is procuring another drilling machine, which will work on the wells next summer. It is certain that the water supply at present is not sufficient. The opportunity presented to buy a steam engine at Escanaba ought also to be looked after, and if the engine be as good as reported there will never, perhaps, occur a better chance to secure one cheaply. The present man killing machines are not looked upon with much favor, and the arduous task of pumping for a protracted period, to say the least, a very disagreeable and exhausting one.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

BEFORE we again meet our readers the present congress will have passed away, and the country will no longer present to the world the curious anomaly of being legislated for by a body that has been disapproved and discarded by the people.

On all sides we hear only words of praise for the present management of our village schools. Professor Lu Da is giving satisfaction all around, and the scholars are making excellent progress. Manifestly to be congratulated on the fact that at last the important duty of training the young has been entrusted to experienced persons.

The acquittal of John Reece on the charge of house breaking was about the best course the jury could take in view of the whole circumstances of the case. By their conduct the women who were disturbed at night have been inviting exactly such proceedings as those with which Reece was charged, and if the houses on the west side are to be of shanty nature, were closely looked after no such charges would have to be dealt with in the courts. On and after May 1, next, dealers will not be required to take out an internal revenue license to sell cigars and tobacco, as the McKinley bill abolishes the special tax now maintained on dealers in manufactured tobacco on that date.

A severe engagement was fought at Tokar on February 19 between the Egyptian troops who recently left El Teb and Osman Digma's forces. Nearly 1,000 lives were lost in the battle which followed the appearance of the Egyptians at Tokar.

The Wisconsin legislature has passed a joint resolution opposing the bill in Congress for the unlimited coinage of silver. The Senate voted unanimously for it. In the Assembly two Republicans, one United Labor and one Democrat voted against it.

For a hundred years past, at least 100 tribes in Africa have been at war with each other, and there is no prospect of peace yet. A battle was had and many lives were lost by going out and uttering a whoop, and all prisoners are young and freed satisfactorily roasted at the stake.

At the beginning of the Harrison administration, March 4, 1889, the cash balance in the treasury, which was a surplus, amounted to \$150,000,000. At the end of this fiscal year, June 30, 1891, there will be a deficit of \$10,000,000, and at the end of the next fiscal year, June 30, 1892, a deficit of \$84,000,000.

SENATOR TOMES joint resolution amending the Constitution relative to the salaries of certain state officers, and proposing to submit the matter to the people at the coming spring election, the salary to be fixed by the legislature if the people favor it, was passed; and the matter will accordingly now be submitted to the people at the spring election if the House approves and the Governor signs the bill.

The result of the investigations of the Senate committee of the auditor general's office shows that the amount allowed and paid to outside attorneys to do the work of the Attorney-General in 1890, for fees, is \$9,347.80. The expenses of said outside attorneys during aforesaid period, was \$1,215.53, making a total allowed by the Board of State Auditors for fees and expenses for such attorneys for 1890, of \$10,563.33.

Last year's cut of lumber at Menominee and Marquette was 483,067,104 feet, and well-posted lumbermen predict a larger cut for the coming season. These stupendous figures, that have been carefully compiled from reliable sources of information, show the growth of the Menominee River to be, at present, the largest lumber manufacturing point in the world, and the indications are that it will hold this exalted place for a number of years to come.—Chicago Herald.

Kansas requires for the instruction of her 500,614 school children 11,012 teachers, paying her male teachers \$12 and her female teachers \$34 a month.

These gentlemen live in what they themselves term the richest school district in the United States, and they opposed the erection of a building that will cost over \$3,000, inasmuch as there is already one \$50,000 house in that district.

It is expected that it will be ready for occupancy September 1st. The building will be heated by steam and lighted by gas or electricity.
