**BULK OF DRIVERS' LICENSES TO EXPIRE**

**Michigan Police Begin Drive Against Unlicensed Operators**

On the heels of his recent announcement of a drive by police against unlicensed operators of motor vehicles, Leon D. Case, Secretary of State, points out that nearly 700,000 such licenses will expire during the next six months. The exact figure is 688,243.

Licensees cost \$1 and are good for three years. They are issued as provided in the Uniform Operators' and Chauffeurs' act of 1921, the result being that every third year following that date, the bulk of operators' licenses expire. Statutory case points out that a driver whose license has expired, is a different, in the eyes of the law, than one who never had a license at all, and that the only way to make certain of an operator's license, is for everyone to check his own expiration date at once. It is printed on every license.

All applications for operators' licenses must be approved by the chief of police if the applicant lives in a city or village having a chief of police, or by the sheriff, if the applicant lives elsewhere.

**Highway Board Increases Pay**

An order went out last week from State Highway Commissioner Van Wagener that an immediate wage increase for maintenance workers on the state trucking highway system.

The order provides for a general increase of 5 cents an hour in the maintenance wage and a minimum wage of 50 cents an hour for all maintenance workers. This compares with a previous minimum of 35 cents an hour.

The wage increase affects every trucking maintenance worker in each of the 83 counties. Increases will go not only to the workers in the 41 counties where the department has its direct maintenance organization but also the other counties where the county road commissions perform the work under contract with the department.

E. E. Blomgren, maintenance engineer for the state highway department, estimated the increase will add half a million dollars a year to the department budget. Approximately 2,400 workers are affected, he said.

In authorizing the wage increase, Commissioner Van Wagener said he was motivated by the rising cost of living.

"The previous scale of pay," he said in his order, "is out of proportion to the cost-of-living level at this time. I emphasize that this pay scale applies not only to the men of our own organization but also to the workers in the contract counties."
