State Control of Outdoor Advertising Being Sought

By GENE ALEXMAN Michigan Press Association Lansing—Commercial Association of Michigan's scenic beautification billboards that obstruct the view would be put under public control if Senate Bill No. 72, introduced by Senator Macfarland, is passed by the legislature here.

1887-88 he was foreman at Camp 31.

In the spring of 1888 he bought a yoke of oxen and moved to his homestead at Gerafsk on which he had filed claim previously. He made the trip by way of the old river road. In the fall of 1889 a logging road was extended as far as the site of the present village of Gerafsk, which was then a banking ground on the river commonly known among lumberjacks as "The Dump." In 1890 he started a general store which he operated until 1930.

On June 23, 1896, Mr. McDougall was united in marriage to Nellie Robinson in Manistique. The ceremony was performed by Elder Fowler. She died in November, 1900. Two children were born to them, Herb and Mrs. Jack (Irene) Heath. On July 29, 1903, he was married to Audie Clomena of which union two children were born, Lorne, who was killed in the J. J.

Mr. McDougall has been supervisor of Gerafsk township for 14 years and he was a member of the Schoolcraft county road commission for two years. At the present time he is serving his eleventh year as a notary public, which office he has held since 1904. He embraces a period of 44 years.

Despite his advanced years he is still in splendid physical condition and his mind is unusually keen. One of his greatest delights is trout fishing, and throughout the county he is known as an expert angler.

Mr. McDougall has three grand children, Jacquelyn Heath and Jackie and Lorne Lantz.
