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McCINTYRE WINS IN PISTOL SHOOT

Second Place At National Meet Goes To Detroit Policeman

John L. McIntyre, member of the Detroit police force and son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. McIntyre, of Manistique Heights, won second place and a silver medal in the Class A 22 caliber pistol shoot held at Camp Perry, Ohio, this month, records of the headquarters of the national matches show.

McIntyre, shooting as a member of the Detroit police team, scored 87 in the Class A shoot, firing 20 shots slow fire at 25 meters with a .22 rim-fire pistol. He also placed first in the Class B event, with a score of 87.

There were 162 of the Class A shooters in the national matches at Camp Perry. 124 were entered in the Class A event, and 38 in the Class B contest.

McIntyre gained considerable fame two years ago when he established a new high record in the pistol shoot conducted among 4200 members of the Detroit police force. He and a brother, Robert G. McIntyre, who is also a pistol shot, both joined the Detroit force nine years ago.

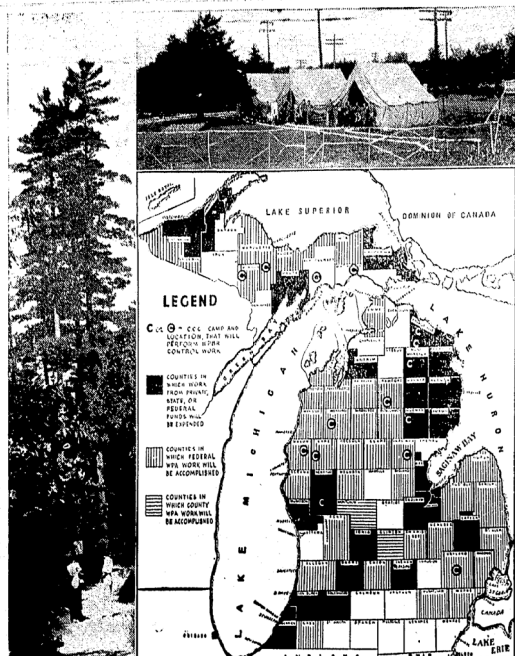

White Pine in Schoolcraft County Protected From Rust

Two hundred twenty-four man days were spent in Schoolcraft county in protecting 185 acres of white pine against blister rust during the year ending July 1, according to the announcement made by the United States Government, which places the value of \$10,000,000 upon pine of the state, with commercial value placed at \$29,915,000, according to the annual report submitted by E. C. Mandenberg, leader, to Commissioner Strange.

"Although the state does not have nearly," the report pointed out, "the white pine lumber it once had, white pine is still of great economic importance to Michigan. There are thousands of acres of second growth and reproduction which are not valuable only commercially, but are of even greater value to the state from an aesthetic standpoint. About half of the pine average in the state is accessible to the tourist since the high ways are found near parks, around lake-shores and in villages. Since Michigan is a leading recreational center, this pine has great scenic value. In reforesting thousands of acres of its idle land, white pine is considered one of the valuable species used in planting. Good planting sites are available in every section of Michigan."

"The best estimate," the report continues, "of commercial value of white pine in Michigan is about \$4,000,000, while the aesthetic value is at least \$10,000,000 more. The extent of white pine lumber production in the state as shown in the 1934 census is about 20 to 25 million board feet of white pine cut of which the mill value is \$22.75 per thousand. In addition to the commercial value in the state a tentative estimated aesthetic value of \$10,000,000 based on 77,400 acres of outstanding recreational pine areas must be added, bringing total value of white pine in Michigan to \$33,915,005."

In submission of his program for the coming year, Mandenberg pointed out that materially reduced appropriations would necessitate a reduction of work but that progress could be made in the control of the disease. During the past three years emergency program organizations have been the largest contributors but with reduced appropriations, work must be curtailed.

To protect the white pine of the state, crews are through the remaining stands and protective area of 500 feet surrounding the pine, eradicated all host plants. Ribes are abundant throughout the state, especially on the heavier soils and cultivated ribes are common everywhere. Altogether there are eight species of wild ribes found in the state, three kind of gooseberries, which are found on the upland and

five species of currants which occur in swamps. "Because of its high susceptibility to and power of transmitting the disease to other host plants, the cultivated black currant is probably the greatest single factor in the spread of the disease within the state. Each year the currant infection from Ribes and black currant and over half of the known pine infections have been traced directly to this plant. It has been generally and abundantly distributed throughout Michigan and the state has paid its eradication. Since the plant was outlawed in 1929, the accomplishments in this important activity to date are: 26 counties entirely covered; 20 counties have been rechecked, a total of 109,232 black currant bushes have been removed from 10,828 locations."

Five Species Of Ducks Protected

Five species of wild ducks as well as fess's geese and swans, may not be shot legally in Michigan or any place in the United States this fall under federal migratory waterfowl and state regulations. The species of ducks protected are canvasbacks, redheads, wood ducks, ruddy duck and buff-necked duck.

SOAP AND WATER Aid In Prevention Of Skin Disease
(By Dr. E. J. Brenner)
One of the most common of skin diseases in children is impetigo. It goes hand in hand with uncleanness and is therefore found very frequently where there has been a lack of use of soap and water. It is a contagious disease spread by the common use of clothing, towels, handkerchiefs, and so forth. As a rule it is found most frequently on the exposed parts of the body such as face, scalp and hands. It is characterized by blebs and vesicles which rupture and a thin water like crust forms.

TEACHERS AND EDUCATION

Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of public instruction, points out in the current edition of the Michigan Education Journal that the state legislature recently adjourned has provided more state aid than ever before for carrying forward Michigan's education program.

