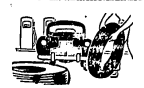

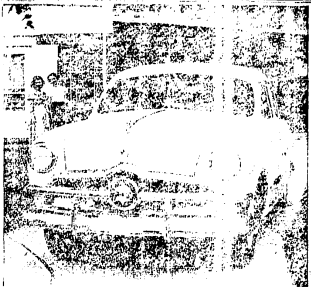

Christmas Club Funds Will Hit \$9,000,000 Mark

Nine hundred million dollars will be distributed to about ten million six hundred and seventy-five thousand Christmas Club members by approximately fifty nine hundred banking and savings institutions during National Post-Office Week, starting Monday, November 26th according to an estimate given out by Edward P. Jones, President of Christmas Club, a Corporation of New York.

The total distribution is 8.5 per cent ahead of last year and represents an all time high for the thirty nine years of Christmas Club operation. The average per member distribution is about \$32.75 in large metropolitan areas and \$34.60 for the entire country. The total number of individual members participating this year shows an increase of five hundred thousand over a year ago.

Christmas Club, a Corporation, believes that this increase in Club savings shows a definite trend in the public thinking toward individual financial security which is the ultimate financial security of the nation.

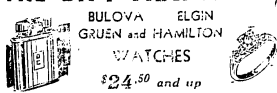

Know Use of Compass Hunters Warned

Many hunters will become impatient this year. Some will if their way out—others, less sure, will not, only because they do not know the area or because they have not learned to use a compass. In every case on record, the hunter either did not have a compass or he had one, he didn't know how to use it. Here are a few hints to remember:

When leaving your car, check the direction in which you intend to hunt. If you are going west from your car parked on a north and south road, to return to the car you will of course once have to turn. The same holds true for the other directions of the compass. Check your map for landmarks such as hills, streams, railroads

and trails. Know the direction they run. Those of you who will be hunting from a camp far back in the woods, with hardly a trail leading to it, will be presented with another problem when trying to return to a small spot in an area of great square miles. Those lovely green plants that you have been seeing everywhere in the colored pages of lovely new home magazines in current numbers will make perfect Christmas gifts.

These green plants, of the first class, represent the best both lovely and useful presents might not afford for themselves, and yet inexpensive for your budgeted gift list.

If you don't know the name of these plants, a bit of information from Nikola Hagler, home economist at the Michigan State College, may help you. Most of the plants are available at local nurseries and can be ordered for you if you get your request in time.

Philodendron has rubber like leaves and comes in different heights. Look at the point or the middle leaf type in dark green or variegated blue. The cut leaf and call leaf philodendron are effective.

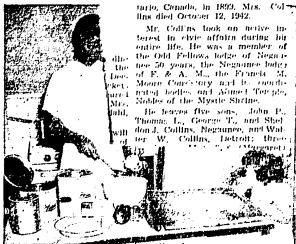

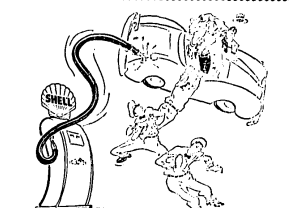

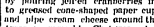
