

FLOTSAM AND JETSAM

People of the upper peninsula learn much sorrow and regret from the death of Father William Francis Garmour, who was known for years throughout the north coast as the last of the "Black Friars." Death came in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, on February 7, to the 79-year-old priest, and funeral services were conducted in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, on Thursday, February 11.

For 50 years the beloved priest taught the Gospel of God to the Indians of the Great Lakes region, and his arrival on the north coast to the very end after illness had forced his retirement, he wanted to go out and make his calls in the out-of-the-way places. He was a master of Indian dialect, and at one time made a trip to the University of Michigan to make a phonographic record of the Indian languages he had mastered.

Throughout the Great Lakes country he was known as the last of the "Black Robe" priests. Shortly after his arrival half a century ago to the Manitowish islands he adopted into the Chipewyan tribe and given the name of "Pekinaway," which means "warrior."

A great eulogy to the famous priest was given by Father Philip Gaudet, rector of the Holy Trinity of Wisconsin, who spoke at a testimonial banquet for Father Garmour this past year ago. He said: "To you, Pekinaway, I shall always remember what you did for my people."

Tourist resort and cabin owners in the Manitowish district looked upon an article published in the last week's issue of the Pioneer-Tribune describing an experiment in Newcanon county where a small tourist cabin was built for \$125, including \$75 for material and \$50 for labor. The article was enough to stir the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau to Michigan newspapers.

To build a good quality tourist cabin—the kind that resort associations are urging business men to build—the money spent on the Keweenaw county model cabin is entirely inadequate, one Manitowish cabin owner pointed out in a letter to the editor. He says that a tourist cabin built for \$125, including \$75 for material and \$50 for labor, is not comfortable enough to appeal to the average tourist. To build one of them, the cost for material was about \$200. Labor costs are about \$30. This, he says, is about as cheap as a tourist cabin can be built, and would indicate that the Keweenaw county model cabin is too small and cheaply constructed to appeal to the average tourist. Furnishings for an average cabin purchased wholesale come to about \$95. Other expenses would include providing fresh water, electricity, and heating. The cost of building and making an average tourist cabin replete with the amenities that resort associations should encourage the construction of cabins of this type makes a cabin of this type which can be built at less expense than the money saved is likely to be lost when tourists leave dissatisfied.

One of the evils of party politics is the sacrifice of excellent public servants in an effort by one or another party to gain greater control of public affairs. The Democrats this spring are going to make a strong effort to defeat Justices McCreary and North for the state supreme court; likewise the Republicans will make a fight to dislodge Judge D. Van Wagoner as state highway commissioner. From the standpoint of the average citizen who wants first rate public service changes are unwise, both constructive and destructive. The members of the state's supreme bench, and it would be better to sacrifice them for the Van Wagoner has proved himself a wide-awake, capable and constructive highway chief, and there is no reason to expect a partisan one for his retirement. All three should be re-elected.

Further, it is interesting to note that the original name of the community was Espeport. Mr. Beauvais described the program of this organization as that of a business government from its inception in Staunton, Virginia, where Charles E. Hooper became the first city manager under what is known as the Lockport plan in 1908. "Until 1919," the speaker said, "only 16 cities in the United States operated under this plan; today there are 486 cities in the United States, 404 in Indiana, two in Ohio, one in Iowa and one in Cuba thus governed."

City Will Buy Machine To Find Radio Interference

Acting on authority granted by the Manistiquie city council Monday evening, P. H. Beauvais, city manager, Tuesday ordered a radio interference "finder" to locate the cause of poor radio reception in Manistiquie.

William DeHut, representing Hans DeHut, residents, appeared at the council meeting to ask for action on the interference which has been ruining radio reception in the city for two months. The council promptly agreed to take action and, upon recommendation of the city manager, authorized the purchase of the interference detecting machine. This will cost approximately \$120, but will serve the city for years and will be much cheaper than employment of an outside radio engineer. The city manager had offered to send him here to locate the trouble, but fixed his \$100 day plus expenses. The council promptly turned down the offer.

The council also authorized the manager to employ a radio man to operate the interference detector at a rate of salary not to exceed \$125 per month.
