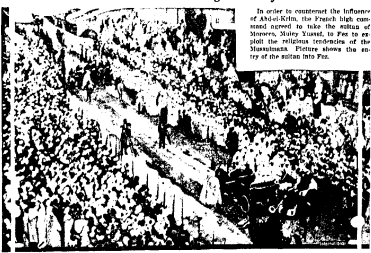
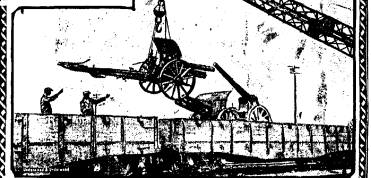

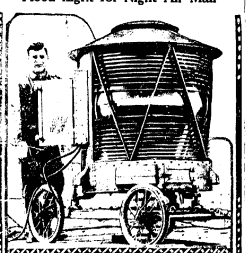

REPUBLIC

INTRODUCED NEW ROAD
Members of the Republic Township Board, headed by Supervisor Thomas Cheshall, spent Wednesday last week in making a very complete tour of the township highways with a view of determining what could be possible in the way of improvements, with the limited resources available.

The party's first stop was at the pumping station for a look at the outflow and a general survey of the plans. Returning the party returned up School street to inspect the road leading to Sedgewick, where visiting the reservoir near No. 96 glow house, where it has been suggested that new galvanized roofing be provided for the protection of this reservoir, which constitutes the distribution supply for the village waterworks.

Next the party inspected the bridge on the road to Emil Wahlerman's farm, where three loads of rock had been dumped to support the bridge on the west side of the bridge. The truck of the post John Kestel was taken to the Trout Lake road, and in addition to inspecting portions of the highway which it was reported were in need of dragging, the board received complaints that a certain section on one of the highways had been blocked by an adjacent property owner.

Particular attention was given a little later to the Gudomer farm road, especially because of the possibility of reestablishing the route on the original line instead of the present one to the Gudomer farm, and also because this road will constitute "one of the links in the rural mail delivery system for which it is hoped to get authorization.

In connection with the highway program, it has been suggested that a licensed statement be prepared covering the cost of all team work done on township highways for a year, with a view of determining whether or not it would not be a profitable investment for Republic township to purchase a tractor. It was found it a decided economy to make use of a tractor for this purpose, and it is believed that such an investment would be equally profitable for Republic.

TOWNSHIP IS HANDICAPPED
In connection with the township board's recent inspection of highways and formulation of a program for improvement, the officials admitted it will be impossible to do as much as should be done along this line, because of such as the officials would like to do, for the reason that resources are limited. For one thing, the township board hoped that the school district had done it possible to raise the \$2,000,000 the county year, but instead it was voted to make the appropriation \$1,000,000. With a reduction of approximately \$60,000 in the township's valuation, and an increase of \$100,000 in school purposes, the township board finds it impossible to do any more than is absolutely necessary. The township highway improvement, notwithstanding the officials' appreciation of the needs of the farmers, it is believed that better roads would have upon the general business of the township.

There is little doubt that the tax rate will be higher next year, and the township officials are very regretful that the thought that Hubbard township will be a valuation for the township. Republic township, is able to maintain a very complete road making out, its including tractors, and equipping these tractors to plow their roads in the winter.
