Protection of Child's Health Duty of Parents

Parents must protect the health of their children from disease by immunization, says a report issued by the American Medical Association. The report is the result of a study by the American Medical Association's Committee on the Prevention of Disease, which has been published in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

The report says that parents have a duty to protect their children from disease by immunization, and that this duty is a part of their responsibility as parents.

The report also says that parents should consult their doctors about immunization, and that they should make sure that their children are immunized against all the diseases for which there is a vaccine.

Most parents know how to keep their children protected against diphtheria, it is simply up to parents to make sure that their children are immunized against this disease.

If your child is six months of age and his immunization program can not get you a child, it is he is there and has not had one or more of it he is five and has not had his second shot, you are being negligent if his protection is delayed.

Take your child to his doctor or local health department to have him immunized. The doctor will tell you how often to come and what to do. Do not fail to follow his instructions for the immunization program; initial immunization requires several visits to the doctor's office.

It takes a few weeks for protection to develop after immunization. Do not wait until there is diphtheria in the neighborhood—it may be too late.

It is questionable, however, whether a taxing unit could bring suit in equity to set aside the use of the Tax Commission, increasing assessments, and making difficult in the latter case for a taxing unit to show that it suffered any damage upon the assessment procedure a claim for equitable relief.

Although under the resolution of March 2, 1948, the Tax Commission authorized its own assessments as an actual fact, its recommendations have been limited to the assessment of mining property. No change in the normal statutory procedure of assessment of mining property has been adopted. There has been complete assent of the members of both mining and non-mining property. It appears to me that the question of lack of good faith can very well be raised under these circumstances, particularly when viewed in the light that the valuations of mining property is a matter of fact based on operating reports, submitted by the mining companies, and an actual accounting book maintained by the Tax Commission, on an actual accounting book maintained by the mining companies.

The present State Tax Commission sponsored the amendment to Sec. M. A. C., which would encourage the exploration and development of mineral resources for the purpose of determining whether or not present assessment procedures which are not in conformity with the present operating mine, shall be exempt for a maximum period of 10 years from taxation. (b) Any assessment levied shall be taxed as to mineral reserve only to the extent that the mineral reserve may come within a 10 year recovery period, determined from the date of production. As an illustration of what effect the first provision would have assuming that the act went into effect, one of the mining companies has discovered new ore deposits not part of an active mine, amounting to twenty million tons of ore. The normal production will be a million tons a year. For tax purposes, only ten million tons of ore considered, so that it is obvious that the amendment sponsored by the Tax Commission, beyond any question or doubt, proposes to tax mining properties at less than their cash value. How can these provisions be reconciled with the constitutional provision, namely Section 7 of Article 10 of the Michigan Constitution, which reads as follows: "All assessments heretofore authorized shall be on property assessed cash value."

I cannot see the conclusion that the act, sponsored by the Tax Commission relative to the assessment of mining property is unconstitutional, and that in violation of the provisions of that act the State Tax Commission has adopted a clearly wrong principle. It is wrong in principle, contrary to the constitutional provision to assess non-mining property at its cash value, and mining property at something less than its cash value. It is recognized that the legislature has broad, discretionary power as to what property shall be taxed and what property shall be exempt. That power must be exercised within constitutional limitations. A method of assessment and taxation authorized to terminate between a property in the same class. A million tons of ore to be mined 20 years from the date may have a present cash value of one million dollars, and in 20 years may be mined 5 years from the date that the million tons of ore to be mined 20 years from the date is not exempt.

Now it has been stated, that at the hearings on general law conducted by the Tax Commission, on February 22, 1949, in protest their assessments. This is true, however, for all practical purposes in the instance, the right is meaningless.

(1) The time limit, which will be the limit of a few days, will provide any taxpayer from making a thorough study of tax assessments through study of the necessary to determine whether or not there are assessment irregularities between the several taxing units.

(2) It would be beyond the means of any taxpayer or group of taxpayers and beyond the means of a taxing unit, to show at a general hearing on review, the non-mining property subject to higher assessments on a comparative basis than mining property.

We come then to the final conclusion which seems to me to be the most realistic and that there can be no fair and equitable assessment of mining property in Marquette County, Michigan, in the order of the Commission, until such time as the Tax Commission has made a thorough and complete study and analysis of mining property, to determine whether or not the present method of assessing mining property meets the constitutional requirements of a fair cash value.

It will be my final recommendation that this Council adopt a resolution requesting that the Tax Commission suspend its present reassessment program, until a thorough and complete study of mining properties, not only from an inventory basis, but also from a cost basis, for the purpose of determining whether or not present assessment procedures which are not in conformity with the present operating mine, are fair and equitable. Here, we request that the promise that the method of assessing mining property is unfair and inequitable, as applied to non-mining property, an unfair share of the cost of production. On motion of A. Novel Dinner Rolls



Next time you make dinner rolls, duplicate these tricky-looking butters and S-shaped buns. For the shaping is easy to learn and do.

When you serve hot rolls, your simple stew, meat loaf, or frankfurters and kraut, will taste extra good. After you have made raised rolls a few times, you can turn out a number of variations with ease.

Use a standard roll recipe or a hot roll mix to make butters and S-shaped rolls. For each roll, cut a circular sheet of dough into pie-shaped pieces and roll up, starting at the wide end. Go a step farther; if you like, and curve into crescents on the baking sheet.

Although intricate looking, S-shaped rolls are simple. Roll both sides of a rectangular sheet of dough to the center, cut in both sides and twist each piece in the middle. After rolls are shaped, brush a little melted butter or margarine over the top to keep a crust from forming during the second rising. Rolls baked quickly until a medium brown are moist and fluffy inside, crisp-tender outside. A moderately hot oven (425 degrees F.) is best for achieving this color and quality.

Lettuce rolls can be prepared for serving at another meal. Put them into a paper bag, sprinkle lightly with water, fold the end of the bag to close it, and heat in a hot oven for five minutes before serving.

In addition to providing variety in the menu at low cost, dinner rolls contribute six-way nourishment: protein, iron, food energy, and three B-vitamins.

DINNER ROLLS

- 1 package yeast, compressed or the granular
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup molasses
- 6 cups sifted enriched flour (about 12 cups)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup lard

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt, and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add one cup flour. Beat well. Add softened yeast and egg. Mix well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead fifteen to twenty minutes.

Roll in areas of dough (about one inch wide) doubled (about one and one-half rolls) each row.

Cover and let rest ten minutes.

For butters: Turn into four portions. Roll each portion into circle about one-eighty inch long. Brush rolled dough with

melted butter or margarine. Cut into pie-shaped pieces. Roll with starting at wide end.

For S-shaped rolls: Roll dough out to rectangle eight inches wide and four-fourth inch thick. Brush with melted butter or margarine.

Roll each side toward center of making thin jelly-roll. Cut into four equal parts.

Flatten each of the four equal pieces in center to form S-shaped roll. Place rolls on greased baking sheets. Let rise until doubled (about one hour). Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 16 to 20 minutes. Makes three and one-half dozen rolls.
