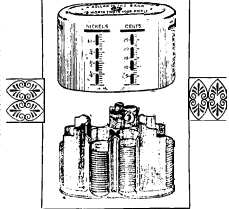

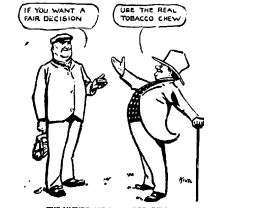

Publicity as a Remedy for Corporation Baiting

No one familiar with the facts will deny that baiting public utility corporations is a common practice among a certain class of politicians seeking or holding office. But why do the corporations continue to act as the bait and swallow the bait? The utility concerns have it in their power practically to exterminate such politicians. They are the power of publicity established through a candid, open relationship with the people whom they serve. It is always at their disposal. Why do they not avail themselves of it and put an end to the pernicious baiting habit?

Utility they do, the corporations cannot entirely absolve themselves of blame and responsibility for existing evil. Happy the day has dawned when many fastidious corporation managers are embracing this better means, conscious, from actual demonstration, that it is the only method that will pay in the end.
