

Modern Housewife Studies Her Job

What are homemakers interested in hearing more about these days? Judging by the letters they requested in Michigan home demonstration groups last week, the answer includes just about everything.

Clavia Meyer, extension home management specialist at Michigan State College, reports a great deal of interest in all phases of home planning and improvement.

One lesson presented to home demonstration groups through the home demonstration agent and local leaders concerned improving the appearance of homes from the inside out. Thousands of improvements were suggested and around Michigan homes as a result of this lesson.

Homemakers also made an intensive study of kitchen equipment for their own. They investigated materials and planned improvements the subject of buying large household equipment and armed themselves with facts to help them choose appliances.

Since home management is important to the homemaker who tries to be a good manager they studied the use of the family dollar and marketing.

Saving time is important, too, so home demonstration groups spent some time learning how to use new and more efficient methods of housekeeping.

Indiscriminate Use Of Shoe-Fitting Machines Dangerous

Indiscriminate and too frequent use of fluoroscopic shoe fitting machines is dangerous to the health of the shoe store employes and customer alike, the Division of Industrial Health, Michigan Department of Health warns.

Fluoroscopic shoe fitting machines should not be used as playthings and should not be operated by customers.

No individual should have fluoroscopic fittings more than 12 times a year, and such exposure should be limited to five seconds.

The Div. of Industrial Health has investigated the hazards of fluoroscopic shoe-fitting machines and is now in the process of checking all the machines in use in the state.

Some machines, particularly the older type which are not properly shielded or have stray radiation into the area around them. This is dangerous to the employes who are exposed to the rays eight hours a day. Older machines are the most apt to be faulty. The Division hopes to check these machines first.

FIVE POLIO PRECAUTIONS ARE LISTED FOR PARENTS

Warning that the 1949 polio season is "just around the corner," the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today issued a list of five precautionary measures to be observed by those in charge of children during the epidemic danger period which usually begins in late May through October, reaching its peak during the hot, mid-summer months.

The five easy-to-follow, low health risks for children are:

1. Avoid crowds and places where close contact with other persons is likely.
2. Avoid over-tireness caused by too active play or exercise, or irregular hours.
3. Avoid swimming in polluted water. Use only swimmers or public pools declared safe by local health authorities.
4. Avoid sudden chilling. Remove wet shoes and clothing at once and keep extra blankets and heavier clothing handy for sudden weather changes.
5. Observe the golden rule of personal cleanliness. Keep food



lightly covered and safe from flies or other insects. Garbage should be tightly covered and, if other disposal facilities are lacking, it should be buried or burned.

The National Foundation also listed the following symptoms of infantile paralytic headache, nausea or upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness and unexplained fever. Should polio strike in your family, call a doctor immediately. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment by qualified medical personnel often prevent serious crippling.

The organization emphasized that fear and anxiety should be limited to a minimum. A calm, confident attitude is conducive to health and recovery. Parents, it said, should remember that of all those children 95 per cent or more recover completely, while another 2 per cent are left with only slight after effects.

If polio is actually diagnosed, contact the chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis serving your community. The chapter will pay that part of the cost of care and treatment which patient or family cannot meet.

Ferry Fleet at Straits Increased

Leaving to give the best service possible service to the Mackinac, State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announced that the Highway Department ferry fleet will be augmented on July 1 by the addition of two new ferries. The new ferries, making a total of five ships on full time service, will be added after Labor Day, and a sixth, the ferry "Chet" Mackinac, available when necessary.

The Sainte Marie has been chartered from the Mackinac Transportation Company effective June 15. The period from June 15 to June 30 will be used to get the boat fitted out and ready to operate in time for the increased traffic prevailing the "Fourth of July." The Sainte Marie has a capacity of 10 motor vehicles.

Capacity of all motor vehicles. The addition of the Sainte Marie will increase the efficiency of the ferry fleet and reduce waiting time during peak periods of traffic.

The four boats now in the Highway Department fleet are the "City of Detroit," City of Cheboygan, City of Alpena, and the "City of Mackinac," with a combined capacity of 316 motor vehicles. In 1940 the fleet carried 522,494 vehicles and over one and one-half million passengers across the Straits during January 1, 1940. Traffic has increased over the same period of 1939 about 50 per cent.

County's Share of Weight Tax Melon Largest in U. P.

When the returns to the county, cities and incorporated villages of Michigan for 1939-1940 collected in weight tax for the state during the first quarter of 1940 have been printed by the State Highway Department, it was found that the county's share of the weight tax is the largest in the United States. The county's share of the weight tax is \$2,067,130.90 over the \$2,763,233.37 in 1939.

This is an increase of 75.00 per cent over the \$1,634,233.37 in 1938.

New Protection for Fruit Growers



LANSING, MICHIGAN — Serious fruit losses due to fungus and insect infestations are now being avoided by the new Low-Boy spray mist, made here by John Ben. This new type of automatic spraying gets the spray on the underside of leaves and stems, where most concentrate and results in a clean crop of premium fruit. It delivers up to 60 gallons per minute and is fully controlled by the tractor driver so that one man can cover up to 50 acres of orchards per day.

Prison Herd Cow Completes Milk Production Record

The state champion of cowbreeds and branch prison, Marquette, is the owner of a registered Holstein cow which has just completed a life time production record of more than 100,000 pounds of milk in official tests with the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. Her name is Marquette Ina, registered (14) and she is a 1937-1938 Holstein in the nation to produce more than this amount of milk in her life.

In a yearly milking period, "Ina" has produced a total of 110,368 pounds of milk, and 2970 pounds of butterfat. Her highest single record was made at the age of 5 years and three months when she produced 25,138 pounds of milk and 740 pounds of butterfat.

Marquette Annie Pyle (U. G.) another registered Holstein in the same herd, has further added to her lifetime record of milk production after previously reaching the 100,000 mark. In a yearly milking period she has produced a total of 105,273 pounds of milk and 5317 pounds of butterfat.

Marquette County Gas Tax Payment Totals \$33,971.63

Marquette County will receive \$33,971.63 in gas tax money as part of the first half of 1940 Michigan Act payments, according to a statement by County Commissioner M. Ziegler.

The county has been preparing for the State Highway Department and sent to the Auditor General for payment.

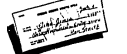
