## Michigan Mirror

State Treasurer L. Hink Blair is of the opinion that consolidation of state departments and boards is not the answer to the state's financial problem.

"The only way the legislature can bridge the gap between receipts and disbursements without new money is to absorb some services now given to the people to the extent of some \$10 to \$50 million," states Mr. Blair.

"Consolidation of departments and boards might possibly save a little money, although much consolidation is just a waste of money in increasing the expenditures. Major considerations that we now face is that the state has had to date a record of a deficit that, the only material saving that could possibly be made is not by consolidation of departments but by elimination of services."

How much money did the State of Michigan receive last year?

Including federal grants in aid and special funds like the highway fund, game and fish funds, and so on, the grand total was \$462,082,857.58.

Out of this amount the legislature exercises control over about \$221 million. If you deduct the earmarked school money, now regulated by state constitution, the net sum is approximately \$140 million - 20 per cent of the total.

If the legislature is responsible for spending of only 20 per cent of the state's total of tax collected funds, who should be blamed if a deficit develops at Lansing.

Revenue adjustments plus new economies are being outlined on by Republican leaders to avert, or at least minimize, the prospective deficit in the state treasury. Governor Williams recently scolded anyone because of an anticipated \$11 million deficit. O. C. F. hopes count on \$1 million more in sales tax by plugging license, \$20 million more in annual car transfer tax, \$11 million attributed to local school districts to pay for teachers' retirement, \$1 million saved by not repeating the old age assistance law and emergency provisions, and an estimated \$11 million surplus as of June 30, 1940.

Michigan's living index is now the highest since February, 1912. The cost of living index, U. S. department of labor, is proposed for the fifth consecutive month. Economists say the present situation has yet to run its full course, business will continue to slacken, 1940 will be a good year by present standards.

## Negaunee Mine Closed By CCI

After 52 years of operation, the Negaunee mine was closed last month because of lack of ore by the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Co. With the exception of a small crew of men, which will operate the pumps and lead one of the shafts, the employees have been transferred by the company to the "Mother A."

The new body was discovered by diamond drilling in 1903 and the property is operated by the American Mining Co., a subsidiary of the Oliver Iron Mining Co., prior to 1903.

In 1907 the first shipment of ore was made and up to September of 1902, total shipments were 1,472,778 tons.

The mine was taken over by the Negaunee Mine Co. in September of 1910 and was operated by the Cleveland Cliffs, a partner with Bethlehem Steel Co. in the Negaunee Mine Co.

During the period the property was operated by the CCI, more than 20,000,000 tons were mined. In the four years from 1940 through 1943, the average yearly production is almost 1,000,000 tons. In this peak production era 600 men were employed.

## Furnishings Improve In State Homes

Better and more attractively furnished homes are enjoyed by about 12,000 families in Michigan as a result of home demonstration projects completed in home demonstration groups during the last year.

In these groups women learned how to make slip covers, refinish and reupholster furniture, and use great variety of other skills to improve their homes.

Miss Marie Martin, in charge of this extension project at Michigan State College, and works through home demonstration agents and local leaders in reaching thousands of Michigan homemakers.

During the past year many of the homemakers were planning to do some refurnishing in their homes. Home demonstration programs were planned to give help in planning color schemes, selecting new furnishings and renovating old furnishings.

Many new furnishings were made by members of home demonstration groups who in turn taught friends and neighbors the techniques they had learned. Attractive lamps, beautiful lampshades, curtains, dresses and rugs all were made by hand.

Savings to these homemakers amounted into thousands of dollars. As a result of some special workshops for making slip covers, for example, women learned that they saved over \$8,000 in improving about 500 articles.

These homemakers believe that better home furnishings contribute to better family living. With other home demonstration groups all over the nation they have selected as their theme, "Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's Welfare." This will be the theme of the special celebration during National Home Demonstration Week, this week.

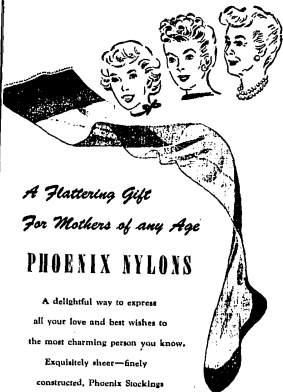

## Advise New Fly Spray For Dairy Cows

New advice on fly control came this week from the Michigan State College and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. They recommend that the insecticide DDT be used as an insect control spray on dairy cows because of possible contamination of milk with the DDT spray material.

No case of injury to humans is known but the fact that the presence of DDT even in small quantities in milk would be contrary to pure food laws makes the recommendation necessary.

Use of DDT to control flies on animals other than cows is still advised. DDT can be used to control flies on beef cattle and swine if 60 days elapse between application and slaughter of the animals.

DDT can still be used to control flies in breeding places and resting places outside dairy barns. Manure piles and moist soil that is mixed with manure are typical places where flies multiply.

Ray Hutson, head of the MSC entomology department, Dr. Earl Weaver, dairy department head and George Brown, animal husbandry department head, have conferred on federal findings and advise that methoxychlor is the material to use for dairy cattle fly control. The recommendation, being carried to farmers through MSC specialists in the Cooperative Extension Service, call for the use of methoxychlor inside dairy barns and directly upon the dairy cows.

County agricultural agents have been notified of the new spray program and are ready to give farmers advice on using the new methoxychlor in place of DDT on dairy cattle.

Each year lightning strikes 20 million dollars worth of property in Michigan in the nation and 350 thousand dollars worth of property in Michigan.

The MSC's engineers say that a small amount of money invested in lightning protection is very small compared to the value of the buildings protected. An approved system of lightning rods, kept in good condition, is the surest way to protect the best.

"They urge that farmers check their lightning protection to make sure it is adequate before another thunder-storm comes."

## Grass Listed As Good Soil Saving Step

The growing of grass is a key-stone of a sound soils management program and a permanent agriculture, according to E. D. Longenecker, soils extension specialist at Michigan State College.

Since the wind soil of Michigan's farming land was first broken, erosion, both wind and water, has become a serious soil depletion factor in many parts of the state.

With land naturally suited to agriculture, the solution to this difficulty is a larger acreage of grasses or soil crops, especially legumes, Longenecker says. These crops not only provide effective protection against wind and water erosion, but also add organic

matter to the top soil. Longenecker urges all farmers to attend the Grass Day planned for their areas during June. These programs, sponsored by the Michigan State College cooperative extension service in conjunction with the Soil Conservation Districts and other agencies, will feature latest information on the use of grasses and legumes in a constructive soil management program.

establish and to help the Negaunee residents, who need this type of an arrangement where they can be helped in the field of education.

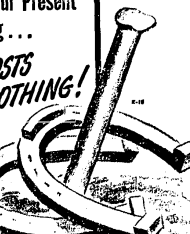
The University's present plan is to help locally made-to-fit and save existing conditions in Iron River.

Such things as the fresh air, good exercise, enthusiasm, the making by hand of minnie lures, the winning and pulling of a net contain no measured in units or in grams, but if a man is to live well and happily he needs such things as these.

If he catches any trout, they are good for him too—with their protein, fat, calcium, potassium, iron, vitamins, thiamine, riboflavin and niacin—and any nothing of their flavor.

"Trout fishing is mostly for fun," Dr. Houstis said, "so don't overdo, don't get too excited and keep yourself dry, watch your footing and watch your hooks."

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

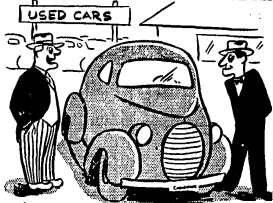
