'Christmas Schooner' musical sailing into Manistique next week

It was inspired by an important piece of local history, but it has never been performed in this area. Now the popu-lar musical "The Christmas Schooner" will finally be sailing onto the stage in Manistique.

The show, featuring students from the Gwinn area, will be performed Satur-day, Dec. 15, at 2 and 7 p.m., at the Frederickson Auditorium at Manistique High School.

We're very excited about this." says Meg Wnuk of the Thompson Historical Advisory Committee, which is sponsoring the performances. "Bringing this show to Manistique has been a longstanding goal for us. Actually, when we started, this was one of our original goals.

The group, established in 2005 to preserve the history of Thompson Town-ship, never lost sight of that goal, even while working on other projects, includ-ing securing a state historic marker and adding interpretive displays at the Lake Michigan access site, close to the place the original "Christmas Schooner," the ill-fated Rouse Simmons, began its fi-nal, fatal journey in November 1912.

The musical draws its inspiration from that famous real-life event, in which the vessel departed Thompson with a load of Christmas trees to be sold at the docks

of christmas frees to be sold at the docks in Chicago, only to be lost with all hands in a Lake Michigan gale. But while the historical facts are grim, the show is anything but. With a book by John Reeger and music and lyrics by Julia Shome i trues of call and bits Julie Shannon, it uses a fictional ship and crew to spin a story that has been de-scribed as powerful, heartwarming and inspiring, full of both humor and sorrow, as well as strong messages about the importance of family and tradition.





The Rouse Simmon, now known as the Christmas Tree Ship, was Captained by Herman Schuenemann and was a welcomed presence in local harbors. 

We received your letter today in the mail, and your phone message yesterday. Thank you so much for taking the time to express your appreciation.

We were honored to be the first group to present The Christmas Schooner to the people of Manistique and Thompson. Our students learned many lessons while presenting Schooner in Manistique, including the challenges of touring with a full-length musical. But I think my favorite part about the whole weekend is how our two communities worked together to make this happen. None of this would have been possible without lots of work on both ends. You, Laurie, Pam, Meg, and the rest of the committee put so much work into the event. This was a wonderful project.

It would be a great thing if the Manistique Schools could further develop their arts programs. You have a lovely auditorium that would be suitable for so many kinds of performances.

If there is any way I can be of help in promoting the arts in Manistique, please contact me. When I was hired in Gwinn in the fall of 1998, I reactivated the drama program with literally about 12 kids, \$1,000, and a couple of pieces of plywood. I had NO IDEA that it would ever turn into one of the finest programs in the Upper Peninsula. It's been great for our students, our school, and our community, and as a teacher, for me too.

I've given a workshop at the UP Educators Conference on how to start a drama program. I'd be happy to present again in Manistique if you wish.

Thanks again for all you did for the show last weekend. The accomodations, breakfast, trees, you name it. It was all wonderful!


