AN INDIAN BUSH.

FRIGHTENED WILD ANIMALS PREVENT A HORRIBLE MASSACRE.

A Campaigner Retains a Thrilling Episode of the Struggle With the Indians in the Northwest—The three-day massacre of a Half-Breed Guide Saved 500 Lives.

We were going down to the peninsula formed by the junction of the Yellowstone and Little Missouri rivers, hoping to intercept the Indians and turn them back. It had been a hard, swift march—a ride of over 400 miles—with no halt above four hours, and at the end of the long day the troops were sleeping in their saddles as their lean and lame horses picked their way over the rough ground.

We had planned to reach the spot where the fleeing Indians would cross the Little Missouri day or two after this. We had believed we had accomplished it. At 10 o'clock we were within two miles of the spot. Then the head of the column halted for the night. Our main body for the night, or a mile or more. Between us and the crossing, as the night was made, nature had made a highway. It was a great road about 20 feet wide, consisting of a row of sharp, pointed rocks. Either side was lined with dense alders. Half a mile down the highway it was a half a mile further on was a second creek.
