Work On Relocation Of US-41 Will Get Underway This Summer

Announcement was made this week by Charles M. Ziegler, state highway engineer, that construction of the \$100,000 stretch between Negaunee and Ishpeming, which will be completed in the fall of 1940, will get underway this summer.

Plans have been completed and approved by the State Roads administration. All available federal funds have already been made available for the project.

Elmer J. Hanna, state highway engineer, said, "There has been a great deal of work already done in the preparation of the project. I am

attempting to have the project ready to go ahead as soon as possible after the completion of the spring

The proposed project, covering 3.1 miles in length, provides for 22 foot shoulders, 10-foot paved roads and a one mile unpaved extension in Ishpeming to provide for better access to the city. It is expected to reduce the time required for motor travel to Ishpeming from the 10 hours now required.


