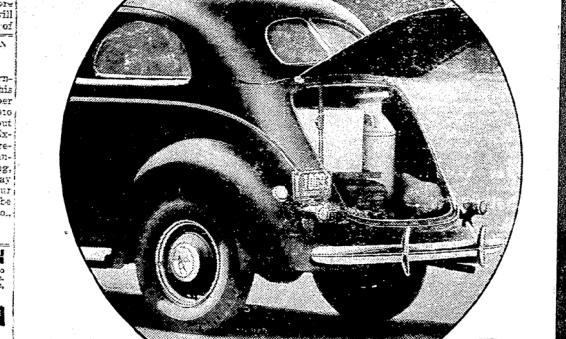

NATIONAL FOREST STREAMS IMPROVED

Restoration Of Balance Of Productivity Is Aim Of Forest Service

The denudation of our water sheds has resulted in the partial destruction of trout environment on some streams and completely ruined others. The greatest harm has come from erosion which has resulted from the removal of the timber from the water sheds. Sand and other material has been dumped into the streams. This keeps continually shifting and filling up holes which are the natural hiding and resting places for trout. Natural propagation is hindered due to the covering up of spawning beds and a shifting of the sand so that a percentage of the spawn is destroyed. In order to have a productive stream it is necessary to have permanent beds of vegetation. The shifting condition of stream bottoms is prohibitive to vegetation establishment.

As a result of the spreading out of streams, the reduction in rate of flow, the filling in of springs, and the removal of adequate cover, many streams have become excessively warm. The majority of streams within the forest are low gradient streams and as a result, the above factors have had a decided influence on the water temperature. During the hot summer days unless a stream is fed by good cold springs, has sufficient cover and a fairly rapid rate of flow, the water temperature will be such that trout cannot thrive. It is impossible to restore the natural conditions which formerly existed. However, by the use of artificial means the condition of our streams can be vastly improved. By practicing stream improvement we may hope to develop the following requisites which contribute to the development of a good trout stream, namely: pure water (by pure water we mean water absent from industrial or human waste), favorable temperature ranges, breeding areas, adequate shelter, protection and food supply.

The CCC program has afforded the Forest Service the necessary man power to initiate a vast stream improvement program. CCC crews under the direction of Forest Service supervisors, well equipped with boats, axes, hammers, shovels, saws, nails, wire, etc., have intensively improved approximately 25 miles of stream in the Upper Michigan National Forest within the past three years.

In carrying out the work it has been the objective to restore the balance of productivity of the streams. Springs which have been filled in by erosion have been cleaned out and ditched into the streams, deflectors of various types have been constructed to dig out holes, uncover spawning beds, increase the rate of flow and build up bars upon which vegetation can establish itself. The planting of willow, alder and aspen saplings along the streams has been done to furnish cover. Many types of cover have been established to offer hiding places for the fish. Stumps which are dragged into the streams and anchored by stakes and wire prove to be effective natural covers which create deep cool holes. Sand banks which gradually wash away and result in the filling up of the stream have been tied down by log retaining walls, sod tree planting and rip-rap work. In the final analysis stream improvement devices and practices have been used which will produce a more suitable trout habitat.

In addition to stream improvement work the Forest Service, during the season of 1935 and 1936, distributed approximately 8,000,000 fish. Under the direction of Forest Service foremen the fish were received by enrollees at the state hatcheries or at the Bureau of Fisheries camps and transported to the various lakes and streams for planting. In this type of work it is necessary to take great care and keep the correct temperature. By means of ice the temperature is maintained and aeration is secured by the use of pumps or dippers. Fish planting is a very responsible job. Enrollees have shown particular interest in the job and have proven to be very satisfactory planters.
