

Telephone Calls Reach Peak At Christmas Time

Christmas long distance, like the evening automobile traffic in the

large cities, jams main lines that are reaching out to the more distant points and leaves short lines almost fairly free.

To speed the handling of calls to points outside the state, Michigan Bell will start with others of the district, circuits to large toll collecting centers, such as Chicago and New York, to carry a maximum load.

Measles Cases Show Increase

Measles is appearing in Michigan at the rate of 60 cases a day and indications are that it will continue to increase in 1941. Dr. Albert E. Heustis, State Health Commissioner, revealed this week.

Measles is especially dangerous to the pre school child, but its complications can be serious at any age. Measles is one of the most contagious of all acute communicable diseases. No one is immune to the disease who has not had it, except infants under three months of age whose mothers have had the disease. A doctor should be called in once when a child has been exposed to measles.

Gamma globulin, a fraction of blood distributed by physicians by the state through the cooperation of the American Red Cross and the Michigan Dept. of Health can be given to the exposed child to modify or prevent measles.

Gamma globulin must be given to the child immediately after exposure to prevent measles and it must be given on the fifth or sixth day after exposure to modify measles. For this reason the parents should keep watch of the children in the neighborhood and other children in the family for symptoms, or cases so that they know if the pre school child is exposed.

The Department of Health encourage the modification of measles in all children under six years of age and prevention of the disease in infants or unwell children. Modification makes the case mild but the child develops lasting immunity to measles. Prevention of measles through the use of gamma globulin ches only two or three weeks immunity.

Reading Too Soon May Lead To Later Visual Problem

Only one child in two is free from reading at the age of six to start reading without danger of developing visual problems that may be a handicap in later life according to extensive research at the University Reading Clinic.

About 18 per cent are not visually free until they are seven and one-half years of age.

There are marked differences in the children, particularly in visual acuity, vision, said Dr. Marshall on Visual Problems in Schools of the American Optometric Association.

Dr. Marshall said that the reading every child in order to read at six and then to progress a grade a year in school.

He said that most very young children are normally sighted, if they commence for long periods on near-point focusing, as is necessary for reading, or to early on, it may interfere with the normal growth and development of the eyes and muscles and nerves used in seeing.

Steam Pressure Needed for Safe Canning of Meat

If one canned meat on your stovetop, it will help correct your most likely direction: the pressure will be a wonderful time-saver on any day.

Directions given by Michigan State College home economists for canning meat are as follows: Beef, veal, mutton, lamb, pork and rabbit may be canned at home as well as poultry. Meat mixtures are recommended for home canning. Those include chile con carne, stew or soup made with cereals and vegetables.

For safe canning, meat must be heated through and through in a steam pressure canner. A boiling-water bath, an oven, a steamer without pressure, or an open kettle will not heat the meat hot enough to kill bacteria and other spoil and cause serious food poisoning. If you don't have a canner, you can't borrow a steam-pressure canner, pressure.

After the annual to be canned has been selected, it should be chilled at once and kept chilled until canning time. Chilled meat is easier to handle and cuts to the bone at 10 degrees of heat. Any meat not at temperature, heat freezing may be caused at 100 degrees below zero within a few days after killing.

Avoid freezing meat if possible. If it does freeze, keep it frozen until canning time. Thawed meat is very ticklish. Meat may be packed before the hot pack of the pack method. It is best not to fry meat before canning. Salt does not help preserve meat in canning, but may be added.

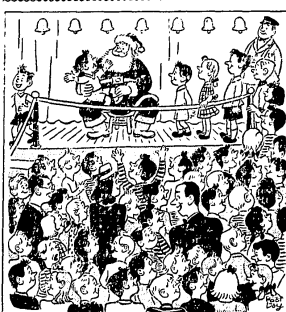
Former Negaunee Pastor on Yule Radio Broadcast

Keep Trees Safe, Fire Chief Warns

Be careful of your Christmas tree, as it takes just a spark to turn a beautiful spruce into a blazing torch in your living room. Fire Chief Francis D'Elbert warns of Negaunee residents this week of Christmas trees, the chief point of danger is the electrical plug and to use and care for these, even when they are out. To help keep Christmas energy, he advised the following safety rules for installing and decorating Yule trees:

1. Choose a small tree, instead of a big one. It will be just as pretty and much less hazardous.
2. Keep the tree outdoors until just before Christmas, install it in the eastern part of the room away from fireplaces, heaters or radiators.
3. Do not, under any circumstances, use cotton or paper for decoration on the tree or around the tree.
4. Do not place electric tinsel around the tree.
5. Use electric lights for illumination. Now that all wires are in good condition, Use Christmas tree lighting cord which have been tested by Underwriters Laboratories, Inc. These can be identified by a tag bearing the name of Underwriters Laboratories, Inc. attached to the wires.

Good news while you're spending about that Christmas time—spending is that slated point to be a moderate drop in the cost of family living during 1950. It is expected that the drop will be less than in the four months.

Planned spending will pay dividends, advises Lucille Ketchum, attention home management specialist at Michigan State College. It may be the time to buy needed equipment but not the time to go heavily into debt.

In spite of bumper crops, the cost of the weekly food supply won't change much. Pork and poultry will be among the less expensive meats. Most cuts of beef will be high. Egg prices will drop some and are not expected to be as high as last year's prices.

Fruit is plentiful and more reasonable than a year ago except for citrus fruits. Farm families will do well to produce their own food supply.

Clothing prices are expected to continue their gradual downward trend. The greatest drop has been in price goods. Nylon and some kinds of rayon lingerie are up in price. Shoe prices are expected to advance. Some dealers forecast a drop in the price of women's coats and suits.

Large stocks of washing machines, radios and radios have been

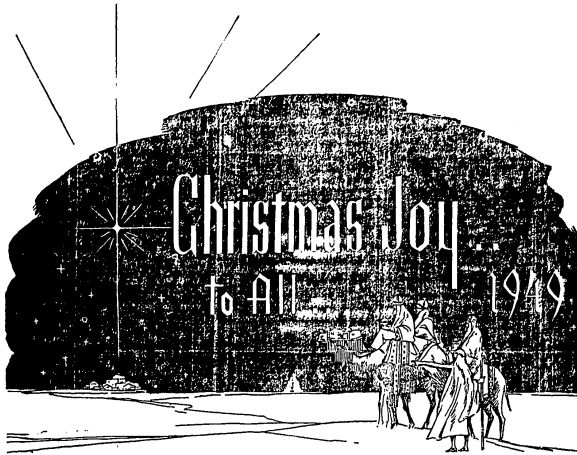

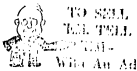

The Governor of Michigan has just a glorified Chief Executive. Governor Kim Stanley made this declaration before the House Chamber of Detroit during the first year of his 1917-20 term.

Edison of the State reform program for centralizing authority in the governor's office made this week as an legislative initiative in the House. The bill provides for the four eastern states, minimum salaries of the House members, "lock-free" idea in executive, research reorganization of the State Government.

Chairman of the committee was Senator James T. Milliken, Detroit. Travere City. The committee of state senators and representatives was received by former Governor Stanley. However, they favored reorganization of the appellate in their field from outside government to study the various functions.
