Alumni Vote On Plan for Scholarship

Preparations are nearing completion for one of the final steps in setting up the Negaunee High School Diamond Jubilee Scholarship program. A vote by alumni who registered for the jubilee last summer, in which they will be asked to approve or reject by-laws governing the scholarship fund.

At its last meeting the Jubilee committee accepted with amendments the proposed by-laws submitted by a committee consisting of Thomas Pelroy and R. K. Richards.

A resume of the by-laws with a letter and copy of the Jubilee financial report as examined by the auditing firm, will be mailed to approximately 1,500 alumni.

A deadline has been set for the return of the ballot on the by-laws, and if approval of alumni is obtained, the Jubilee Committee will immediately take necessary steps to establish the scholarship program.

The committee decided to make no announcement regarding the by-laws or funds available for scholarship purposes until approval of alumni is obtained.

Approximately 200 members of Negaunee Lodge EPOE 1116 are expected to attend the banquet scheduled for 8:30 Saturday night at which past exalted rulers of the Elks lodge will be honored.

Negaunee's lodge will be 47 years old next July 15, although several local residents belonged to the Ishpeming lodge prior to the time an Elks lodge was established here.

Seven members of the charter class of July 15, 1908, still hold active membership in the group. They include A. P. Johnson, W. B. Williamson, John J. Hauserman, Phil Hagan, Joseph Kelly, Joseph Winder and Al Wilman.

Death Ends Colorful Career of Former County Board Chairman

Blair died for T. C. (Cap) Nicholas, well known Palmer resident and former chairman of the Marquette County Board of Supervisors, were held at 2 p.m. Thursday in the Bjork & Zuhlski Funeral Home, Row, Orlin Kaiberg and Rev. Cecil Lytle officiating.

Mr. Nicholas, 83, died at 10 p.m. Monday in the Twin City Hospital, Negaunee, where he had been a patient about three weeks.

One of the most colorful figures in the history of Marquette County government, "Cap" as he was known by his associates, spent 23 years as a member of the Board of Supervisors, representing Richmond Township. He retired as a member of the governing body effective Nov. 30, 1954.

Recognizing the contributions he made to the township and county, members of the Richmond Township Board in January presented him with a certificate of appreciation. He has been placed in the town hall with the only occasion that a township resident has been so honored.

During the period in which he has resided in the township he took the lead in numerous improvements, both a member of Richmond Township Board of Education and the Richmond Township Board of Health. Serving on the board of edu-

J. & L. Asks Queen Street Relocation

Meeting for their regular Feb. 10, will see last, members of the Negaunee City Council were scheduled to consider a request for relocation of Queen street, made by the Jones and Laughlin Ore Co.

R. W. Braund, general manager for J. & L., in a letter to the municipality, requested that the present location of Queen street be moved north and east, as it is now in line with mining developments owned by the company.

Another mining company, C. C. I., also submitted a communication for Council consideration pertaining to the municipal portion of grading and engineering at the new Sterling addition the Cleveland" C. I. is developing.

Work is now in progress on a road from the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau for a municipality in the Upper Peninsula, and Sylvia Vann seeking transfer of the High License, currently held by Alfred Korson.

Council discussed progress being made concerning electric utility customers who are being denied service. It is expected a policy on all delinquent accounts, both active and inactive, will be adopted.

Other business included opening bids for new tires for the Department of Public Works, financial reports and departmental reports.

We herewith submit the report of part time work done in the Veterans' Referral Agency during December, 1954.

World War II veteran who visited the office during the month requesting help in some form, illness or monetary unemployment in most cases made it necessary for the veteran to need assistance. Food and fuel was the emergent need in 11 of the cases, children's clothing and shelter payment in five, and two requested help with hospital expense.

The Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund Board assisted with the emergency help where ever possible, and applications were taken and processed through their agency. Other referrals went to the Department of Social Welfare and the Bureau of Social Aid.

Two meetings of the Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund Committee were attended during the month.

JACOBETTI SEEKS NEW DEER OPENING

Co-sponsored by Dominic Jacobetti, a bill has been introduced in the State legislature to begin Michigan's annual deer hunting season on the Saturday nearest to November 15.

In a letter to the Iron Herald this week, Jacobetti revealed that purpose of the bill is to give sportsmen a better opportunity to hunt the first two days without losing time from their place of employment or business.

Jacobetti, Negaunee Democrat is serving his first term in the legislature as State Representative from Marquette County, having defeated Alvin Richards, Republican incumbent in the November election.

Another bill has been introduced by Rep. Trucks, Baldwin Republican, which would provide for starting the deer season on November 20 and continuing it through until December 5. Jacobetti pointed out that his proposal is in line with a resolution by the Northern Michigan Sportsmen's Clubs, which are opposed to changing dates for the season.

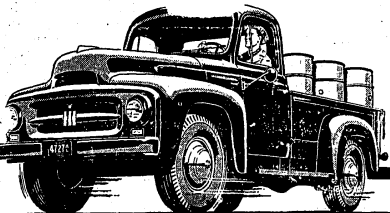

Laugh at Food Fallacies, Enjoy Eating, Says Wayne Home Economics Professor

Everyone is familiar with the saying—some people live to eat while others eat to live. But do you know how many people today believe about food?

Too many, says Miss Marquette Hoyce, assistant professor of home economics at Wayne University. These food theories, commonly known as food fads or fallacies, can usually be traced to one of three causes she says. They are the result of illogical conclusions based on insufficient laboratory evidence, inaccurate conclusions based on personal experience, or cultural tradition of fact for personal edification.

Miss Hoyce divides the most popular types of food fallacies into groups—those involving the so-called natural or helpful combination of foods with "mental properties" such as mood purifiers and brain foods; those carrying a medical emphasis, such as spinach and radishes; and food connected with dieting.

Some of the most "cherished" beliefs followed by Miss Hoyce's classmates are listed below.

Raw or very rare meat is more nourishing than thoroughly cooked meat.

Fatless proteins in meat are not damaged by heat. Correct cooking makes the meat more palatable and easier to digest.

White rice is more nutritious than brown rice.

Fats, then, is no difference, although not a "poisonous" substance have preference. Fat is not left in opened cans in the refrigerator.

"C" cuts are as safe as other common cuts. Acid foods may be eaten, but will not spoil.

Fish is a brain food.

Unfortunately nobody has discovered a food that specifically aids brain activity. In fact there is no evidence that extra brainwork requires extra food.

Raw foods are better for you.

Fats clinging to cooked foods and "going back to nature" would probably shorten the life span. Cooking widens the range of food skills, permits and improves digestibility.

A raw steak drains the pain and alleviates from a black eye.

The cooling effect will slow down the blood flow, but the heat would be much more effective.

As long as food is good for you, when eaten alone, they can be eaten together.

Miss Hoyce says it's in the mind, not the stomach, that they don't mix. Many diets about food combinations started in days before refrigeration. When foods spoiled easily.

In a food combination, Miss Hoyce stresses it is much more important that they don't mix. "Saturated" diet than to worry about the food being eaten. It is much at food fallacies, she adds, and you realize that some better and do you more soon.

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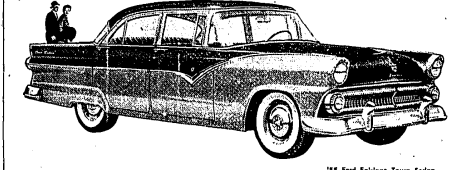

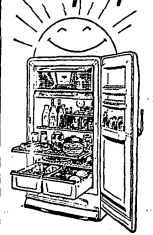
Parochials Idle Until February 18
