Although it is frequently contended both sides of the picture in any controversial issue, it appears, unfortunately, that information pertaining to the case of Max Ferdinand Johnson, an adult education instructor discharged by the Negaunee board of education, who is presenting for a public hearing on the matter, will in the future be limited to the publicity of the Negaunee Citizen. It is regrettable that in supporting Max Johnson in his request for a meeting with the board.

This week's issue of THE IRON HERALD carries on Page 1 a story on the matter, containing a statement by Mrs. Robert Curry, the chairman of the Citizens' Committee.

In line with the policy of giving both parties an opportunity to present their sides of the case, the HERALD called Laurence J. Smith, ex-president of the board, and inquired whether or not he would like to make a statement.

Mr. Smith replied that the board was simply reaffirming its previous stand and informed the HERALD that it need not bother to come to a trial in the future regarding this matter, as he would have no comments to make.

The Herald has studiously refrained from expressing an opinion on this controversy, either in its editorial columns or news stories, or than the fact that it advocated a hearing be held regarding the matter to clear the attention of the benefit of all parties concerned. It will continue to refrain from expressing an opinion as to who is right or wrong until all facts are known. However, it will continue to publish news developments in the case knowing the people of Negaunee are interested in it. It is the duty of the press to give the people the right of education, all of the publicity is released from one source, the HERALD is not being biased, but is simply publishing the information which is available.

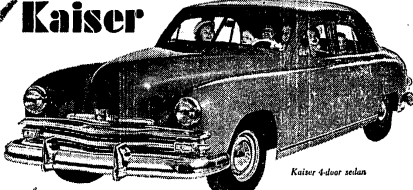

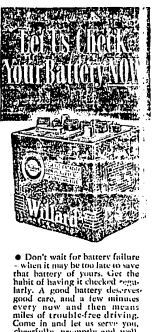
