he had been here two days looking like the matter and also said the city was in default on the commission's order for sewage treatment. He said he had checked the Partridge creek valley and location of the large disposal planned there, erection of a disposal plant in that area would be feasible.

Mr. Oeming suggested constructing a disposal plant just east of the Negaunee mine. Effluent from the plant could go into a small creek near there which empties into the Carp river. The Jones & Laughlin Ore. Co. and the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Co. favor this location. He pointed out that pumping water would be involved to lift the sewage over the crest of Ann st.

**Public Auction Of State Land Set For May 13**

Public auctions of 11,997 acres of state-owned land in 15 Upper Peninsula counties are scheduled during the second week of May, the conservation department announces.

The department's land division is offering some acreage and location of the area. 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**Margarine vs. Butter**

For 23 years the Congress of the United States has fought margarine. The recent procedure in Congress withdrew taxes on margarine, and provided for its sale as foodstuffs with occupational licenses of \$400 to the manufacturers and loss amounts for the wholesale and retail establishments.

On top of that the lower body of Congress voted that all margarine served in all public eating places must be served in tins which one legislator remarked, "would be like a baby's diaper."

Another lawmaker called it a "new pyramit club." The House also included in the bill a provision that eating houses serving margarine must display large signs advertising the fact.

Butter is a popular element of our best food, but the power of its political strength is another matter. There is now more margarine sold daily than at any previous time. The butter people have claimed a monopoly on yellow coloring. The color of margarine does not seem to affect the food.

Numerous articles of all kinds of food carry colors that distinguish it from other fruits, meats, greens—even bread sells under different colors. All of which goes to show that the color of different foodstuffs exists in the open market. The coloring of margarine is a very queer issue for the dairy interests and politicians to

stand on. In the open markets and homes, hundreds and thousands of people tell you: "I can't tell the difference in the taste of margarine and butter."

**The Atlantic Pact**

The Government of the United States has made it very plain to the whole world that the new United Nations is under a solemn obligation to obtain international peace and security. And most of the statesmen at the time of the signing of the Atlantic Charter, emphasized the fact that the 12 Governments thereby re-dedicated themselves to the support of the United Nations.

All of the speakers made it perfectly plain that Russia was at the end of its rope.

You can make a number one guess that there isn't going to be any war—for the reason that Russia hasn't a chance in a mil-

lion to win.

It should be noted also that while the simple ceremony of signing the treaty was going on in Washington, Soviet Russia was making a final appeal in her propaganda that the pact was "openly aggressive" and aimed against her. At the same time President Truman was telling the World to note that the pact is "an shield against aggression."

The United Nations General Assembly has re-elected in New York. It is to be hoped that they will give Russia a kick in the ribs when their spokesmen utter their low-down phrase of the United States.

**A Strange Story**

Herbert Hoover was at one time President of the United States. He had just about as much trouble as other Presidents. In

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private life he has paid little attention to politics.

When Congress asked him to make a condemnation into top affairs of the Government of the United States he came back and arose to show heights. Believe it or not, Hoover and his Committee took an exhaustive study to find out what is wrong with the American Government. They reported that the Government is being run on a very extravagant and wasteful method and we are spending billions of dollars to carry on Military Naval and Air Force programs. The whole Administration and Congress in Washington agrees with Hoover.

It is the first time since he was defeated for reelection that Herbert Hoover has been acclaimed. Hoover may still be crowned "Lord of All."

They honored Peter P. "Pete" Trudell Saturday night and it was one of the most tributes ever rendered, for Pete has been Mr. Conservation in these parts for better than a quarter of a century. The affair was sponsored by the Negaunee and Gun Club, but the funds raised to obtain gifts presented to Pete were the result of contributions made by several clubs in the county.
