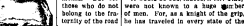

Must File Statement

Every candidate for office in the township, city, county, district and school district, who is elected to any office, must file a statement of the amount of money expended in his campaign for office.

No candidate for any office is required under the law from filing a sworn statement of expenditures, and failure to do so is punishable by a heavy fine and imprisonment.

Every statement of a candidate for any office, either as a primary or regular candidate, or in a caucus or convention, must be sworn to by the candidate and the statement filed with the county clerk.

The statement requires the date when the money was paid, for what purpose it was paid.

The law is particularly clearly drawn, and candidates for nomination and election in city and township elections are not exempt from its provisions in every respect.
