**THE GOVERNOR GENERAL**

**Functions and Predecessors of Canada's Chief Executive.**

He is the Queen's Personal Representative in the Dominion—His Position toward the Government and the Cabinet.

The governor general is the embodiment of the connection between the Dominion of Canada and the Imperial Government. He is the Queen's Personal Representative in the Dominion—His Position toward the Government and the Cabinet.

Lord Derby has now been succeeded by the earl of Aberdeen, a nobleman who is favorably known in the United States by his prolonged visits to this country. His wife is a public-spirited woman who has materially assisted in preparing one department of the Columbian exhibition.

To enable a governor general's wife to himself as of public influence is not unreasonable. While he is the queen's official representative, she is, as much as he, the queen's social representative. It is from the social position of the pair that much of their influence proceeds.

Her example is quoted and followed in the Dominion. Upon the quality of her entertainments, her favorite guests, her costume, the purposes she promotes, depends much whether society in Canada shall be extravagant or moderate, frivolous or seemingly a power for good, or for evil during her time.

There is no telling to what precise degree a governor general assists in governing, says the Youths' Companion. In all ordinary cases his position toward the government in Canada is identical with that of the minister toward the British cabinet. He "takes the advice"—that is, he follows it—of the government. The minister is responsible, and he is not.

But this statement does not tell all the story. Sometimes, very rarely, the governor general has taken steps against the government. Perhaps it would express the truth to say that in some few cases, for example, where the Imperial and the Canadian interests clash, the governor general has been known to become the adviser of the ministry, instead of taking the advice of the ministry.

In such cases the well-known opinion of the queen's representative may have induced the Canadian prime minister to modify his own views, though strictly he might have insisted on carrying through his own plans.

Apart from official dealings with political parties the governor general has public influence which is sometimes beneficially employed. Lord Dufferin, speaking unofficially, did much to allay a dangerous resentment, excitement in British Columbia. Each of his successors has had and embraced at least one opportunity to assist in maintaining or restoring political peace.

Canadians believe, and no doubt they are right, that since the position of the governor general is that of a sort of arbiter between parties, no Canadian could fill the place satisfactorily. If he had part in that one party rather than the other he would be suspected of having it. But an Englishman, who cares nothing about their old political quarrels, has the respect and confidence of both parties.

The French Canadians in particular look upon the governor general as a balwart of their liberties. These liberties—the rights of their church, the civil law, the free and official use of their language, were granted when Quebec fell before the power of England, and have been repeatedly confirmed since that time. The governor general is the representative of the power which forbids the guarantee to be violated.

**JUDGE PHILIP STEIN.**

First Jew Ever Elected to the Bench in Cook County.

Philip Stein, a judge of the superior court of Chicago, is the first Jew ever elected to the bench in Cook county. He has been a practicing lawyer in Chicago since November, 1866, when he was admitted to the Illinois bar. His career since then has been one to command the respect of his fellow-citizens was shown, says Frank Kelly's Weekly, during the campaign preceding his election, when his adversaries in the fight and papers representing and championing his opponents referred to him as a "barren lawyer and a man of high character," and one who "is clearly a fellow, like many other popular notions about the animal world."

Mr. Stein was born March 17, 1814, in Hohen Prussia, near the town of Essen, and commenced going to school when only four years old. He emigrated in 1824, settled in Wisconsin near Vanhook, where the boy worked on the farm and went to school till 1829, when the family moved to Milwaukee. There young Stein attended school, and later he became a student at the state university of Wisconsin, from which he was graduated valedictorian of his class in 1835.

Not content with the full classical course of his college, he went to Europe and devoted two years to the study of civil law, philosophy and history at the universities of Heidelberg, Bonn and Berlin. On returning to this country he settled in the office of the Milwaukee law firm of Butler & Winkler, under whom he studied the science of the law till 1838, when he was admitted to the bar of Milwaukee.

A month later he came to Chicago. Judge Stein has never figured in active politics, but he has always shown a keen interest in matters pertaining to this country and the city of Chicago. In Jewish societies and organizations he has figured prominently, and for a number of years served as the secretary of the United Hebrew Relief society of Chicago. Judge Stein was married in 1824 to Miss Anna Stein, of Chicago, and has a family of five daughters.

**AN ABLE YOUNG MAN.**

"The strong character of the mother, too, shows in the face of the son," says the New York square-set jaws of the son. He is, moreover, a very pleasant-spoken, approachable young man, much more so than his father, who is a rule, brusque and not over-courteous. The younger Carlisle was elected by the legislature to the legislature of the Washington and Lee university at Lexington, Va., from which institution he was graduated in 1893. Shortly afterward he opened a law office in Livingston, but after a short stay there removed to Wichita, Kan., where he practiced his profession for several years. He returned east and became interested in politics, being connected with the democratic national committee throughout the two last presidential campaigns. He has always been in the front rank in Washington or Kentucky acted as his private secretary. Mr. Carlisle is unmarried and lives with his parents at Edinburgh on E. Street.

For many years the nutmeg tree has been grown; it is only recently that its cultivation has received serious attention. To start a nutmeg plantation the ground must be cleared at a cost of six pounds per acre. Numan trees should be planted forty feet apart. Meanwhile, the nutmeg seeds should be carefully reared in the nursery. In about two years the seedlings should be planted out. Unless the locality is very favorable, ten years must elapse before the trees begin to be productive. A large number will be of the male sex, and, as the proportion of male to female trees should not exceed one in thirty, the planter will have to cut down the trees freely as soon as their sex is declared. It is reckoned that nutmegs should yield an annual profit to the planter of about ten shillings per tree.—Lord Brassey, in Fortnightly Review.

**A Birthmark That Earned a Reward.**

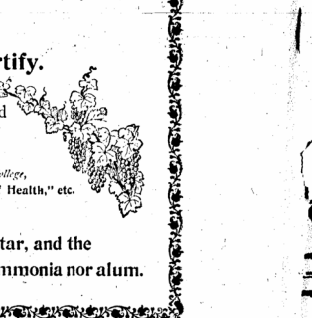

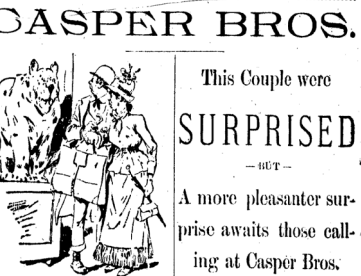
