Better Check Up

A large majority of fire starts in the chimney and flue. " safeguarding American Great Fires" is each season for this:

1. Use of terra cotta over pipe or other material on edge or hollow blocks as a chimney.
2. Construction of chimney with brick on edge instead of cast iron.
3. Chimney walls built with brick laid in regular one brick thick, and flues unlined.
4. Supporting chimney on the timber construction.
5. Building woodwork into the wall of the chimney, or permanent cast iron, or even in close proximity to, the exterior.
6. Stovepipes arranged to enter a chimney in vertical line.
7. Carelessness in not keeping the chimney clean and joints in brickwork properly caulked.
