



First Commencement Held In High School 40 Years Ago

When members of Neganeue High School's 1900 graduating class receive their diplomas from President Thomas Collins of this night, it will mark the 40th commencement exercise in the present high school building.

It was just 40 years ago on June 10, 1900, that the first commencement was held in connection with dedication exercises of the then new school. It was such an outstanding occasion that the Iron Herald put out an extra page supplement to its regular paper, filled with pictures and describing in detail the structure.

Commenting on the building, the Iron Herald of June 3, 1900 said: "It is complete in every way and is adequate for Neganeue's educational needs for many years to come. It is a structure of which

Neganeue may well be proud, and it will stand as a monument to the credit of the board of education, for there has been no minoritism in either its erection or its equipment. On the other hand, the people have the satisfaction of knowing that the expenditure has been honestly made.

"The taxpayers of Neganeue are to have a large measure of credit for the new structure for the liberal appropriation of \$85,000. Its total cost cannot be given at the present time, but an estimated sum of \$120,000 may be considered fair."

Members of the board of education at the time the school was erected were Dr. J. H. Andrus, president, Cyril Hulse, secretary, Nicholas Laughtin, treasurer, J. W. Elliot and R. C. Jackson. The

superintendent of schools was Orr Seaburg. E. K. Chauncey was the general contractor, John D. Church the architect, and Andrew Lindholm the local superintendent.

Whooping Cough Cases Are Traced To Fond Adults

Many Michigan babies contract whooping cough from a fond grandparent or other adult who has a mild unrecognized case of the disease—probably a recent attack. Dr. Frank Kendrick, Assistant Director of the Division of Laboratories, Michigan Department of Health said today.

Dr. Kendrick, who has had charge of the department's research in whooping cough and who developed a vaccine to prevent the disease says the department recommends that immunization of the baby against the disease should be started by the time the six months of age. But to protect the baby before he is old enough to be immunized, it recommends complete immunization of all the older brothers and sisters in the family, and keeping the infant away from any child or adult who has any symptom of the disease.

Whooping cough, Dr. Kendrick explained, is a very serious disease. It causes more deaths of Michigan's young infants than diphtheria, measles and scarlet fever combined. It can be prevented in children over six months of age. Any child should be immunized against the disease, with the first treatment beginning before the six months of age and completed by the time he is a year old. Booster shots should be given at three years of age and before the child enters school, at

about five years of age.

There have been 602 cases of whooping cough in Michigan this year. Most of them could have been prevented by immunization.

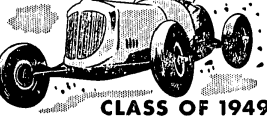

Stress Oral Cancer In Program For Michigan Dentists

In order that no symptom of lip, cheek, tongue or mouth cancer will escape detection, the Michigan State Dental Society and the Michigan Department of Health this year are stressing oral cancer in their program of continuing education for dentists in the state.

Ten per cent of cancer in men and two per cent of cancer in women occurs in the oral cavity. While it is not the responsibility of the dentist to treat cancer, it is his duty to detect any signs or symptoms of oral cancer and refer his patient to a qualified specialist for treatment, the speakers contend.

Some of the country's foremost authorities in fields of dentistry, oral tumors and x-rays of the mouth are among the speakers scheduled for 15 area dental society meetings during May and June.

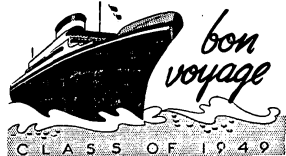

Dear Sirs:
Your Honor Heights Council Committee with all members present with the exception of one member at the Sanatorium - Wednesday, May 11. We are pleased and were well pleased with the general appearance, especially since the painting has been completed.

We were interested to see that the San is being utilized to its fullest capacity, with 67 patients when we were there. There are at present three persons in the County availing themselves who will have accommodations here near future. We were informed that 1948 was a record year at the San, with 31,075 patient days. We were especially pleased to find that the Sanatorium has been operating in the black in recent months, and that the cost per patient per day was considerably lower than for several years in the past, the figure for the last three months being \$8.58 per day. We are convinced that the Trustees are endeavoring to cooperate with our County agents in building expenses down to the minimum in these days of emergency. We feel that this is being done without impairment of the services or facilities to the Patients.

With regard to recent publicity in connection with the policy of the Trustees and Superintendent concerning x-rays and opinions in connection with diagnosis of the berucal and other chest afflictions which have been in force since 1943 and which were re-established in December 1947. We are satisfied that there has been a change of the established procedure and that there is a change of opinion which is not clearly outlined the Trustees and the Superintendent are disposed to make any reasonable request.

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Tension, Economic Progress in Finland Impress Visitor

Ed. Note—This is the second article written about Finland by Fox Bogler, manager of Western Central Airlines new bureau, who is at present on his first tour of Europe.

Everyone talks about Russia in Finland—"There are many Russians here but of course we don't see them,"—but it must be true that they have been very real anti-fascist organizations since the war. "We wonder what it means—being so democratic and so liberal—near their being—blasting it is strange, their being so close, and not knowing what is being done on our own land." "Not a scintilla in our government is unorthodox," but shipping and unofficial position, yes, there is the "influence."

