## Harris to Sell Out.

T. H. Harris has reached a decision in a matter which he has had under consideration for some time past, and in consequence advertises in another column that he will close out his grocery business at as early a date as possible. What he would prefer to do is to close out the business as it stands, and to that end is prepared to make a very attractive offer to anyone who may be interested. Should he be unable to make a sale outright, he will proceed to get rid of the stock by special sale—and for that matter, the terms of reduced prices has already begun. Included in his general offer, though the sales will be made separately if need be to suit the convenience of the purchasers, are the sale of his residence property on Lincoln street and his half interest in the store building on Iron street, the latter being owned jointly by Messrs. Harris & Mathews.

T. H. Harris succeeded his father in the grocery business nearly twenty years ago, and with the exception of a comparatively brief period has been engaged in the retail trade ever since. During the fore part of the period the business was conducted by Messrs. Harris & Mathews and the Iron street store building was erected by them about ten years ago. Subsequently Mr. Harris acquired Mr. Mathews' interest in the grocery, but the partnership interest in the building has continued to the present time. A little less than five years ago Mr. Harris closed his business interests here and went to Mass. City, Mich., where he was engaged in the grocery business one with a partner. Upon returning to Negawnee he resumed business October 25, 1902.

Though the announcement of his decision to leave the local field comes as a complete surprise, the decision has not been hastily reached by Mr. Harris. On the contrary he has had it under consideration for a considerable time. The decision is due to his conviction that, while he doubtless has enjoyed as good a trade as anyone, the returns do not compensate for the investment and the personal energy required.

Even under the most favorable circumstances it will require considerable time Mr. Harris to close out his business interests, and he has not reached a definite decision as to what he shall do afterward. It is not improbable that for a period he will take the agency for a line of goods and go on the road, a position for which he has previously demonstrated his capability and for which he has further qualified himself by pursuing a correspondence school course in salesmanship. With a view to a permanent location, however, he is casting his eyes toward Oklahoma, and Washington. He is much impressed with the conditions and prospects in both of these states, and he is not unlikely that his desires will eventually fall upon one of those two places.

Inasmuch as Mr. Harris is certainly well known to several months, at least, it is far too early for leave taking, but it may be stated that his decision to leave the local field will be generally regretted. He has kept a

good stock and has been scrupulously fair in all his dealings. His progressiveness has been shown by the recognition he has taken in the organization of the Retail Grocers' Association, and he is the present secretary of that body.
