LANSING, Mich., July 20.—The state tax levy is now being prepared by accountant Tompkins. The total appropriations made by the legislature aggregate \$3,594,830 46, of which \$2,064,921 13 is for 1914 and \$1,529,909 33 for 1915; for 1916 the tax levy will be \$1,925,000 and for 1917, \$1,950,000 in round numbers. In 1894 the tax levy was \$1,843,449 61.

WIPED OUT. The Town of Ewen, Ontonagon County Mich., Totally Destroyed by Fire. The village of Ewen, 35 miles west of Ishpeming on the main line of the Duluth South Shore & Atlantic Railway, was almost wiped out by fire Thursday afternoon. The fire started at 1:30 P. M., and no one seems to know its origin. The town is only five years old, being built on land thrown open to settlement in 1891. It was the largest town in Ontonagon county, and had a population of about 2,000. The business blocks were of wood and the fire spread rapidly beyond the control of the local fire department. The railway depot containing the only telegraph office was one of the first buildings burned, and all communication was cut off from E. W. M. until late at night, when a temporary wire was stretched up. Every business place but two was burned and a number of residences. The loss is variously estimated at \$100,000 to \$200,000. Insurance light and in most cases none, as the rates were considered too high. So far as known no lives were lost, though several narrow escapes occurred.

Louis Danto one of the heaviest losers the Ewen fire was interviewed by the Marquette Mining Journal as follows: "At 1:30 o'clock Thursday I was worth \$25,000 and today I came down to Marquette to buy a coat and vest. That will perhaps give you the best conception of the amount of damage the fire did to me and I am a fair representative of thirty-three other business men of Ewen, although they did not all lose as great an amount as that. At 3 o'clock the whole town had been done. All the houses were destroyed but hardly what they had already destroyed, having not been visited by which our might tell the nature of the business carried on three hours before. I was fortunate enough to save my wife and child, and got scolded in doing so, but I lost my losses as light when my family escaped so fortunately. Thirty-four business houses were destroyed but hardly a laboring man's property was injured a dollar's worth. There has been a lot of suffering and none is anticipated as we are quite capable of looking after ourselves. No one was seriously injured and not a life was lost. You see, the residence portion of the town was not touched and there was in consequence plenty of shelter offered the few of us who lived near by over our stores. "I shall begin rebuilding again as soon as the insurance is adjusted. I had a very fine store and full stock but I must content myself, like other unfortunate, by beginning all over again. There were others there who will feel their losses more than I, but they will be well looked after and you need not say anything about suffering or destitution for those who remain.
