The folly of attempting to hold a public meeting in front of an assembly room full of people is immediately apparent. It is simply impossible to have any kind of a business meeting in a situation of this kind. However, following the last meeting of the board of education, it is expected that there will be a sufficient number of persons present in the auditorium, they could appoint a committee to take care of the meeting and at its conclusion the decision rendered could be made public. And we concur with the teachers that a "speedy settlement" is most desirable.

INTERPRETING THE NEWS

Shays are multiplying over the Marquette-Mackinac will soon become a pressing issue. The Michigan recently adopted a resolution recommending to the governor and to the State Highway Commissioner that every effort should be made to an early date to bring about the construction of the bridge. The resolution pointed out that the estimated cost would be constructed 50 per cent of its cost being paid by grant of the congress and the remaining 50 per cent being paid by sale of revenue bonds to private investors without obligation of any kind on the part of the state. Hotel men feel keenly that Michigan will miss a good bid if the traffic backbone at the Straits is not removed in the near future.

Approximately 5,000 employees of the Ford Motor Company at Dearborn will be eligible for retirement in April, 1920, at pensions of \$100 per month including Social Security benefits. The company estimates that 15,000 employees are sixty years of age or over. The new pension plan will cost the company \$20,000,000 per year. Increase in the price of the Ford automobiles may be an indirect result.

With election of Wiley R. Rife of Palmyra as chairman of the State Agricultural Commission, speculation has increased to the effect that Charles Fitz, director of the State Department of Agriculture, may be replaced in the next future. Fitz was reappointed by the old commission early in 1918 but the usual reappointment was withheld.

Governor G. Messen Williams continues to utilize the Attorney General and State Controller as agencies to put Republican state elective officials on the defensive. The Attorney General has advised that purchase by the State Highway Department must be cleared through the Department of Administration of which the controller is director. As Republicans hold a majority on the state administrative board, headed by the Governor, the recent moves by Williams have been largely nullified.

Banks of Michigan paid a record sum of \$3,503,674 as interest earnings on bonds of the State Treasury. It was announced by State Treasurer D. Hale Drake. Drake has been mentioned as a possible Republican candidate for Governor in 1920. Accordingly, he has been the target of criticism by Governor Williams, well publicized in the press. When the Governor asked the State Treasurer to collect interest on some \$32,000,000 in state funds on deposit at banks, Drake replied with a press statement that such was not intended in view of the same need for funds and requirements of the banks for 30 to 60 or longer withdrawal notice for money on deposit if drawing interest.

State Health Unit Gives Warning On Rabbit Clearing

While you're giving thought to that wonderful plot of wild rabbit, handed on to you, give a little thought also to the danger of tularemia, the Michigan Department of Health advises.

Wild animals are extremely painful, dangerous and difficult to hunt. People usually get tularemia from handling, cleaning or eating the carcass of an infected wild rabbit. Humans become ill from 10 to twelve days after the person gets into the body. The illness begins with chills, fever, body pains and nausea. A sore usually appears where the germ enters the body. Nearby lymph glands become swollen, very painful, and often have to be opened. After operation you may continue to drain for a long period of time. This condition is usually accompanied by fever and may keep the patient in bed for weeks or months.

When you clean, handle or cook game, use these precautions; the Michigan Department of Health warned.

1. Wear rubber gloves when dressing wild rabbits. Use care so that a sharp bone cannot pierce the glove.
2. Do not handle wild rabbits that are found dead.
3. Shoot only rabbits which are running. Slowly approaching rabbits are likely to be infected with tularemia.
4. Cook wild rabbits thoroughly so that no red meat or red blood remains. Do not taste the game until it is well done. Only thorough cooking if the meat destroys the germ.
5. Play safe! Destroy all rabbits whose internal organs are stuffed with small white spots. These are signs of tularemia.

With the high school football season drawing to a close, this weekend in the greater Negaunee area, attention will be focused on the football and basketball seasons already being completed by the Michigan High School Athletic Association for the usual series of regional rivalry meetings. Six seasons will be held in the U. P. area, scheduled for Negaunee High on Friday, November 4, at 7:30 P. M. The current issue of the HHSAA Bulletin lists about eight 1950-51 rules modifications, of which the modifications are of little interest to fans, providing that the transparent backboard are official for college play, designating the 1950-51 season as the last for falls of several pipe construction, and rewording of the dribble rule is the interests of accuracy and clarity.

Followers of the cage game, however, will do well to familiarize themselves with the new rules. Rule 2, section 1, consists of a rewritten version of the foul ball rule so that officials can determine more easily whether a substitute a foul ball, and to give greater prominence to the defense when the offensive team is attempting to consume time instead of working the ball into scoring position. The new revision stipulates that any player jumping a foul is expected to drop the ball or throw for a goal within approximately five seconds.

The greatest change occurs in rules pertaining to fouls committed in the ball in play at the beginning of quarters and fouls committed in the final minutes of the game. Since the elimination of the center jump, the rules have provided that at the beginning of the first and fourth quarters the team in possession of the ball at the end of the preceding quarter would put the ball in play. The new rules provide, however, that even period, including overtime periods, will begin with a jump between two opposing players.

A more severe penalty for fouls committed during the period in the fourth quarter following the official time out is designed to make it unprofitable for a team to be least careful about fouls committed during the last few minutes. Last year a player when fouled during the period following the official time out had an option of either shooting a free throw or taking the ball out of bounds, thereby insuring his team's chance of retaining possession. This year for a foul by either offense or defense which occurs within the specified time the fouled player will be required to attempt the free throw. The ball would be dead after a single or double foul and will be awarded to the thrower's team out of bounds in court. The ruling should give the team attempting to null with a one or two point lead for the first minutes a definite advantage over defensive players. In the event contact will risk giving the offensive team an opportunity to further increase its margin.