And, driving through the attractive districts where the foreign legations are housed, it is impossible not to notice that one and one of the crumbling houses is heavily guarded. It amazes me. Plans very much and they never fail to remark, "The war is very brave."

But the electric tension, inevitable, I suppose, when any country has a mysterious, powerful former enemy as a neighbor is not what I shall remember long about Helsinki.

The compelling character of the city and its people makes its own distinct impression. It is at once immense and relaxed, ancient and modern, and above all, frank, affectionate, colorful and unforgettable.

All remember—"The sound of Helsinki, in the restaurants and here of Scandinavia there are unbounded, quiet murmur always. It was different from any I have heard, and I loved my voice, too. It meant laughter is open and the dark, starry, found the language jumps at you from every corner."

I'll remember the look of the place. The East has stamped its nose against the West in Helsinki. An old cathedral, the tower topped temple lines and an ancient oval with domes and spires on an island in the harbor. Quietly, modern architecture in Finland, or at least Helsinki, follows no conventional trends, and is unhampered by fanaticism, imagination and beauty. My untroubled opinion, some of the buildings are worth a pilgrimage trip by every budding architect in the world.

The children's hospital for instance, a child might have dreamed of it. The twelve floors are huge sun-catching circles of glass at the front and large windows that end in graceful wings branching from it. Modern figures in children, done in a rich deep-rust color stand in relief from the front of the building. Each is individually acquired in the realistic and not to impressionistic style. And open so happily and carefully carved. The concrete of the building are beautiful design—curves, scrolls, in the moon, the stars—over the entire building.

I'll remember little things in Helsinki: The stack of magazines that my dollar bought about a dollar's worth of interesting projects, and the reason given for it—"Finland has the most modern and profitable copper production in the world."

Over 1/3 of Finland's population is actively organized into cooperative groups. Consumer's cooperation is the strongest in the world. Farmers belong to SOJA, workers and other groups to ELANTO. Politically SDK (Social Democrats) and ELANTO (predominately social democratic). Both groups are successfully successful. The big downtown stores, the swankiest restaurants, the most modern apartment buildings, grocery stores,

bakeries, barber shops, clinics, libraries—no cooperatively owned.

The cooperative movement in Finland is slightly different from the usually successful movement in Scandinavia in that producer and consumer groups are organized jointly instead of into separate ones.

Finland was the first country in the world to give women the right to vote and it has maintained a vigorous, democratic legislation ever since its independence.

The way the country is preparing for the 1952 Olympic games that's something to remember because the way they are preparing their welcome may be hysterical, enthusiastic, warm, energetic and thorough. The huge stadium built for the 1940 games—destroyed by war, still stands, the games, hostess, resorts, are being rebuilt. Nothing is being built that can't be used when the games are over.

Enthusiastically plans minded, Finland has its artistic side. Everyone goes to the theater. A new dance theater is being built. The cinema and music and national are busy with original work. The orchestra is being added to a group of Hindu dancers preparing to visit there. Thousands. The Arts in Finland are the same. They have an optimistic quality of the architecture.

Walking a tight rope in one of the warmest geographical positions in the world, Finland's independence and vigor is amazing in a sense, the "rainsy to the west"; Finland is a fascinating, vivid country. The Americans here.

If they should, if only to drink in the beauty of her 60,000 lakes—or hear the children singing ancient songs on a May Day Sunday morning.

List Current Jobs For Gardeners

Home gardeners in central and southern Michigan can use the last week of May and the first of June to put out tomatoes, egg plant, and pepper plants. This advice comes from Jack Boas, of the Michigan State College department of horticulture.

Plants early in May proved the danger of getting these warm weather crops out too early. Other garden chores that can be done now are planting snap beans and sweet corn as well as setting out transplants. Cucumbers, melons, and squash can be planted anytime until about June 15. Bell should be thoroughly warm before seeds of these crops are planted.

Many gardeners plant lima beans too early in Michigan, Boas believes. This crop should not go into the ground until the first week in June. The new varieties, Fortuna and Triumph, developed by the United States Department of Agriculture, have given excellent results under Michigan conditions. Henderson Bunn, is the second lima beans choice if the new varieties cannot be obtained.

Vacation Workers Must Get Social Security Numbers

All people working in covered employment during the vacation period, or at any other time, even though on a part time basis, should have their Social Security account number cards. Wholesale F. Chamberlain, manager of the Social Security Administration office at Marquette, announced this week in advising students to obtain cards before accepting vacation employment.

These cards are necessary because employers make a quarterly Social Security tax report on which they show the name, account number, and wages paid to employees during the vacation or part time period, Mr. Chamberlain emphasized.

Students in doubt about whether or not they are covered by the program should get in touch with the Social Security Administration office, which is located in the post office building at Marquette. Account number application forms can be obtained from local post offices or from the Marquette office.
