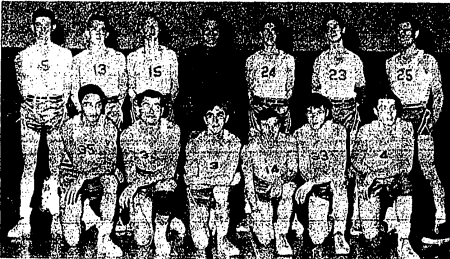

Jerrold Will Seek Franchise To Install Community TV System

Community television may be available to residents of Negaunee by the fall of 1955, provided the City Council grants permission for a franchise for such a system to the Jerrold Corp., Philadelphia, Fred Lieberman told Council members of the municipal governing body and its capably audience at a special council meeting Monday night.

Lieberman disclosed that the concern with which he is associated planned not only to petition the Negaunee Council for a franchise to install a system here, but also governing bodies of Marquette and Ishpeming.

He revealed that preliminary testing completed by Jerrold engineers had met requirements of the concern as far as a satisfactory signal was concerned at two or three sites in the Negaunee - Ishpeming area.

Cost of installing the system was estimated by Lieberman as being approximately \$100,000 for the twin cities. The Jerrold system would include one installation of a horn type receiver to serve both cities with coaxial cable, which would contain amplifiers at frequent intervals being strung from the receiving apparatus to cover the two communities.

We will present a copy of a franchise to the city manager

in the near future for revisions such as might be acceptable to Negaunee," Lieberman said. He revealed that the Jerrold Corp. itself is not interested particularly in financing the system, but had obtained outside capital for this purpose. "However, if local capital is interested, we would assign the franchise to such a group, provided it would establish the system in accord with acceptable standards," he stated.

In response to questions from the audience, Lieberman disclosed that it will cost an estimated \$3,300 per mile to string coaxial cable, and that once it is installed TV owners will not need antennae equipment. Cost of a hookup to the system for the individual home owner would be \$125 with a rental charge of \$2.50 per month.

"Economically this plan is feasible," he said, "as we are convinced that the system would pay for itself and that by the end of the fifth or sixth year it will be possible to reduce the charges."

Questioned regarding service for the system he replied, "You won't need any equipment and we'll install the system, but not your set, as our job is to deliver a clear signal to the back of your TV set."

In answer to queries regarding satisfactory signals and what stations residents would receive the Jerrold representative declared his concern would guarantee 80 per cent good television over two channels and snow free reception at all times over at least one channel. "In the event new stations become available the system will be set up so it could include up to five channels," he said.

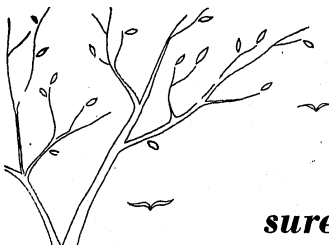

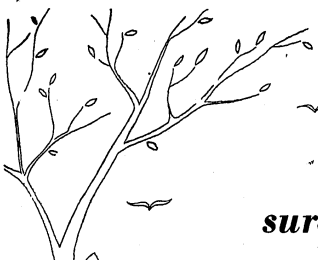

Gladstone, smallest school in the Great Lakes Conference, wrapped up the league basketball title last Friday night to add to the football championship, which the Braves won last year. Coach Conny Kelly's club "backed in" as they won first place by losing to Manistique as a result of the Negaunee Miners going down to defeat at the hands of Munising.

Constitutionally, the Braves, for if memory serves us correctly, their feat of winning both major sports in the same school year in the first time this trick had been accomplished since the league was formed at the start of the 1940-45 year. By a strange coincidence, the runner-up spot this year in each sport had been occupied by the Negaunee Miners, who were a name behind the Braves at the end of the era's campaign, and a matter of percentage points following the windup of the cage season.

If local basketball followers are beginning to think there is a hidden attraction to winning the third leg on the Conference basketball trophy they can hardly be blamed. When the award was originally established, it was decided it would become the permanent possession of the first school to win three championships. Negaunee took the title in 1948-49 and again in 1951-52, while Ishpeming won it in the seasons of 1949-50 and 1950-51. Since Bob Carey's last club won the league race, similar legs have been won by Manistique, Marquette and Gladstone. Negaunee was picked as the team to beat last year and again this season, but missed by an eye hash each time and the rotating trophy is still traveling.

Last week we ran a story that St. Paul had nailed the top seeded spot down in the Class D district basketball tourney here. If the same procedure had been followed that was used in previous years the Emeralds would

have had the bye, but due to recent action of the athletic council the method of determining the seeded spots was changed slightly, and we were in error. In prior seasons the team having the most wins in its class was awarded the top seeded position and the team with the second largest number the seeded spot in the bottom bracket. The athletic council action changed this policy so that the spots were decided on a percentage basis, rather than the largest number of wins. *Gwin* with a 16-3 record in Class D had a

100 percentage, while the Rapids with nine victories in 11 starts ended up with 40% or eight thousands of a point less.

As the drawings turned out, the Paroohials actually received a break in failing to obtain the bye. The second and third teams out of the hat in Class D Monday morning were John D. Pierce and Felch, with Gulan scheduled to meet the winner of this game on Friday night. St. Paul is in the bottom bracket with the "so-called" weaker clubs—Edon, Champion and Republic. Although any of the three is capable of pulling an upset the Emeralds look like a pretty good bet to be in the final Saturday afternoon.

GOOD FEEDING

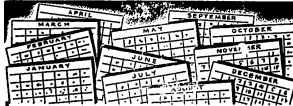
