Water is being continuously used, but as it is inclined shaft only the steep rock portion of it receives the benefit of the treatment. As practically all of the stilled labor is meanwhile being used at the Lillie mine there has been no pressing need for getting the Chamberlain reopened, and it was deemed that the risk which would attend more direct and vigorous methods of attempting to smother the fire, or rebalanced the benefits which would come from an earlier resumption of operations. Though the extent of the damage cannot be determined until early next week, there is little doubt that much retrenching will have to be done.