Upon the shoulders of the teaching profession falls the responsibility of using these added resources to the best advantage. In the cities and the far-flung rural areas of the state, schools already have opened for the new school year.

Mr. Elliott points out that "jointly with these teachers the department of public instruction is carrying forward a co-operative undertaking for the improvement of teaching.

Progress in any field of human endeavor is vitally dependent upon the efficiency of the educational system. Founders of the state and nation, recognizing this fundamental fact, made education compulsory.

Michigan today is in a ranking position with reference to standards for teachers, and no expenditure of public funds brings a greater return than that for maintenance of a top notch education system staffed by the best of instructors.

SCHOOL ZONE HAZARDS

The current bulletin of the state highway department reminds motorists they should exert added vigilance in their driving when passing near schools or playgrounds to avoid any possibility of injuring children.

"Children lack judgment in crossing busy streets," the bulletin points out, "and may suddenly and without apparent reason, dart from curb or shoulder of road directly into the path of a moving car."

"A careful motorist always reduces his speed and sounds his horn when approaching a child or children on or near the roadway. By so doing, he gains their attention and then, should they make some unexpected move, he is in a position to stop before striking one of them."

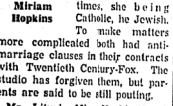

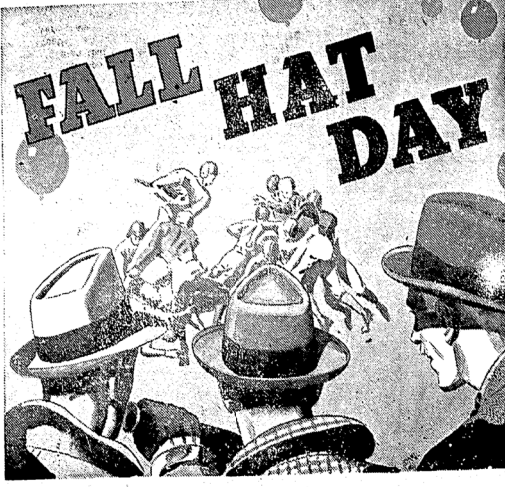

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

Happenings That Affect the Dinner Plate, Dividend Checks and Tax Bills at Every Individual, National and International Problems Inseparable from Local Welfare.

Even as agriculture is dependent on industry to absorb the products of the farm, so is the urban United States vitally dependent on rural farming America to provide a gentle market for the products of its factories—everything from pins to motor cars.

As a result, it is as important to industry and finance as to agricultural America itself to have some reasonably accurate idea of what farm income in the immediate future will be, what change, if any, has occurred in farm operating costs that would affect net income; what farming states will be the most prosperous and so constitute the largest and most profitable market for manufactured goods, etc. Business Week has recently made a highly inclusive report on "The Farm Market Today—and Tomorrow."

This will be the best agricultural year, from the point of view of gross income, since booming 1929. This does not mean that the agricultural situation is vastly improved in every phase—some crops will command lower prices and in some states improvements have been relatively slight. But, looking at agriculture as a whole, 1929 should produce the first really good farm market of eight years.

The farmers' cash income from crop and livestock marketing is estimated at \$4,750,000,000 for the period from August 1 to January 1, 1930, as compared with \$4,375,000,000 in the same period a year ago, a gain of about 8 per cent. This figure does not include Federal benefits which will be approximately 10 per cent of the farmers' total cash income and will probably come to almost \$200,000,000 as against \$130,000,000 in the comparable period of 1929. Consequently, total gross farm cash income will not be far from \$5,000,000,000 in the six-month period.

Other factors beside higher income will exert a beneficial influence on agricultural purchasing power. The farm mortgage debt is about one and three-quarters billions less than it was in 1929. Interest rates have registered a decline and the carrying charge of this debt is now about \$465,000,000, as against a \$740,000,000 in 1929. The 1929 farm tax bill does not mean that the agricultural situation is vastly improved in every phase—some crops will command lower prices and in some states improvements have been relatively slight. But, looking at agriculture as a whole, 1929 should produce the first really good farm market of eight years.

Harley W. Holmes, President of Association, Gives Out Statement

Recent announcement by the state budget director, Harold D. Smith, of a ten per cent cut in state-aid for schools, has brought the following comment from Harley W. Holmes, president of the Michigan Education Association, to the attention of school boards.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the association, Mr. Holmes said:

"Inasmuch as the governor was authorized to make such deductions in allotments as he deems necessary, public schools of the state are seeking an explanation for the basis upon which the cut was made. We are hopeful that budget director Smith could give us this information today, but his office reported that he would be unable to meet with us this time. We hope to meet with the state budget director later in this week."

"Newspaper accounts quote the budget director as saying that the state-aid cut will be 10 per cent on budget school boards throughout the state are making up their minds this week. School boards, however, were prepared last spring or in the early summer so that preparations could be made during the summer for the opening of school this September. Throughout the state, school budgets have been adopted with the expectation of receiving the full amount of State-aid as appropriated by the Legislature and approved by the governor.

"At the beginning of the recent session of the Michigan Legislature, public schools asked for \$47,000,000 state-aid annually as a minimum necessary to provide a minimum education program for Michigan's children. The Legislature reduced this by twelve and one-half per cent when they cut this appropriation to \$40,000,000.

"Allowances for the reduction made by the Legislature have been included in school budgets for the present year. On the basis of these budgets, contracts have been entered into with teachers, supplies and equipment have been purchased, and many other necessary expenditures have been made. Local taxes have been established and it is now too late to raise more money locally. A ten per cent reduction in state-aid at this late hour leaves most school boards with two alternatives—either to finish the school year with a deficit, or to cut teachers' salaries."
