Easy to Dial

STARTING SUNDAY, JANUARY 23

Remember, all dial telephone numbers will be new-type numbers. All Negaunee numbers will begin with **GRANITE** and the associated numeral 5, followed by four other numerals. **GRANITE 5-4401** is an example.

The steps below show how easy it will be for you to use your new dial telephone.



1 LOOK up — and JOT down — the number carefully.

If you want **GRANITE 5-4401**, for example, write GR 5-4401 on a piece of paper and keep it in front of you as you dial.

2 Listen for the dial tone before you dial.

Lift the receiver and wait until you hear a steady humming sound. That's the dial system's way of saying "Number, please?"



3 Dial the **TWO LETTERS** of the central office name first, **G R**, then the associated **NUMERAL, 5**.

To dial the first letter—**G**—place your finger in the **GHI** opening on your dial. Pull the dial around until your finger hits the finger stop. Remove your finger and

let the dial spin back freely. Dial the second letter—**R**—in the **PRS** opening—the same way. Then dial the associated numeral, **5**.

4 Then dial the **FOUR** other NUMERALS.

Dial 4401 in order. (Note that the Numeral "0" is in the last opening of the dial. Don't confuse it with the Letter "O" in the MNO opening.)



You'll then hear either the ringing signal — an intermittent buzz-z-z-z — or the busy signal — a rapid buzz-z-z-z-z.

It's a good idea to make sure everyone in your home (including the children) knows how to call anyone in the Negaunee-Islepening-Marquette area. Just dial the first **TWO LETTERS** of the central office name and the associated **NUMERAL**, and then the four other **NUMERALS**.

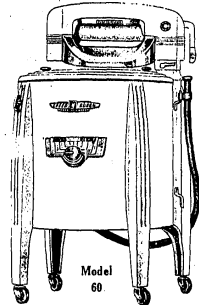

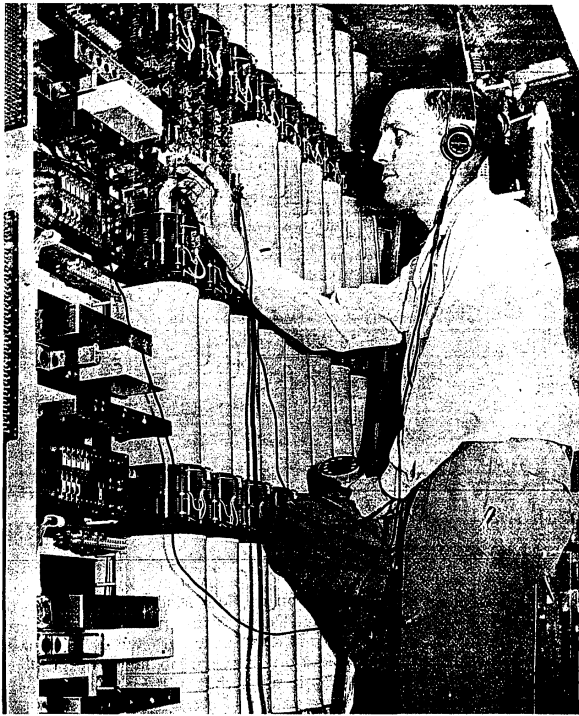
