**Mystery Mist Wrecks Haveo As Selenite Ponder Cause**  
**TILGHMAN, Md.**—A auto pilot was eaten away, holes were burned in clothes on the wash lines, and some houses were discolored. The people of the town were puzzled over the "mystery mist" that was wrecking its havoc. Complaints from residents led to an investigation.

There were several theories. Fertilizer fumes, water cabbage, other things were blamed. Dr. Lewis S. Wells, county medical examiner, explained the water cabbage theory. "When the big leaves of the plant rot, they give off hydrogen sulphide fumes. If enough hydrogen gas subsides gets into the air and there is a heavy dew, the hydrogen sulphide may dissolve in the dew drops and form sulphur dioxide. That in turn becomes sulphurous acid. The acid does the dirty work." Maryland state police at nearby Eaton said they had received a dozen complaints.

**If Teeth Fit the Wearer, They're His Judge**

**OKLAHOMA CITY**—It is a pair of false teeth fit, then they must belong to the wearer. That was the logic in a decision by a peace judge here in a case involving ownership of the false choppers.

Fred Humphrey, 75, claimed his jaws firmly when he heard the decision of Justice Willis Stark. Mr. and Mrs. William Ledick, who claimed the teeth in a replevin action, appeared somewhat down in the mouth at the ruling.

The Ledicks attempted to sell Humphrey the teeth last month. Humphrey suggested he try them on for size. He did, and wouldn't give 'em up.

"They're mine," he said. Humphrey told Stark today his teeth were stolen from his room last month. A few days later, he said, the Ledicks—who are neighbors—tried to sell him his own biters for \$50. He told Justice Stark he picked them out of a dozen sets—"I know my own teeth."

Dr. John A. Lewis, who made the teeth, supported Humphrey's claim to ownership.

"They're his teeth or he couldn't wear them," the dentist said. "The body can wear anybody else's teeth."

Dr. Lewis qualified as an expert on false upper and lowers. He wears them himself. The judge doesn't, but took Dr. Lewis's word for it.

"If they're his teeth, we'll have to let him keep them," he ruled.

**Urnamon Found in Washington, But Not Little, too Light**

**WASHINGTON**—Urnamon has been found, a few hundred yards from the White House and 200 feet straight up. Indications of presence of the ore were detected by a Geiger counter carried by a prospecting reporter. The counter, which is tickling Urnamon who placed near granite blocks which support a memorial atop from Colorado in the 555-foot high Washington monument. There's rare urnamon in existence, said, but not enough to be valuable of dangerous.

**Model Business Now Specialized As Any Others**

**NEW YORK**—It may never look like it on the surface, but modeling business is now as specialized as engineering. And it would be modeled in advance before packing her suitcase for the trip to the big city to look at the various phases of modeling and decide what doors to knock upon.

First, naturally, is the glamorous fashion photographer model career, extolled by Jean Patchett. Then there's the fashion show model, like Helen Bonin. And there are models in dress houses, like Peggy Carter.

And there are artistic models, like Leona Osborn.

Even-faceted and beautiful Jean Patchett, 23, is currently riding the crest of the wave in her own division. Since last year when her career started she has been on top for magazine covers and has lost count of the number of times she has been on the inside pages. She has taken airplane and boat jaunts to Southern and Northern climes for photo-graphic purposes. Her weekly pay is over \$500.

"If it ever drops below \$500," she said, "I get worried and think maybe I'm through. Then I wash out and get a new hairdo or something."

She's an Eastern Shore Maryland girl whose ambition was to be a singer, but she was infected by the modeling bug. Her work is some money from a disapproving family and hit New York.

She lives in a woman's hotel, is careful about money and handles, maybe, if a woman's smart and handy, well, she'll last 10 years in the business.

"It's hard work," she says, "I haven't had a date for a week. You've got to take good care of yourself if you want to look fresh and attractive."

According to Jean, no one can teach you to be a model. It's something you can do or can't do.

"You have to have a feel for clothes, and be able to catch in your eye the most dramatic," she added.

Jean is at the top of her profession—only a handful of girls make that kind of money. Many models, who receive occasional jobs, are making coffee-and-cream money as show models in the business—and it pays off during the fashion show season at a rate of about \$400 a week. But Jean averages model talk, says Wendy, runs around \$125.

When Wendy came to New York from Marshall, Tex., the fashion show made more money in an outfit beautiful, better girl who walked out and displayed clothes as though she were conferring a privilege upon the audience.

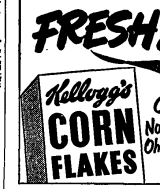
