

Rural Rehabilitation Here Forestalls Tenancy Increase

Rural rehabilitation activities under the Resettlement Administration have been a safety net preventing many farmers in Schoecraft county from falling into the tenancy farmer class, according to Joseph L. Leisen, county supervisor of rural rehabilitation.

Approximately 200 families in Schoecraft county who have title and equity to their lands have been helped to maintain their ownership status by standard rural rehabilitation loans on chattels by debt adjustment, and by supervised farm operating plans. Without this aid many of them would have lost their equity and become tenants, Mr. Leisen said.

By extending similar aid to four families who are tenant farmers on a cash-rental lease or share-crop basis in Schoecraft county, the Resettlement Administration has helped them lay the foundation for future ownership. They are being helped through arrangements for longer and better leases and through standard R.A. loans to own their livestock, machinery, and equipment. This constitutes the first step toward farm ownership.

Improved conditions for many others among the three-hundred tenant farmers in Schoecraft county are expected to result from the tenancy legislation now before Congress. How serious the situation is in the nation is indicated by the fact that less than half the farmers own the farms they operate, and tenant farmers are increasing at the rate of 10,000 a year.

The number of tenant farmers in Schoecraft county increased from thirty in 1930 to thirty-three in 1937 and probably would have increased even more, except for rural rehabilitation aid.

Farmers Repay Loans To Resettlement Administration

A report issued this week by Joseph L. Leisen, Rehabilitation Supervisor, reveals that thirty loans totaling approximately \$17,600.00 have been made to farmers by the Rural Rehabilitation Division of the Resettlement Administration in Schoecraft and Lucan counties. At the present time, an amount in excess of twenty per cent has been repaid and three loans have been repaid in full.

Rural rehabilitation loans are made on a five year repayment basis, and usually call for twenty per cent repayment each year. In view of the fact that the first year is not as yet ended, this record is highly encouraging. The rehabilitation loaning program of the Resettlement Administration is one of supervised credit. Clients are selected on the basis of character, experience, and in addition a farm management plan is developed by the county rehabilitation supervisor in cooperation with the farmer.

Inasmuch as this program was designed for the low-income farmer, credit is not available for the individual who can secure the necessary financial assistance. Assistance is further limited to those farm families whose major income is from farming operations. Loans are made for such things as livestock, machinery, etc., on a five year basis, and for a two year period on feed, seed, etc. All loans are secured by chattel mortgages on the borrower's livestock, machinery and crop, during the duration of the loan.

At regular intervals, the county supervisor calls on each of the borrowers. Assistance is given in the keeping of farm record books which are required of all rehabilitation clients. A further purpose of these visits is to help in planning, care of livestock and crops, and to determine a solution to any problems that might arise.

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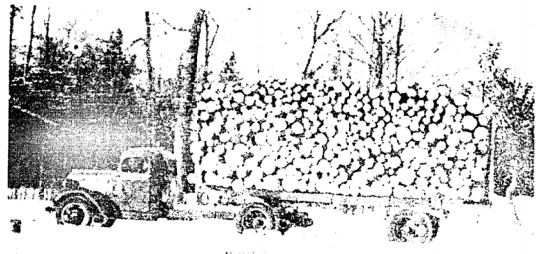
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PULPWOOD FOR 12,000 SUNDAY TRIBUNES

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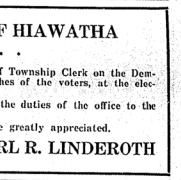

Tragedy Interspersed With Humor at Height of Flood

Bits of humor in the midst of tragedy are related in many sections of the Ohio and Mississippi River Valley, inundated by the January flood. In a letter to Roger White, assistant ranger in the Manistique district, A. J. Quinlan, United States forest ranger, reported that in Ironton, Ohio, residents a few of them:

"One of our young impecunious forester who was very zealous in his rescue work. Seeing a young damsel in distress he rushed to her aid. This young lady (200 pounds apparently) became flustered by the attention of the young forester and made a too enthusiastic leap to be gathered into his arms. The result was two badly soaked people who fell into a four-foot deep pool of muddy water, very much embarrassed foreman."

"Of efforts at rehabilitation. The community is slowly digging itself out of the mud. We had a few very cold days which hampered cleanup work considerably but it has since turned warm and the cleanup work with a vengeance. The only stores open last Saturday night were the J. C. Penny store and Kroger's ten cent store. There was not a restaurant in Ironton open that could accommodate customers. Sunday night at 5:00 p. m. our electricity was restored and, believe me, we have learned to appreciate electric power, principally because we were without radio communication all during the flood. It so happened that just a couple months ago I traded my battery set for an electric one. We still have the edge on a lot of folks with our gasoline motor washer."

"All in all, after taking into consideration the heatless, gasless condition of Ironton, we have come to the conclusion that we fared better entirely surrounded by water in town, even though our conditions seemed a little precarious at times when you could look about you and see buildings floating away. Over 25 per cent of the homes in West Ironton were washed down the river entirely."



HALL DESCRIBES SCHOOL AID BILLS

Urges Club To Support Federal and State Measures To Aid Poorer Districts

Support for proposed federal and state legislation which would bring badly needed financial relief to poorer school districts was requested by Arthur F. Hall, superintendent of Manistique schools, in a speech given before the Manistique Lions club.

The Harrison-Black-Pletcher bill, now pending in congress, would provide an outright grant to states for school aid. Mr. Hall said, "One of the federal school aid bills, he said, would give the federal government control over education. The present bill, however, would provide for the grant without 'any strings attached' and because of this fact it deserves the support of every individual and organization interested in education."

This bill, he said, would provide aid to the extent of \$2.54 per child the first year and would gradually be increased until the allotment to Michigan would approximate \$11,000,000. This means, he said, that "practically every Manistique school district would get \$11,000 a year. This financial aid is badly needed if the Manistique system is to maintain high educational and teaching standards. Mr. Hall declared that already local teachers are being attracted to more lucrative positions elsewhere because of the inability of the Manistique dis-

FLAMES DAMAGE JAMES HERRO HOME

Fire Department Called To Thompson Early Tuesday Morning

Fire which is believed to have started from an overheated chimney caused considerable damage to the home of James Herro, Thompson supervisor, early Wednesday morning. The back part of the house was badly damaged, but the Manistique fire department succeeded in controlling the flames before they enveloped the entire structure. The blaze was discovered when one of the Herro children awakened.

Starting in the partition between the first and second floors above the kitchen, the fire had spread considerably by the time the fire department was called and had arrived at the scene, soon after 4 o'clock. Hot lines were laid and water from the booster tank was used to extinguish the flames. Volunteers kept the tank filled with water taken from a nearby ditch.

The kitchen and bathroom were almost entirely destroyed before the blaze was brought under control, and other parts of the house were damaged from smoke. There was little damage from water. Loss has not been figured, but it will probably be several hundred dollars, it was said. The damage is partly covered by insurance.

Tuesday morning a car tank at the state highway garage burned when some of its star spilled onto a kerosene torch being used to heat the tank, and the entire vat ignited, causing a quantity of smoke. The heat from the flames scorched parts of the exterior of the garage and an adjoining building.

In the afternoon Tuesday, a fire broke out in the Russell Reed home, Garden avenue, but little damage was caused. The fire started from an overheated stove pipe, between the upper and lower stories of the house. It was extinguished by the fire department.
