

AUGUST EDITION OF HIGHWAY MAP NOW AVAILABLE

Trunkline Changes Are Made in Previous Edition Published in May

The August edition of the official Michigan highway map came into the press this week and is ready for immediate distribution. Except for corrections in trunkline mileage, the map is identical with the previous summer edition.

Changes were made not only in new construction since the last edition, but also in mileage and route determinations. The new edition also includes several weeks ago by the highway advisory and state administrative boards.

The accordion fold, first used last year, is again a feature of the edition along with mileage tables, a population table of principal cities and towns, routings of principal county roads, a state map of the metropolitan area, and scenic views of Michigan.

Murray D. Van Wageningen, state highway commissioner, said that 25,000 copies of the official map have been distributed to date this year. They are available to the public at no charge. Copies may be received by writing the commissioner at Lansing.

Warning Given in Connection With New Counterfeit Notes

The attention of all employees of financial institutions who are required to handle currency has been called to new counterfeit notes following the detection of counterfeits in a circular letter issued by the Federal Reserve Board in the past few weeks.

According to information given by Fred H. Habue, of the First National Bank, the Secret Service division of the Treasury department, in a circular letter issued on July 29, gives the following variations in connection with new counterfeit notes:

Silver Certificate
1927 Series, check, letter and face plate No. 20, set in lower right hand corner slightly above the facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Treasury; lack plate number 11111111; W. A. Julian, Treasurer of the United States; Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury; portrait of Washington.

This is a poorly executed counterfeit printed on paper heavier than the genuine.

The portrait background is printed heavily in black, failing to reveal the delicately etched cross-hatched lines which distinguish the too dark and Washington's hair too light.

The serial numbering, slightly smaller than that appearing on genuine notes, is applied carelessly and the Treasury seal is off-center in the imprint over Washington, D. C. The back of the note is printed with smudgy effect in dull, olive green.

Series of 1288, by check letter "72" and face plate No. 9 in lower right hand corner slightly above facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Treasury; lack plate No. 27; W. O. To aid in detecting this counterfeit, take a genuine \$20 Federal Reserve Note and examine the background surrounding the large figures 20 at the upper right-hand corner of the face of the note. On the genuine note you will see that five short white lines radiate from the bottom of the figures. Notice that these five lines are straight, clear and distinct. Then look at the lines that radiate from the figures 20 in the counterfeit note. They are not so clear and distinct as those in the genuine, but are irregular, uneven and broken. Look

Seney, Mich., Aug. 11.—The exhibit of the Biological Survey at the State Fair here today is one of the most interesting and valuable ever shown in Michigan. The Seney refuge is typical of millions of acres of northern wildlands which should be producing great quantities of game but some how are not. THIS WEEK—150 YEARS AGO

The Story of the Constitutional Convention of 1787

No soldier shall be quartered in any house in time of peace without the consent of the owner. The ratification of the Supreme Court that is extended to all citizens is a measure between the United States and an individual State and the citizens of an individual State.

These and other resolutions were referred to committee, many of them later to be incorporated in our finished Constitution. But it was over the war-making power that the most spirited discussion arose among delegates.

James Madison, of Virginia, urged that Congress be given power "to secure to literary authors their copyrights, and to establish a university." Charles Pinckney, of South Carolina, proposed Congressional authority "to grant patents for useful inventions, and to establish seminaries for the promotion of literature and the arts and sciences."

He offered various other amendments, some of which later appeared in our Bill of Rights. Among the Pinckney proposals were the following:

"The liberty of the press shall be inviolably preserved."
"The privileges and benefit of the writ of Habeas Corpus shall be enjoyed in this Government as in the most liberal State."
"The troops shall be kept up in time of peace, but by consent of the Legislature."

"The City of Cheboygan," Michigan's New Ferry Boat, in Straits Service This Week

"The City of Cheboygan," Michigan's new ferry boat, was in service this week after a christening program at which Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagener again sounded a need for a bridge across the Straits of Mackinac.

Declaring "the prejudice against a bridge has not been broken," the commissioner suggested the use of four and caravan tactics used by pioneers of the good roads movement. "Let the skeptics," he said, "be brought to the Straits on a holiday trip and let them see for themselves."

The commissioner said he would insist "that no penalty be attached to the highway development program" in Michigan in the bridge undertaking.

Commissioner Van Wagener announced that bids will be taken shortly on the construction of a new streamlined boat with a 150-horsepower capacity and powered by Diesel engines. New specifications for this boat, just received, abandon previous ice-crushing plans. Only one bid was received when the work was advertised a year ago and it was regarded as excessive. The commissioner said he expected more competition in the new bidding and a low bid "that will fit the pocketbook."

