



OUR MEMORIES COLUMN of last week attracted a lot of comment but not everyone knew what a lumber schooner looked like. Although the photo we used was a good one, it was hard to tell anything about the general lines of the ship since only a part of the deck showed in that photograph. The photo above is of a

three-masted schooner moored at Thompson in 1911. She is built along traditional lines, with gaff-rigged mains, a long bow-sprit for plenty of headsails and room for topsails above the mains. The deckhouse is at the stern, which probably housed the galley and the Captain's room. We're not sure whether the

crew had quarters here, or if they had a foc'sle arrangement under the foredeck. But she's a nice-looking girl and apparently well equipped. We received duplicate photos from Glyn Stone and Mrs. A. Nelson.
