On The RECORD

In presenting his case to the American immigration authorities, John Strachey, the British author and lecturer, who was barred the other day from entering this country, denied that he was a communist.

It is axiomatic, though something woefully forgotten, that every public "right" carries with it a reciprocal responsibility.

It is considered, inside our own philosophy, as having a definite social purpose, that of a means of presenting grievances, seeking redress, publicly presenting a case for change, even for revolution.

Its first responsibility is a moral responsibility—in fact, the whole foundation of "democracy" is a moral foundation.

Mr. Strachey, did not enter the United States, but in his talk with the immigration authorities, he willfully misrepresents facts.

For it is a conscious tactic of the Communist party to use its "front men," people who are not members of the Party, in order that they should be able to make precisely the statement that Mr. Strachey made to the immigration authorities.

Mr. Strachey is an educated gentleman, from a family of eminent English intellectuals, and he is particularly useful in presenting the case for Communism to "bourgeois" audiences.

Because the "Party Line" is not a policy, a tactic, or even a philosophy, developed by American or British followers of the political and economic ideas of Karl Marx, but is a policy rigidly laid down by the Comintern, which is rigidly controlled by the government of Josef Stalin.

The Communist party is not even a political party, in the accurate sense of the word. It is an international conspiratorial movement, exactly as the Nazi party is.

And the "Pope" of this secular church has his headquarters in Moscow, and his name is Stalin, just as the "Pope" of the Nazi church has his headquarters in Berchtesgaden, and is named Hitler.

The strategy of these two phenomena is the same. The aims of both movements are best realized in democratic countries, not by the organization of powerful and open political parties—such parties would not have a chance on earth in any country with a tradition of Freedom—but by having their adherents in every party, and by "boring from within."

Strict followers of the Moscow Party Line may call themselves "Liberals," or "Progressives," or "Democrats," or "New Dealers," or even "Republicans."

It is a tiny, secret and closely knit unit inside a trades union, or a government agency, or a WPA project, or a newspaper, or an editorial office, or any other instrument that affects social organization or instruments of opinion.

This fraction takes orders, according to the party line, and by policy never reveals itself for what it is.

Secrecy is essential to it. If the members of a trade union, for instance, should know that John Smith, who is advocating this or that course of action, is merely acting as an instrument of the Communist Party line, and that the busy little group who are advocating his ideas are a "fraction," then the workers would revolt for the American worker is a very independent soul.

The brake which the Communists exercise over liberals who know what is going on, is the fear that exposure will give aid and comfort to the Fascists.

This is also a Communist tactic. The Communist party is the greatest aid to Fascism in the world today.

It inspired Fascism and Nazism in the first place, as, in the course of time, I shall try to show. It gave to both, but particularly to Nazism, its entire technique of organization. It has on numerous occasions made a direct alliance with Nazism.

The Nazi church has canonized two saints, Horst Wessel and Shlageter, and the latter was first canonized by the Communists.

Inside Germany the first advocate of "National Bolshevism" was the Communist party under instructions dictated from Moscow. And when Nazism triumphed in Germany, because it is a far more efficient revolutionary program and, for the masses, particularly the unemployed and the small impoverished white-collar class, a far more attractive creed, the Communists went over to it, almost in a body.

In fact, it may develop that nazism and communism, instead of being two churches, really represent a schism in the same church, and a schism that may yet be healed.

If it is healed, they will fight side by side against Democracy. In the present situation, they are fighting from both sides, from the "left" and from the "right" against Democracy, and not outside and openly, but inside, and secretly, and both of them as the friends of Democracy.

It is time that Democracy took the offensive. That involves primarily a more vigorous intellectual and spiritual conception of what Democracy is and is not.

And the offensive demands exposure. The American people have one inalienable right, as free men. That is the right to know what is going on.