The commissioner also revealed that the highway department is studying current plans to shorten the Straits course from one to 3 1/2 miles by relocating the St. Ignace dock; to beautify the St. Ignace side of the Straits with a park in-

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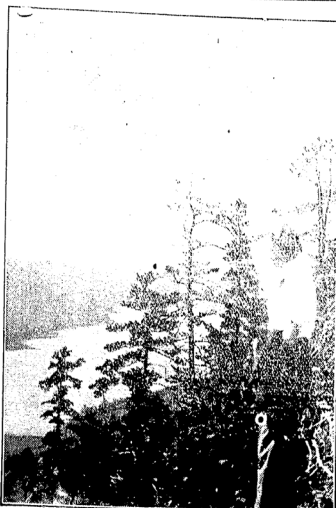

Spawning Run Of Sea Lamprey Recorded By Conservationists

The first record of a spawning run of the sea lamprey in the upper Great Lakes and of the presence of this destructive marine predator in Lake Huron has been received by the department of conservation.

The information was supplied by Dr. John Van Oosten, in charge of Great Lakes investigations for the United States Bureau of Fisheries, Ann Arbor.

Dr. Van Oosten has received from Rogers City three sea lampreys, two of which were females filled with nearly ripe eggs. The lampreys were caught in Ocqueoc river by M. L. Norton, conservation officer, who supplied data indicating that a heavy spawning run of sea lampreys probably occurred in the Ocqueoc last spring.

Norton's capture of the three specimens followed a report by two Rogers City boys who had been swimming in Ocqueoc river about a quarter-mile below the falls that "there were hundreds of eels in the river." The boys said they had thrown several of the "eels" out on the bank, some of them two feet in length.

Norton visited the locality and captured the three lampreys with a dip net, one of the specimens being a male measuring nearly 15 1/2 inches in length and the others being females, exceeding 12 and 15 inches in length, respectively.

An indication of the effect of the lamprey run on the commercial fish supply in Hammond bay, into which the Ocqueoc empties,

was learned by Norton in an interview with Clarence Mertz of the Mertz Fisheries, Rogers City. Mertz said that the catch of lake trout in Hammond bay dropped to "practically nothing" during the month of June while an increase of scoured trout was noted among these taken. Norton conjectured that the lampreys probably had completed their spawning run in the Ocqueoc early in June and then migrated back into Hammond bay becoming more active in their quest for food, driving the fish away.

The lamprey attacks fish, attaching itself to its victim by means of a sucking mouth. It then rasps a hole through the skin of the fish and gorges itself on its victim's blood.

Authorities at Lansing and at Ann Arbor have asked Mertz and other commercial fishermen to watch for the spawning run of lampreys in the Ocqueoc as well as any other stream next spring

and notify them. Efforts will then be made to destroy every lamprey found.

The lamprey spawning run in the Ocqueoc is the first record of sea lampreys on the upper Great Lakes, this marine parasite being comparatively a newcomer to Lake Huron and Michigan from Lake Erie. Fisheries men regard it as a menace to the future commercial fish supply.

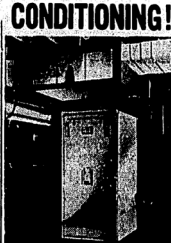

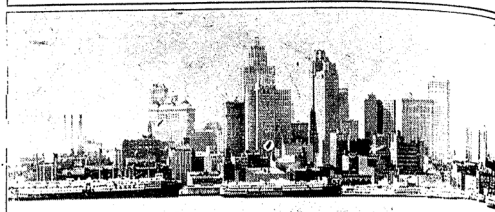

James Knox, of Camp Manistique, William Gaultier, regional project superintendent, and Duncan Cameron, foreman at Camp Manistique, an emergency project was set up, and a crew of 20 CCC employees were transferred to the lake to aid the conservation men in removing the dead fish from the water and shoreline.

By Friday night, the entire lake was cleared and the shoreline cleaned. A close watch is being kept on the lake to keep the shoreline from the pollution caused by the decaying bodies of suckers.

Indian Lake offers fine fishing, bathing and boating, and is an ideal spot for vacationists, but with polluted bodies of tons of suckers contaminating the water and shoreline, conservation officials were fearful lest the pollution would kill all species of fish, and drive resorters from the lake because of the odor.

With the removal of the fish from the water as rapidly as they are noticed, however, this emergency has been effectively met.

Conservation Officer Taylor, the fire personnel, CCC officials and enrollees have received thanks and appreciation from resort owners and tourists at Indian Lake, as well as from residents of Manistique, for their work.

Conservation officials denied rumors that dynamite are responsible for the mass death of the suckers. A close guard has been maintained on the lake, particularly
