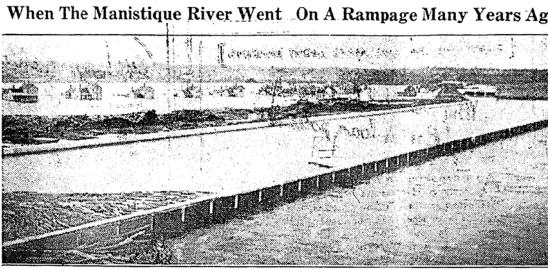

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## FIVE REASONS WHY

There are at least five good reasons why the Michigan legislature ought to pass the merit system legislation now before it.

The first is that introduction of merit system principles in Michigan will unquestionably improve the operation of the government. There can be no doubt but that government manned by staffs selected on the sole basis of merit can perform more efficiently and economically than government manned, as at present, by small-bore politicians chosen on the basis of spoils.

The second reason is that the vast majority of both the representatives and senators now sitting at Lansing exercise civil service in their campaign last November. Their collective word has been given, and they hence have a clear moral duty to act favorably on the pending bill.

The third reason, as advanced by the more far-sighted members of the present government, is that elimination of the spoils system will give them more time and more freedom for personal activity, both as legislators and politicians. It is Governor Murphy himself who said that, under the spoils system, for every man he is able to see on bona fide government business, there are twenty he must see about jobs. And many others have agreed that, for every vote a politician obtains through patronage, five are lost through the dissatisfaction of rejected applicants.

The fourth reason is that the people unmistakably want civil service. It is well nigh impossible to locate any layman in this state who is not opposed to the spoils system, or who does not wish to see Michigan adopt an honest civil service bill. Thus, if the legislature believes in democracy, it has no alternative but establishment of the merit system.

The fifth reason is plain politics. When the people want something—as they now want the merit system—it isn't smart politics to oppose it. There isn't a single legislator now sitting at Lansing who can't earn a big vote of appreciation from the home folks by getting behind the merit service bill.

So, whether the legislature chooses to act for reasons of good government, or morality, or personal efficiency, or popular demand, or political wisdom, or all of these put together, the result must be the same—namely, prompt passage of the merit system bill.

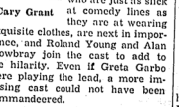

"When it comes to commodity, production, Florida is not as well situated as we are. The only mines are the extensive workings of phosphate beds, and lumbering is at a low ebb although the state bids fair to again become a large timber producer. Everything is tuned to the winter tourist and resorting industry, and the sun and sea are capitalized to the extent of millions of dollars. One striking particular is the average advanced age of Florida's patrons, the great majority of winter visitors being in the fifties, sixties, and even older. On the other

Youth Hostel Movement Here

The youth hostel movement which has grown to such proportions in Germany and Switzerland is beginning in a small way in Michigan, with the hope that it will eventually cover the entire state. The youth hostels which dot many parts of continental Europe are simply hotels for young people

of high school age, who can spend the night there while enjoying cross country hikes, bicycle trips or even motor car journeys. Inasmuch as many young people have to count the pennies, hostel costs are even lower than in the average camp or tourist home.

The European hostels offer the minimum prices of about 10 cents for a bed and 15 cents for breakfast, and lodgers are encouraged to do their own cooking. Each hostel has a house father and house mother to look after the needs of guests and to keep things in order. The buildings are often farm houses and a few rooms in order, and the inclination to pick up an extra dollar or two by catering to accredited hikers and bicyclists.

The first hostel loop is being established in the neighborhood of Ann Arbor, each building being about 16 miles from the next one, with a route forming a circle tour, only hikers will be accommodated at first, and they will utilize natural foot trails through the neighboring lake region. It is aimed to locate each hostel in a small community which will assume the responsibility for its upkeep and welfare.

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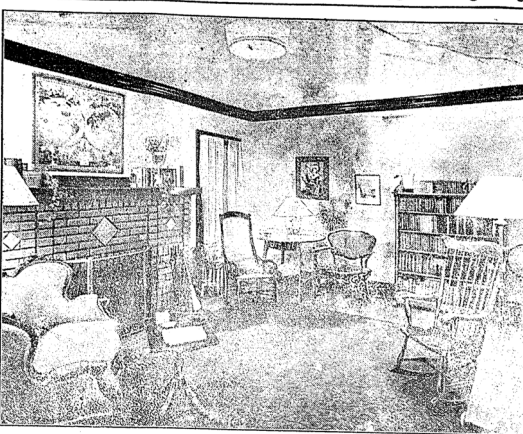

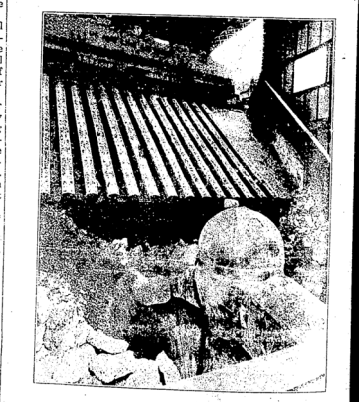
